

In their Pacific ocean war, too, the people must keep in mind that it is the people themselves who have not permitted our navy to properly prepare to protect the outlying possessions, the Guams and the Wake islands, that dot the Pacific, and that will be vulnerable to the Japanese attacks. Three years ago, we must recall, the president and the navy made all preparations to prepare at Guam, but the Congress, answering the demand from peace-loving and appeasing farms and cities all over the country, turned thumbs down. We'll pay a heavy price in boys and ships and guns. But whatever the price it must be gone through with. We are on a war basis now. All our living of every kind must turn itself to that and nothing else until the job is done.

Grounding of private planes all over the country became effective with an executive order from the commander in chief Sunday. No escapes from American soil have been permitted, no unauthorized pictures from the air. Presumably the private flyers and flying clubs over the country will be authorized to resume flying when their identity is thoroughly established and when they have been sworn to observe the rules.
