## FHS Has Regional Qualifiers In UIL

Friona High School qualified 13 individuals in ten events for the Regional UIL level, at the recent UIL Literary meet.

Friona placed second overall in the literary meet, behind district-winning Tulia.

The FHS accounting team of Teresa Taylor, Chad Henry and Lee Ann Ford advanced to regional as a team. In addition, Miss Taylor and Henry placed first and second and qualified as individuals.

Amanda Taylor qualified in calculator applications, after placing third.

Friona's current events team, composed of Cody Simmons, Jon Parker and LaTawn White, also qualified.

Tonya Stovell qualified in poetry interpretation, placing second in her event.

Other students who qualified for the regional meet included: Terron Talley and Renee Martin in spelling; Kristin Holland in literary criticism and feature writing; Christie Ichtertz in headline writing; Cody Simmons and Amy Renner in informative speaking and Jon Parker in persuasive speaking.

The Friona youngsters will compete in the regional UIL meet at Odessa College the weekend of April 23-24.

## FHS Play Few Tickets Are Still Available For Theater

Friona High School's UIL one-act play, "The Diviners," advanced as a winner of its district UIL competition, and then was selected as alternate to the regional level at the Area competition at Mulesoe.

In the district round, LaTawn White was named Best Actress; Brian Herring and Cliff Allmon were named to the all-star cast and Kristin Holland was named honorable mention, ASC.

At the area competition, Allmon was named to the all-star cast, and three other members were named honorable mention, ASC. They were Herring, Cody Simmons and Gerard Lafuente.

## Early Vote Dates Given For Election

Early voting is underway in the County Clerk's office in Farwell for the special election on May 1, when voters will make their choices for the U.S. Senator, as well as voting on the three proposed amendments to the state constitution.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren announced that an early voting day will be held in Bovina next Tuesday, April 20 at the City Hall.

On Thursday, April 22, an early voting booth will be conducted at Friona, Texas Federal Credit Union, for the convenience of voters in that area.

Early voting in the Parmer County Hospital District is also being conducted by the county clerk, rather than at the hospital, as stated last week.

Otherwise, the early voting continues for the school board and city council elections at both Bovina and Friona. Deadline for such voting will be Tuesday, April 27, and votes may be cast at the superintendent's office or city halls of either community.

Voters are reminded that anyone may participate in the early voting period, whether or not they plan to be absent on election day.

The city and school election is also scheduled for May 1.

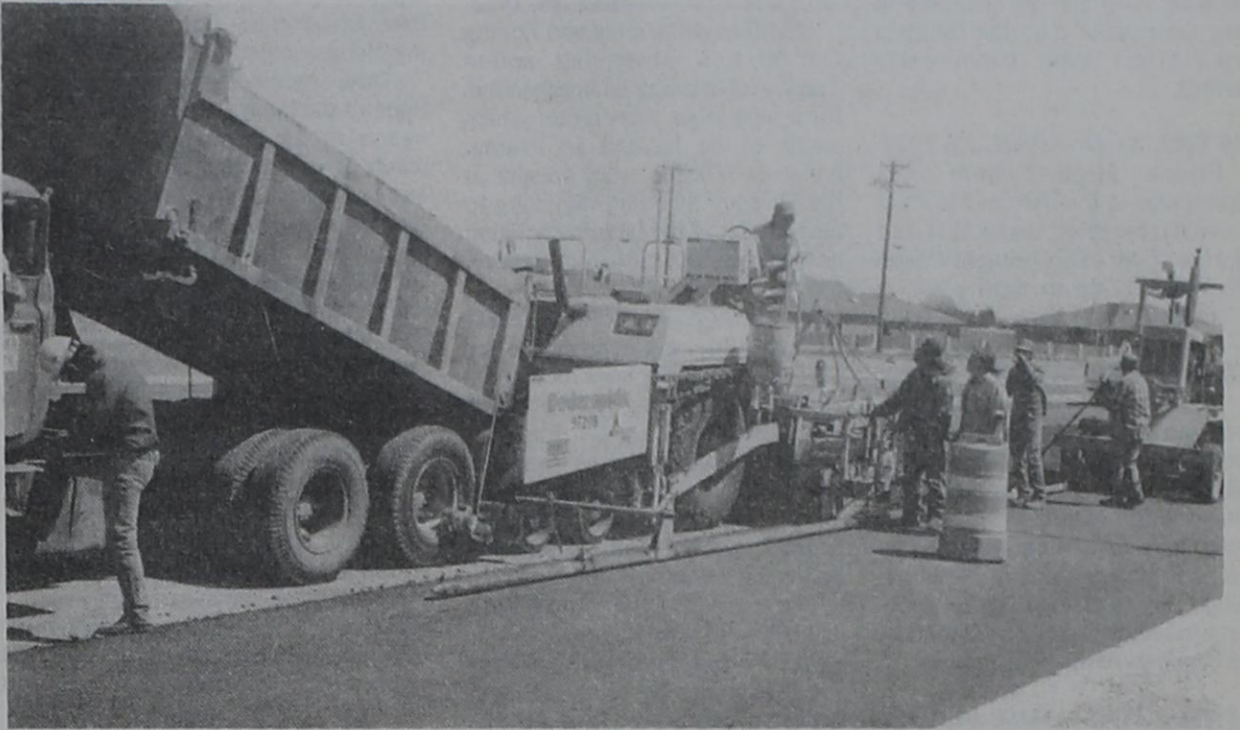
## Novelist Will Entertain At F.O.L. Meeting

Under "Antique and Restoration" in *St. Petersburg (Florida) Times*: "Figures and busts reduced. Sensational reduction of other things. Imported old bags at your own prices."

*Hile (Hawaii) Tribune-Herald*: "Wanted--3 men to help install electric unit and one office girl."

The publisher of the *Seminole (Oklahoma) Producer* ran an ad in the *Daily Oklahoman* for: "Reporter, male or female, must be able to READ and WRITE."

*Miami (Florida) Herald*: "LOST--Saturday night between 320 and 545 NW 29th Street, blue Japanese silk pajama bottom."

*Decatur (Illinois) Review*: "Wanted--Used Secretary in good condition."

*Montreal (Quebec) Star*: "Apartment wanted immediately by man expecting first baby."

*Merced (California) Sun Star*: "For Sale--Mattress, in use only a few weeks, and large diamond engagement ring."

## 65 YRS. AGO--APRIL 20, 1928

Wheat in the vicinity of Friona has reached the stage where its existence as a crop is a matter of days, and if rain does not come very soon, it is estimated that very little wheat will be grown here. Some farmers have already given up hope for their crop and are planning to turn their cattle onto the fields in order to get some pasture value from it.

## 55 YRS. AGO--APRIL 22, 1938

Friona High School was represented in the District Meet last Saturday by Price Brookfield and Martin Todd. This brought Friona High School up to third place in the meet.

## 50 YRS. AGO--APRIL 16, 1943

While on the streets recently, we met with the rumor that it is probable that our two modern cafes may close their doors to the public before long. Not from choice, but from necessity arising from the fact that their limited amount of "ration points" are not sufficient to allow them to secure enough food to meet the demands of their customers.

## 45 YRS. AGO--APRIL 16, 1948

About 150 businessmen and farmers assembled at the Grade School Auditorium, Wednesday night to hear the temporary board of directors make its report on the work so far accomplished toward the permanent organization of a Chamber of Commerce for Friona and community.

## 40 YRS. AGO--APRIL 16, 1953

With five schools participating in the District 10-B track meet at Friona last weekend, Friona took top honors with 74 points total, followed by Farwell with 39 points. Other schools entering were Bovina, Vega and Adrian.

## 35 YRS. AGO--APRIL 17, 1958

Winners of a "one" rating at the Junior Band Contests from the Friona Junior Band include Ira Parr, trombone; Brenda Deaton, clarinet; Bob Welch, cornet; Royce Douglas, French horn; Kay Coffey, flute; and Dianne Jennings, flute.

Nineteen citizens were present at the Tuesday meeting, objecting to the location of the labor association headquarters in their part of the city.

## 25 YRS. AGO--APRIL 18, 1968

Dedication and open house for Missouri Beef Packers' new \$3.5 million beef packing plant is slated here Saturday and Sunday. Cattleman Jay Taylor of Amarillo will deliver the address. On Sunday, the public open house will be held, with tours of the building between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m. We're printing the largest issue in history of the Friona Star this week (42 pages) to give a Texas sized welcome to Missouri Beef Packers. Since Mo. Beef has the largest single-shift packing plant in the world, we couldn't stop without producing our thickest paper ever.

## 20 YRS. AGO--APRIL 19, 1973

Friona High School Principal Raymond Cook has released the names of the three top students in the 1973 graduating class. Valedictorian is Darlene Harper, with a four year academic grade average of 96.35. Carol Reeve, is the 1973 salutatorian with a four year average of 95. Carl Evans is third place student at F.H.S. with a four year grade average of 93.33.

The Friona Star won four awards at the annual Panhandle Press Assn. convention last weekend in Amarillo. "Star Lites," the regular column written each week by publisher Bill Ellis, won the first place plaque in the column writing division of the annual newspaper contest. Other awards won were the second place citation in the Best Special Edition category; and third place awards in "Best News Pictures" and "General Excellence."

## 15 YRS. AGO--APRIL 23, 1978

Officials of St. Teresa's Catholic Church have announced plans for a new auditorium to be constructed on the church property. Cost of the new building is to be around \$160,000.

## 10 YRS. AGO--APRIL 17, 1983

The Friona High School Chieftain Band won the Sweepstakes award following the UIL sight reading and concert competition last Friday in Dimmitt. It had earlier received a first division rating in the UIL marching competition last fall.

Three members of the Friona Squaws track team qualified for six events in the regional meet as a result of the district meet at Tulia last Saturday. Sherry O'Brian won the 400-meter dash in 61.7 and the high jump at 4-10. Wennetter Jackson won the shot put at 38-4, and discus at 108-1. Diane Johnston was second in the high jump and second in the 200-meter dash.

## 5 YRS. AGO--APRIL 16, 1988

The City of Friona was hit with a power outage that lasted almost two hours late last Friday, April 9. A raccoon apparently caused a short-circuit at the sub-station just south of Friona when he crawled from one insulator to another and touched both insulators.

## Funeral Services Held For Billie Sudderth

Funeral services for W.M. (Billie) Sudderth, 76, were conducted from the First United Methodist Church at 2:30 p.m., Saturday, April 10, with Rev. Steve Venable, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Sudderth, who was born at Leonard, Texas, moved to the Bovina area with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Lee H. Sudderth, in 1921, died at St. Mary's of the Plains Hospital in Lubbock, Thursday, April 8.

He was married to Obereta West on December 19, 1934, in Clovis, New Mexico.

During World War II, Sudderth served in the United States Navy. He was a Seabee and served as the Parmer County Veteran's Service Officer following his discharge.

He was a farmer and rancher and was involved in many civic, community and church activities. He was a member of First United Methodist Church and the Methodist Men's organization. He was also a member of the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and was named "Man of the Year" in 1968.

In 1959, he had the distinction

of being chosen as DeKalb's Corn Growing State Champion. He has also served as a city commissioner and a member of the local school board.

His interest in the young people of the community was shown by his willingness to sponsor Little League Baseball teams and to work with the local Boy Scouts.

Survivors include his wife, Obereta, of the home; two sons, Glenden Sudderth of Bovina and Ronnie Sudderth of Springtown; three brothers, Sam Sudderth of Shawnee, Oklahoma, Don Sudderth of Alamogordo, New Mexico and Melvin Sudderth of Palm Springs, California; and two sisters, Ruth Redden of Canyon and Frances Hodges of Happy.

Eight grandchildren and five great-grandchildren also survive.

Active pallbearers were Daryl Kirkpatrick, Kregg Wilson, Greg Bell, Larry Mitchell, Roy Hartzog and Dennis Willard.

Honorary pallbearers were all of his many friends.

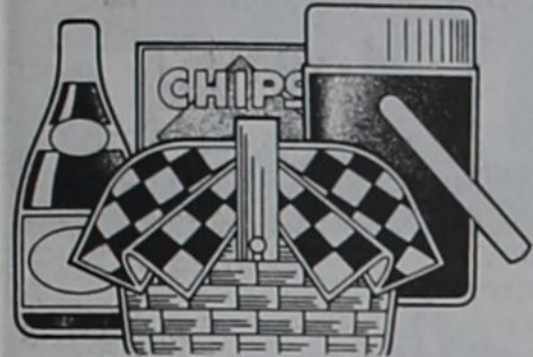

# Picknicking: Favorite Summertime Activity

One of our favorite summertime activities is to pack a couple of sandwiches, some potato chips and some soft drinks and have lunch in a park. While everyone else is standing in line or sitting in a busy restaurant, we're enjoying a pleasant lunch on a picnic bench watching the ducks play in the playsa lake.

Picnics give everyone a break from stuffy, structured indoor meals. Of course, in West Texas, high winds and blowing dust can add a bit too much grit to an outdoor meal.

Picnics are perfect for post-Little League games and sunny weekend afternoons. An outdoor meal can be as simple as sandwiches prepared at home, or it can be more complicated, including fried chicken and potato salad or grilled hot dogs.

Although wicker baskets are pretty and fit into the picture of a romantic picnics, they aren't too practical when it comes to keeping the food safe to eat. Insulated containers are best for keeping hot foods hot and cold foods cold.

Try the following recipes on your next picnic:

### HOBO SANDWICHES

- 3 cups torn lettuce leaves
- 3/4 cups chopped tomatoes
- 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
- 1/4 cup Italian dressing
- 6 slices Swiss cheese.

- 6 slices Cheddar cheese
- 6 individual French bread loaves
- 6 slices salami, quartered

Toss lettuce, tomatoes, eggs and dressing. Cut cheese into triangles. Cut bread lengthwise and split. Spread bottom half of bread with salad mixture, top with meat and cheese. Onions and olive slices are optional. Wrap sandwiches in foil and keep cool until ready to serve. Makes 6 servings.

### NEW POTATO SALAD

- 1-1/2 pounds small new potatoes
- 1 package (1.3-ounces) Italian dressing mix
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
- 3 tablespoons minced green onions
- 3 tablespoons minced fresh parsley
- 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento
- Leaf lettuce

Cook potatoes in boiling water for 10 to 15 minutes or until tender; drain and cool. Cut potatoes into 1/4-inch slices; layer in a shallow serving dish. Prepare salad dressing mix according to package directions; combine dressing, celery, green onions, parsley and pimientos. Pour mixture evenly over the potatoes; cover and chill the salad thoroughly. Keep chilled until ready to serve. Makes 6 servings.

### CHILI BEAN CASSEROLE

- 3 tablespoons oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 carrot, shredded

- 1 clove garlic, mashed
- 1-16 ounce can stewed tomatoes
- 1-16 ounce can red kidney beans, drained

- 1-16 ounce can pinto beans, drained
- 1-10 ounce package frozen cut green beans
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon liquid red pepper sauce
- 1 to 2 tablespoons chili powder, to taste

Heat oil in a large skillet, saute onion, carrot and garlic until tender but not brown. Add remaining ingredients, simmer over low heat for about 20 minutes. Taste and adjust seasonings. Keep warm until ready to serve. Makes 6 servings.

### TURKEY SALAD

- 2/3 cups mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 2 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 to 5 cups cut-up cooked turkey
- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1 cup minced green pepper
- 2 teaspoons grated onion
- 4 pita pockets, cut in half

In a large bowl, combine mayonnaise, vinegar and salt. Add chicken and remaining ingredients except pita pockets. Toss well. Cover and keep chilled until ready to serve. To serve, stuff 1/8 of the salad into each pita pocket half.

### PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup softened shortening
- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2-1/2 cups flour

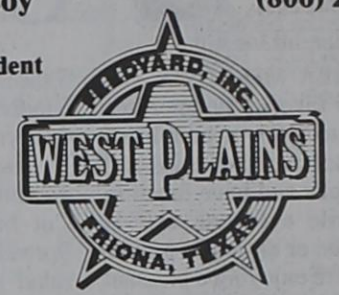

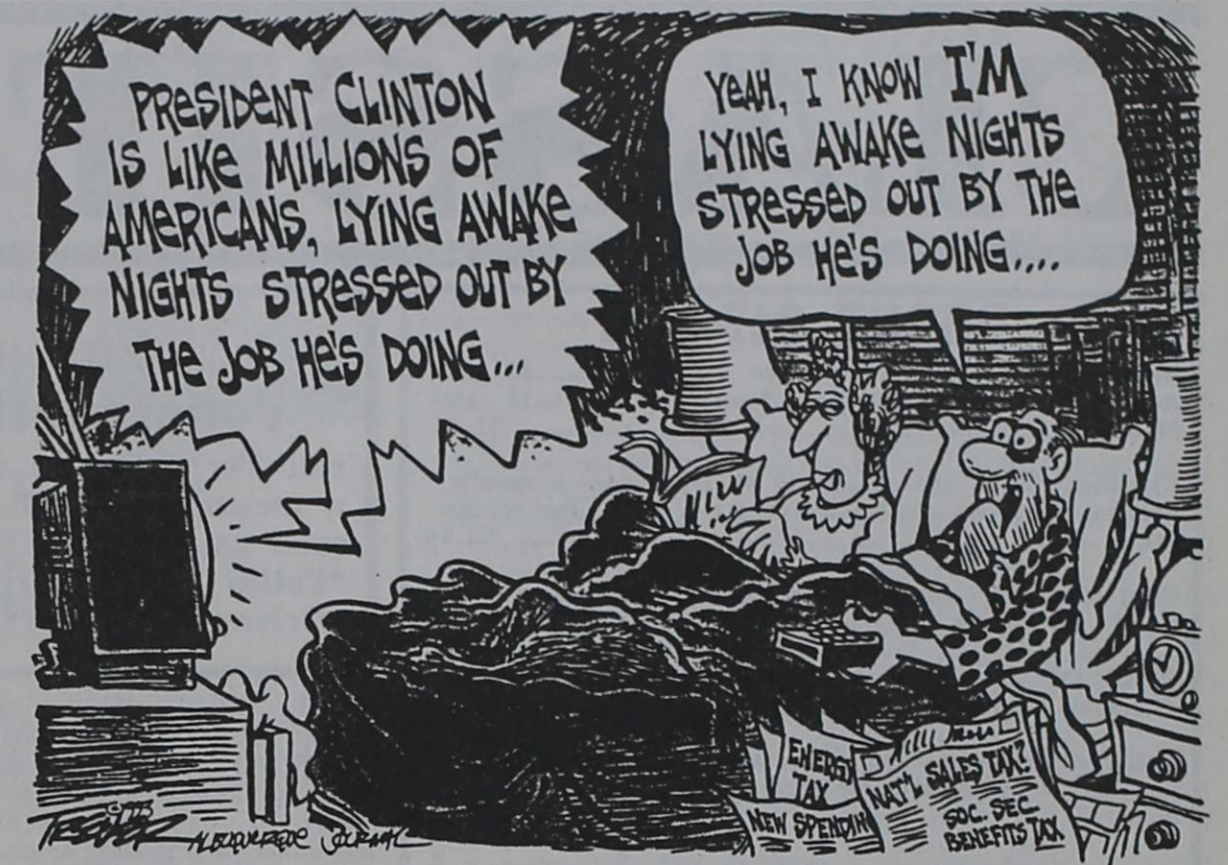

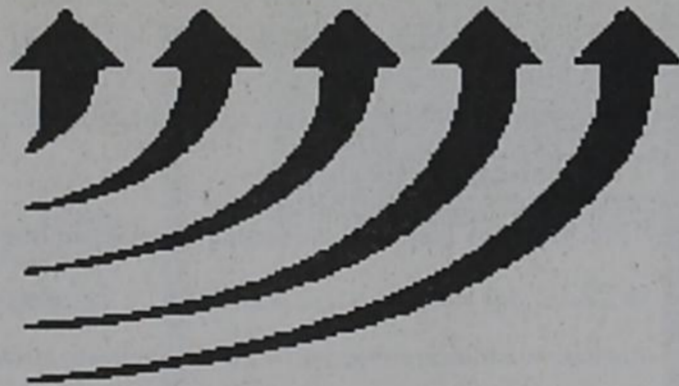

## Famous Landmarks Of The American Revolution

### CAMDEN: A Battle Is Lost But The War Is Won

The Revolutionary War immediately brings landmarks like Lexington, Concord and Yorktown to mind. These were sites of great victories for the Continental Army. However, people should also know about a less famous battle which was fought at Camden, South Carolina, because it could have ended the Patriot's beautiful dream for independence. But, it didn't because of all the people who lived and died to make the dream come true.

People like the nearly one-thousand courageous men who died in the Camden battle on August 16, 1780. More Patriots died in this battle than in any other Revolutionary War battle. The soldiers were not well trained and were hurried into the battle where

the British led by Cornwallis attacked them by surprise.

Another important person in the Camden battle was Johann Kalb, who was formerly a spy from France. He became so impressed with ideas of freedom, that he deserted France and joined the Continental Army. Soon, because of his dedication and skill, he was made a general. In the battle at Camden, he would not retreat until he received orders from Horatio Gates, the officer in command. He did not realize that Gates had left the battle hours earlier. Johann Kalb finally fell after receiving eleven wounds. This brave, foreign soldier died from these wounds three days later. His dedication was very motivating to the other soldiers who heard about him. He encouraged them to fight for their ideals of freedom at all costs.

Camden became a fortress for British commanders, weapons, and ammunition. A luxurious home was taken over to become Cornwallis's quarters.

The battle at Camden was a turning point because it helped to convince the leaders to seek a new commander. Major General Nathanael Greene was made officer in command. He was a great choice as the Continental Army lost no further battles under his guidance.

Today, some of the sites around the battlefield are still standing. The foundations of the old church, the Cornwallis house, and Johann Kalb's grave. Other historical places to visit include models of authentic log homes, exhibits and a museum. The Camden area is considered a rare example of a historical restoration done very well by the proud local citizens, many who are descendents of soldiers who died there.

Like so many stories in American history, it was the people, their ideas, strength, and courage which made the winning difference. Even though the Patriots lost the battle at Camden, they did not quit or give up. It inspired them to try even harder. In little more than a year, the surrender at Yorktown occurred. The war was won! A war which has shown

people around the world that independence is possible. Historical landmarks like the battlefield near Camden serve as reminders of battles that were lost and won and the hundreds of people who lived and died to build America.

### About Tears

For most of us, tears are just "there," unnoticed until they annoy us on a windy day or embarrass us at emotional times. But tears actually perform a vital function.

Tears are the salty, natural fluid that washes away most of the dust particles that enter the eyes. As the eyelids blink some 12 to 30 times a minute, tears clean the eyes thousands of times a day. The fluid has also certain bacteria-inhibiting substances.

When there are too many tears, they flow from the eyes through tiny ducts in the inside corners. Some of the fluid escapes through the nose; that's why the nose runs when we cry.

Some people don't have enough tears; this "dry eye" condition is very uncomfortable, but may be compensated to some extent by "artificial tears" drops. Contact lens wearers, too, may need drops to supplement natural tears and use a sterile solution when inserting lenses to avoid discomfort.

## Alternatives for Retirement Income

Many investors who are preparing to retire with a large sum of money in a company pension plan need advice on how to invest their distribution and begin receiving monthly income.

Of course, it's impossible to provide a blanket recommendation because there are so many factors that go into any investment advice. For example, the age of the retiree and spouse, company retirement options, amount of the distribution, eligibility for rollover, amount of income needed, other retirement income and estate concerns are only a few issues that should be considered.

One investment that many retirees consider is the single premium immediate annuity (SPIA). With this investment, the investor receives a fixed monthly income for his or her lifetime. If the annuity holder passes away before his or her spouse, the benefits continue to the spouse. After the death of both parties, or a pre-set number of payments, the income ceases.

Because the payments on SPIAs are fixed, inflation should be a consideration for investors. For example, a male age 62 can expect to live an average of another 16.9 years and a female another 20.3 years. Even if inflation continues at a current annual rate of four percent to five percent, the fixed monthly income will lose about half of its buying power over that

period. What is another option? Systematic monthly withdrawals from an established mutual fund. This can offer similar benefits, although there are no guarantees. Several different mutual funds recently provided hypothetical illustrations of a \$100,000 investment with all dividends and capital gains reinvested, and with systematic monthly withdrawals of \$666.67 (eight percent of the total investment).

Each fund tracked results for every 12-year period of its existence. The chart illustrates the best, medium and worst results. The "medium" performance of all the funds surveyed ended their respective withdrawal periods with considerably more value. This means retirees could select to increase income if needed. Although past performance is not an indication of the future, the results cover a long enough span of changing economic conditions to evaluate the risk. Also, if a fund is not performing as expected, you can change your plans.

Of course, SPIAs and systematic withdrawals from a mutual fund are just two alternatives for successful retirement planning. Before committing to any single alternative, explore your options and understand the guarantees, risks and opportunities. Retirement planning is one of the most important financial decisions you will make. Your plan should be designed specifically for you.

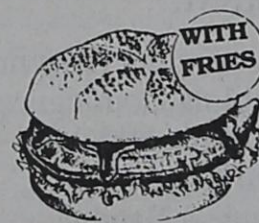
