## Bredthauer Accepts Goliad County Assignment

### Briscoe County Oil Test Will Be Spudded In In About Two Weeks, Report Indicates

Preparations for the Briscoe county oil test about a mile north of the Floyd county line and about a mile west of Highway 207 between Floydada and Silverton, were going forward this week, according to information received in Floydada.

A water well is expected to be completed today or Friday to supply water for the drilling operations and other machinery is being moved from a location at Oklahoma City, where the Phillips Petroleum company has just completed a well. According to information received by J. M. Massie from officials of the company, the Phillips will drill the well with their own rig.

The 6500-foot test is located on the map as being 660 feet from the north line and 1980 feet from the east line of Section 6, Block 4, which would place the well in the northwest corner of the northeast quarter of the tract. The location has been made definitely, Tom Craig, Phillips land man at Amarillo, told Mr. Massie.

Probabilities are that the well will be spudded in about September 15. Mr. Massie said the oil company's land man looked upon the Harrison discovery east of Lubbock as having a very important bearing on developments in this section.

### Defense Survey Of Farm Needs In Machinery

The Floyd County USDA Defense committee this week is carrying on a survey of present farming equipment on Floyd county farms and the prospective needs of farmers for the next two years.

Paul Snodgrass, chairman of the committee, this week was asking county machinery dealers, and will farm machinery dealers, and will contact as many hundred farmers as their limited time for reporting will permit, about present stocks, estimated number of machines on farms, purchases for 1940 and 1941 and prospective needs for the remainder of 1941 and 1942. Practically the whole range machinery needs for farms is included in the questionnaire.

The information, it is said, will be used in the allocation of defense materials for manufacture. List of machinery on the questionnaire includes:

Tractors (used on farms), trucks of various sizes, gasoline engines, electric motors, farm wagons and trailers, plows and listers, grain drills, planters, harrows and discs, cultivators, sprayers and dusters, grain binders, grain combines, grain separators, hay mowers, rakes and balers, mangle rollers, cutters, fertilizer spreaders, cream separators, barbed wire and woven wire.

The completed estimate will be a composite of the opinion of as many dealers and farmers as the committee has time to contact, Mr. Snodgrass said. It will also include an estimate on the facilities for farm repairs, the availability of repair and replacement parts, and an estimate on the numbers of scrap iron and steel that can be collected in the county.

### \$152,000 Allotment For Floyd Co. Rural Electric Lines, Telegram Advises Chapman

A \$152,000 allotment for Floyd County Rural Electric co-operative by the Rural Electric administration was announced out of Washington the first of the week, and the allotment confirmed by wire to L. W. Chapman superintendent the same day.

Chapman said he had no detailed information but that the allotment apparently covered amply all extensions immediately planned for Floyd, Hale, Swisher, Dickens and Crosby counties, covering 234 miles of line and intended to serve 430 members.

At present the Floyd County Rural Electric co-operative is completing a 46-mile project to Finney switch in Hale county with an extension from the neighborhood of Providence to serve 74 new members including Plainview Airport.

Almost Doubles Membership

The new project for which the allotment made Monday is expected to provide funds will serve a membership that will almost double the number of homes now being served, Chapman said. Application has been in for the allotment of funds for many months and two weeks ago Chapman in company with A. H. Kreis, chairman of the board of the local co-op, spent several days in Washington conferring with officials there on their needs.

The extensions contemplated, on which the preliminary engineering work has been done, will extend to portions of the following communities:

In Floyd county: Prairie Chapel, Lone Star, Cedar, Fairview, Barwise and Starkey;

In Crosby county: Big Four, Wake, Mt. Blanco;

In Dickens county: Vicinity of McAdoo;

In Hale county: Ellen, Hooper, Hale Center, Halfway and East Mound;

In Swisher county: Whitefield.

H. N. Roberts, of Lubbock, has been employed as engineer on the project. Matters of contract letting and other details will await completion of details in preparation therefor, and the allocation of the needed materials for the job.

### Charles E. Jones Funeral Rites Held Tuesday Evening

Other surviving relatives include two daughters Marilyn, 7 and Gwendoly 5 years of age; his parents Mr. and Mrs. C. S. ### Defense Guard Allotted 26 Springfields

Lieutenant J. C. Gilliam, acting commander of Company B, Floydada unit, of Texas Defense guard, this week received 26 Springfield rifles and 260 rounds of ammunition from the army, the rifles being issued and used in drill at the regular meeting Tuesday night.

Resignation of Dr. Donald H. Pitts, who organized the company, has been announced by Major V. H. McClintock, Chiefdrum.

Inability to give the needed time to the affairs of the company was assigned as the reason for the resignation. In addition to his practice the physician has a sanitarium under construction and will be too busy for an indefinite period to give the guard the time it should have.

### Cotton Stamps May Be Issued On Saturday

First Cotton stamps in Floyd county may be issued Saturday afternoon of this week, Aloyce A. Hoots, secretary of the AAA committee said late yesterday.

Whether the stamps are issued beginning Saturday afternoon or on Monday depends on whether an auditor, expected Friday afternoon or Saturday morning, completes his work soon enough for the office to begin issuing the stamps.

"An ample supply of Cotton Stamps are on hand now, and we are going to issue them as fast as we can," said Mr. Hoots. Approximately 1100 farms are eligible to receive stamps this fall.

Approximately half of about \$30,000 worth of stamps could be issued soon. But weather conditions will govern the speed with which the remainder can be issued, Mr. Hoots said. Cotton land measurements are about 60 per cent completed.

How They are Issued

A cotton producer who has received notice of his measurements and also a card asking him to call at the office of the committee and sign his cotton stamp application, will receive his stamps on the day he signs the application, Hoots said.

The stamps may be used in the purchase of cotton goods at any of the stores of the county which have qualified, which means practically any retail store in the county handling dry goods items. Retail business establishments have been informed as to the rules governing their sales of cotton goods on which cotton stamps are to be received in payment.

### Floyd Murray Successor To Odell Winter

Floyd Murray, captain of the 1932 Whirlwind football squad, runner-up in bi-district championship competition, is new head coach of Floydada High school athletics.

He succeeded to the place Friday in an over-night change which saw Odell Winter, head coach for the past five years, transfer as head coach to Seymour High school. Sunday Winter and his family were en route to Seymour and Murray had moved with his family to Floydada, bought a home and made ready to begin work with the football squad Monday morning at 6 o'clock.

With line coach W. V. Hale, Murray will be working with a football squad of about 35 that begins the district campaign from scratch. Two regular starters—co-captains Joe Rushing and Carleton Fawver—are on hand from last year's campaign, with three reserves—J. D. Morrison, Harold Sparks and Robert Warren.

In this morning's workout the coaches were using various combinations, in experiments with both line and backfield. The team is especially short on backfield men. Beginning tomorrow afternoon the morning workouts will be discontinued, Murray said.

First Game Sept. 19

First interscholastic competition for the Whirlwinds will come on September 19th, when Slaton high will be their opponents on Western field. Slaton had a good team last year after losing by a heavy score to Floydada, and lost very few players.

Littlefield will take the place of Tulla on the schedule of the Whirlwinds. With an increase in the number of teams in Tulla's district, the Hornets have to play a conference game on the date scheduled last fall with Floydada.

"There is plenty of material and the boys have the spirit," Murray said this morning. "We'll have to experiment, work out and practice until we find the right combination," he added.

### Rain Wednesday Night Halts All Farm Work; Late Feed Helped

Rain last night accompanied in some portions of the county with a severe thunderstorm and wind, apparently covered all sections of Floyd and adjoining counties with precipitation ranging from a half inch to an inch and one-fourth.

No reports of damage had come in this morning as late as 9 o'clock, but the lightning affected service on telephone lines and light lines for awhile. Telephone lines were out to Ralls and to Matador during the night.

At Floydada the rain was recorded at 6-tenths of an inch. East of town and south of town the fall was heavier and similarly at Lockney according to reports. Northwest of Lockney a shower fell.

Cotton did not need the rain and wheat growers generally had good moisture, with plows going on day and night shifts. Feedstuffs are not damaged and late feeds will be benefited.

Over the week-end showers fell in dashes around over the county. Floydada being in one of the strips Saturday afternoon when 4-tenths of an inch fell here. Sunday afternoon showers were recorded in various parts of the county.

Day-time temperatures have been relatively high throughout the week, with a peak Sunday afternoon of 94. Night low was 67 Monday.

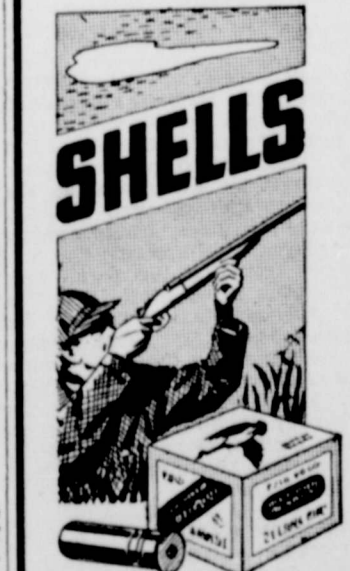
