Check Your Brakes

EDITORIALS When the United States Congress some Whether to hunt ducks or not to hunt them years ago adopted and sent to the then presi-

is the question. There are some ducks that fly up with the others it is against the law to shoot. Also if you shoot a jacksnipe, (who would if he knew it?) you are in for it. Also you can't shoot before sun-up nor after 4 o'clock in the afternoon. This certainly stymies the hunter on these open plains lakes. The game warden, if you don't plead guilty at home can take your case to the federal court. (Most of the state game laws are also federal). So, watch your step. Be sure to get a duck stamp and be sure to read up on the rules and regulations. Whether the game preserving enthusiasts are too too or whether is the hunters doesn't make a lot of difference right now, and an assortment of indignation isn't a lot of help when you get up before the court.

Watch on frosty mornings for bloat in your cattle if they are running on this rank wheat. Also watch out for poisoning from eating volunteer wheat or other small grain or feed after a heavy frost. The burned stalks and leaves carry a certain amount of poison similar to stunted cane during a drouthy summer. Some veterinarians call it Prussic acid poisoning. You can lose a good cow in a few minutes, whatever the name.

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In some towns very good advantage has been taken of WPA labor to pave streets. In one town not so far away nearly 100 blocks have been paved and another 15 block piece of work is now ready. The cost to the property owner on this particular project will be \$62.50 per 50-foot front on a residence street. Another town has been doing a lot of paving, too .- and we mean a small city-although they have been about as broke there as the municipality has here for a good many years. No modern small city is a modern small city without paving. And that will be more true as time goes on. Paved streets cost money just like hard-surfaced roads but there is saving and there is economy also in them.

One of the points about the defense program of the Department of Agriculture we believe some of our people missed is this: The powers that be think there ought to be 18 per cent more beef marketed in the United States in the year of 1942, not 18 per cent more raised. Get the distinction. The country is getting an oversupply of cattle, the authorities believe, and they think that many a cattleman who is in debt could very well sell off some of his cattle, get his debts paid and be in better shape for later on, while doing the nation a favor at the same time by making cattle available for the armed forces. This is what was and is being said by the Department of Agriculture, not The Hesperian. Anyway, they took dent of the United States for approval the law which was termed the "Neutrality Act," it was not in fact such, but an act which notified the world that while no bully was in sight, it was the intention of this country to run from him when and if he did show up. It was a voluntary abrogation of the right to sail the free seas which the country had defended against England, against the Barbary states and had offered to defend against Germany itself when Cleveland was president. This is according to the history books. The Neutrality act itself, serving notice on Hitler or any other brigand by any name, that he could run our ships off the high seas by simply threatening them, is the reason why our ships have been attacked and sunk on high seas, in neutral waters and in waters adjacent to our own coasts. The people who are shedding crocodile tears with the widows and bereaved mothers over their lost sons on the high seas, in the Reuben James and other ships and blaming our present policy with it, ought instead to be blaming those officials who responded to unthoughted hysteria and had tried-like the Chinese-to crawl in a hole and pull it in after them.

Mr. Hitler's diatribe against Mr. Roosevelt last week would have been amusing had it not been so maddening. While he was having his own German boys killed by the thousands in the snow and slush of Russia he isolationists in America blaming and berating President Roosevelt for the mourning mothers of 74 men and boys lost in the cold waters of Iceland. Mr. Hitler did the Norwegians, the Dutch, the Belgians, the Greeks, the Serbs, the Cheks the same way-and the Russians as well-until he got ready to do them another way.

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We do not by any means try to say that President Roosevelt has not made mistakes. Largely, however, his trouble has been one of liking to hear himself talk over the radio. His trouble is that he thinks he makes a good speech and has a well-rounded delivery. So much he has said in public addresses could and should have been left unsaid.



Both sides substituted freely as the boys went out of play to get the mud out of their cleats and to rest from the hard chugging.


