CITY MANAGER A.L. (Jake) Outland officially retired this week, after 20 years of service to the City of Friona.

It has been our pleasure to work with Jake for all of those 20 years (actually, he beat us to Friona by about six months), four of those years as a member of the Friona City Council.

The rest of those years, we have closely covered the city activities for the Friona Star, and have come to appreciate the work that Jake did for the citizens of Friona.

A lot of things have come to pass during Outland's tenure as city manager. The building chart which we published a couple of weeks ago showed the city's building boom of the 1960s and early '70s. Outland directed this activity from his desk at city hall.

As a former member of the City Council and a newsman, we can tell you that Outland has kept a close eye on the city's finances. Anyone who has ever worked with Jake will attest that getting the best deal for the City of Friona has always been his number one priority.

Jake has been an active civic booster, especially in Lions and in Masonic work. He has served as an officer in these organizations, and never misses a meeting. He has also worked on the regional level.

He has been recognized for his work by his peers, in the Texas Municipal League. And in 1969, about half-way through his tenure as city manager, he was singled out as Friona's "Man of the Year."

He has been in the forefront for a number of municipal improvements, such as a new fire station, the nursing home, and more recently, the library fund drive and the water improvements program, still underway.

Jake is one of those rare individuals who recognizes that publicity is important, and that in order to have publicity, the newspaper has to be contacted.

Any time newsworthy events have happened on the city scene, Jake was quick to call us to let us know, help us arrange a photo if one was necessary, and provide whatever information was required.

This help did not stop with city matters, either. We could not begin to enumerate the times he has called our number to inquire "Have you heard about the wreck out on Highway 60?" or "Did you know that so-and-so passed away this morning?"

For 20 years he prepared the weather report for the Star. You could tell it was Friday, because Jake always brought the weather by.

We'll miss Jake at the City Hall. He has sort of become the city's Tom Landry. But he has earned his retirement, many times over.

Gift Puts Drive Over

The Friona Library received a gift of \$25,000 this week from the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation, to be used in the library's building program.

Library leaders indicated that the latest gift would put the fund drive where it was needed, in order to begin its building program.

At a special meeting of the Friends of the Library board Tuesday, a decision was made to continue to pursue the idea of building a new building.

A new offer by the board of directors of Friona Consumers, to sell the group the Consumers building, was rejected. The Consumers group wanted \$85,000 for their building on Main Street.

"We appreciate everyone who has helped us with our drive. To say we are excited about our new library is an understatement," said Kitty Gallman, president of the library board.

Chamber Honors Leading Citizens

The Dallas Cowboys really deserve the motto "America's Team," said Ray Stone, principal speaker at the Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture banquet Thursday night.

Stone, who produces a syndicated radio network show, "Cowboys Football Report,"

told the audience that everyone associated with the Cowboys--from the players on up to the top brass, are "class" people.

"It is a treat to be associated with the type of people who make up the Dallas Cowboys. The players--and the management--don't particularly like the 'America's Team' connotation, but I think they deserve it," Stone said.

The speaker pointed out that of the six top teams as rated by the TV networks for viewers for the season just past, the Cowboys were involved in every one. "The Cowboys are the top audience on Sunday games, on Monday Night Football, Thursday Night Football--whatever," Stone said.

And the Cowboys aren't just popular in Texas. The speaker pointed out that there is a Dallas Cowboy Fan Club in New York City, with some 1,600 members--all native New Yorkers.

"Can you imagine a Pittsburgh Steeler or Philadelphia Eagle fan club in Texas--made up of Texans?" he asked.

Stone kept the audience in stitches with humorous stories about members of the Cowboy team and coaches.

In the awards department, a bevy of plaques were handed out to citizens of the Friona area.

Court Approves New Precinct Boundaries

Parmer County Commissioners approved new precinct, voting precinct and Justice of the Peace precinct boundary lines at their regular meeting Monday, January 25.

Changing of the precinct lines was mandated by the Voting Act of 1965, which calls for "one man, one vote," in other words, that every representative have basically the same number of people in their district or precinct.

The re-apportionment project has caused a sweeping change in Precinct four (Lazbuddie's precinct), which now has a corridor running up Highway 214 into the City of Friona. A sizeable area inside Friona has been added to precinct four, to make up the needed population.

Precinct two, which includes Bovina, also added the western side of Friona, in order to bring its population up to the required norm.

The Farwell precinct added some rural area to meet the requirements.

Commissioners have been attempting to create four precincts with approximately 2,760 people each.

The plan as approved Monday will now be submitted to the Justice Department for their approval. It was drawn by the law firm of Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley.

County Democratic chairman Richard Collard, appearing before the commissioners, told the group "I wish you'd have done it (the re-apportionment) a little differently, but since we're forced to do something, I'm supporting you 100 per cent, and will work to see that it (your plan) goes through."

Collard had indicated that he wished the re-apportionment issue could have been completed in 1981, so it would not have had to be "rushed through" on an election year. But members of the court, including County Judge Porter Roberts, assured him that they had been doing everything in their power to get the issue resolved.

New polling places for the city of Friona, adding two additional voting boxes, will be required as a result of the boundary changes. The polling

sites which have been suggested by Judge Roberts are: Precinct 1 (Ernest Anthony), the Senior Citizen's Friendship House; Precinct 2 (Jack Patterson), the Community Center, and Precinct 4 (Raymond McGehee), the Friona Fire Station.

Under the new precinct lines, Precinct four, which has previously contained the Lazbuddie area, has been expanded by bringing a corridor

Monday Is Final Day For Filing

Monday, February 1 is the deadline for filing for a precinct or county office, and the number of filings was low, according to Richard Collard, Parmer County Democratic Party chairman.

So far, only two positions on the ballot have drawn opposition. They are the District Clerk job, where longtime clerk Dorothy Quickel is retiring. Those filed so far include Cynthia Thigpen and Marjorie Watkins, both of Farwell.

In the County Commissioner's race, Precinct 4 (Lazbuddie and Friona), two men have filed on the Democratic ledger, including the incumbent, Raymond McGehee, and a former commissioner, Raymond Treider, Jr.

Those who have filed for re-election include County Judge Porter Roberts; County Clerk Bonnie Warren and County Treasurer Benna Felts.

The three justices of the peace also have filed. They are Albert H. Smith of Farwell; Frances Euler of Friona and Wayne Spears of Bovina.

Jack Patterson, Commissioner, Precinct 2 (Bovina-Friona), is a candidate for re-election, and thus far is unopposed.

Those wishing to file for an office need to do so by Monday with Collard, or Ellen Estes of Bovina, the County Republican chairman.

Child Welfare Board Officers Are Elected

On January 19, the Parmer County Child Welfare Board met for its monthly business meeting.

In reviewing the Christmas party and other Christmas events for the county's foster children, the Board was pleased with how all things developed. A special word of thanks goes to Debbie Shirley for her work with the Empty Stocking Fund, Friona State Bank for its gifts to the children and to Parmer and Castro County churches for their assistance in getting gifts for the foster children.

Several cases were presented by case worker, Carla Majors, and actions were planned or taken.

The Board elected officers for 1982. They are: Rev. Skip Sircic, president; Ona Patterson, vice president; Bessie Holt, treasurer; and Jo Blackwell, secretary.

The Board approved a letter to be put in county papers that will appeal for clothing for foster children and other items that the Board sees the community assisting with.

Child abuse and neglect are not things that can be dealt with in a strictly symptomatic manner (as the problem arises). Preventive measures must be taken. The bulk of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of the types of actions the Board could possibly take. Board members left with research assignments that will move the discussion along at the next meeting.

Those present at the January meeting were Jo Blackwell, Don Spring, Robert Gallman, Ona Patterson, Joe Schilling, Carla Majors and Rev. Skip Sircic. The next meeting of the Board will be February 23.

The Texas Department of Human Resources and the Child Welfare Board of Parmer County continually seek to make life "normal" for the child that is placed in foster care, but often that is difficult. As many of you know, when children are taken from a home, due to abuse or neglect, frequently they have nothing more than the clothes on their backs. This is a terrible burden for the foster parent, who takes the child and a very difficult time for the individual child. It is obvious that no Board can take away the pain and suffering of the

abused or neglected child, but we do hope to put them in an atmosphere where healing will be possible.

You can all easily see that it is much easier to pay attention to a child and meet emotional needs if you are not worrying about physical needs. This is where you come in. The Parmer County Child Welfare Board is looking for a variety of items that will assist foster parents in dealing with situations of great need. The list of needed items includes: Pampers (newborn to toddler), bottle warmer, crib, activity center, t-shirts, crib sheets, pants (all sizes, male and female), shirts (all sizes, male and female), dresses, sleepers, pajamas, underwear and socks.

After a family gets past the initial shock of a brand new member with such acute needs our foster parents do an excellent job. But getting help in that initial difficult period is the problem.

All clothing and other items that are received by the Board will be placed in a room at the Friona United Methodist Church. Only the county case worker, Carla Majors, will have access to those items.

So, if you have clothes or can help with the purchase of underwear, socks, Pampers, etc. it will be greatly appreciated. Contact any Child Welfare Board member and they will answer questions or deliver clothes.

The Board also notes that the case worker could use help in transporting foster children to the doctor, dentist, etc.

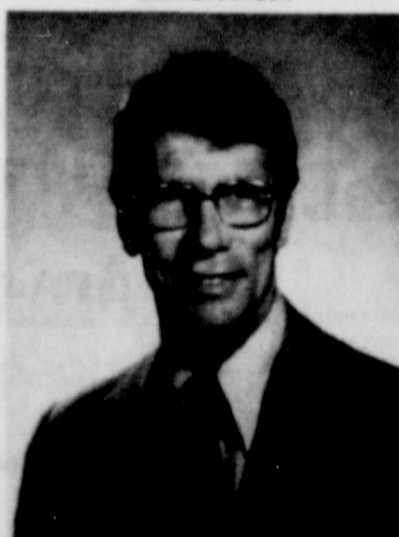

two miles wide up the east side of Highway 214 into Friona. A good portion of Friona, the eastern part, has been added to this precinct.

Areas shifted into Precinct 4 include most of the area east of Main Street and south of Highway 60, although two blocks of Cleveland and Pierce Streets are also added, as well as an area from the east side of Maple Avenue eastward, including the apartments and trailer park.

Precinct two, now represented by Jack Patterson, also would take in a part of Friona, adding everything north and west of Highway 60 and the city area west of Highway 214 North, including Lakeview Addition, Hicks Addition and Western Addition.

Patterson's precinct still contains all of the city of Bovina, plus the northwest quadrant of Parmer County. With the exception of the deletion of the portions within the city of Friona, and the corridor along Highway 214, Anthony's voting precinct in the rural areas remains the same.

The addition of the two voting boxes in the city of Friona will give the county ten voting boxes, as opposed to the eight boxes, which has been the custom for more than 20 years.
