**AT THE MEETING** in Bovina last Thursday night where area farmers were hosted by officials of American Agriculture plugging for the Political Action Committee, there were some good statements made by the various speakers.

Marvin Meeks, the national chairman for American Agriculture, said he is having trouble deciding to which political party he belongs.

"When Carter was in office and started the grain embargo, I was sure I was a Republican. Reagan promised us improvements, but he hasn't delivered, so now I'm not so sure. I have about decided to start my own political party—but I won't let anyone else in, or they'll mess it up," Meeks quipped.

The AAM official pointed out that one reason that things change very little from one administration to another is the entrenched bureaucracy. "You don't lose the bureaucrats with a change of administration," he said.

Meeks drew a round of applause when he said "We need the president to announce that there will never be another embargo. All they would have to do is put a \$3.00 penalty on all grain sold to the Russians. Is this solution too simple for them to grasp?" he asked.

The Plainview farmer said "We've got to solve the problems of agriculture—because the country is depending on it."

Referring to the fact that farmers are the largest consumer group in America, Meeks said he wondered why the "yo-yos" in Washington could not figure out that this was a big part of the problem being experienced in Detroit and the other industrial centers.

"Do you know how many tires the farmers buy each year (or would buy if they were able)?" the speaker asked.

**OF COURSE**, he is in the business to get along with legislators, but Dick White, the vice president of Martin, Ryan & Haley, public relations firm, was highly complimentary of our area's legislators, such as Bill Clayton and Pete Laney.

"A lot of people don't have the quality of representation in the (U.S.) Senate as you have had here in your state legislature. I have been very impressed by the leadership you have here in West Texas," White said.

White also complimented Ralph Roming, the field coordinator for American Agriculture, on his work on behalf of the farmers. "I know it's tough to be a hero in your home town, but it's a pleasure for me to be in Ralph's home town," said the Washington-based official.

White's company is the oldest in the world which is related to government relations.

The leaders for forming the Political Action Committee (PAC) say they have had a number of meetings, all the way from Michigan and Illinois to Arkansas and Tennessee. The night after the Bovina meeting, a similar one was held in Dumas.

"The PAC will work. It's catching on. It's the whole key to your situation," White said.

## Teams Score Well In Track & Field Meets

Mike Neill was a double winner and missed a third first place by a hair in the Friona Chieftains' first track and field meet of the season at Panhandle last Saturday.

Neill's 28-point performance paced the team to fourth place and 46 points in the meet.

The Chieftain junior won the long jump with a leap of 20 feet, four inches, and the 110-yard high hurdles in 15.5. He was edged out for the gold medal in the high jump, although his 6-1 jump equalled that of the first-place winner, Todd Miller of River Road. The Wildcat jumper won the top spot on fewer misses.

Other point-winners for the Chieftains were Robert Osborn, fourth in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles in 41.4; Nelson Jackson, fourth in the 200-meter run in 23.9; Rich Malouf, fifth in the 800-meter run in 2:10.9, and the 1600-meter relay team, fourth in the time of 3:36.3.

Members of the relay team are Osborn, Jackson, Eloy Caballero and Robert Caballero.

River Road won the meet with 122 points, followed by Panhandle with 118 and Boys Ranch with 64.

In the girls' division, the Squaws were runners-up with 65 points.

Friona got first-place performances from Rene Noland in the triple jump with a leap of 33-3 and Wennetter Jackson in the shot put with a throw of 30-4 1/2.

Sherry O'Brian was third in the 400-meter run in 62.9 and also took third in the high jump at 4-10.

Nikki Osborn was third in the 1600 meter run in 6:24.3, and Miss Noland was sixth in the long jump at 15 feet.

The Squaws' mile relay foursome (Noland, O'Brian, Diane Johnston and Shawn Osborn) placed third with the time of 4:22.7. Friona's 800-meter relay team (DeAnn Harguess, Diane Johnston, Judy McLellan and Stephanie Lane) also placed third with the time of 1:57.2.

The team's 400-meter relay foursome (O'Brian, Lane, Cara Brockman and McLellan) was fifth in the time of 54.1.

## Bovina Honors Its Leading Citizens

**BOVINA**--The community's outstanding citizens were honored at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet Thursday night at the Bovina Schools Cafeteria.

Don Spring, a former Friona resident, was named Man of the Year, and Ola Lee Jones was selected as Woman of the Year.

Janie Sudderth was selected as Teacher of the Year, and the outstanding youths selected were Wendy Sherrill and Charlie Trimble.

Spring is a Bovina product, going through school there. He attended Texas Tech and Southwestern State College (Okla.). He moved back to Bovina in 1968 and started his own business, a pharmacy.

He has served as Chamber of Commerce president; on the Bovina City Council; Bovina Clinic Board and on the city's doctor procurement committee.

He currently serves on the Bovina Ambulance Service, the Bovina Lions Club, Housing Authority and Parmer County Child Welfare Board. He teaches a young adult Sunday School class at Friona's Union Congregational Church.

Mrs. Jones is a member of the clinic board, the Church of Christ, the 39er Club, and has been a Chamber director. Known for her cooking prowess, she shares her dishes as chairman of the committee to take meals to the sick and bereaved of her church.

She and her husband Paul have been in the service station business in Bovina since 1945.

The speaker and entertainer for the banquet, Bunny Martin, intrigued the

crowd with his slight-of-hand tricks and expertise with yo-yos. He is known as the national yo-yo champion.

In his more serious moments, he told the crowd "Lives are shaped by words," and urged those attending the banquet to find a slogan they could hitch their lives to.

Among some of the important slogans which have been made popular, he quoted the following examples: (Six words) "Find a need and fill it," Henry J. Kaiser; (five words) "Today Germany, tomorrow the world," Adolph Hitler; (three words) "Duz does everything!" popular advertising slogan; and (two words) "Do it."

"Most of us need to apply this last slogan to our lives," he concluded.

Preliminaries begin at 10:30 a.m. with the girls 100-meter hurdles. Finals of the boys and girls' 3200-meter run start at 12:15 and 12:35.

Other finals start at 2:30 p.m. with the 400-meter relay, and are scheduled to finish at 4:30 with the 1600-meter relay. There will be no prelims for the relays.

From 1942 to 1945, over 15,000 Jewish children passed through Terezin, a former military garrison set up as a ghetto. It soon became a station for hundreds of thousands on their way to Auschwitz.

When Terezin was liberated in May of 1945, only 100 children were left alive to return to what remained of their homes and families.

The story of those years at Terezin lives in drawings and poetry collected and published in the book, "I Never Saw Another Butterfly." The play is an imaginative creation of one child who was liberated, Raja Englanderova.

The material for the play was taken from letters, diaries, journals, drawings and pictures. The setting is in Prague, Terezin, Czechoslovakia, 1942-45.

Joey Howard is stage manager for the production. Patti Hinton is in charge of sound, and Sunny Horton is in charge of lights.

Costumes and props are under the supervision of Sheri Dodson, Tory Taylor, Ricky Barnett, Kim Tucker, Julie Wilshire and Matt Osborn.

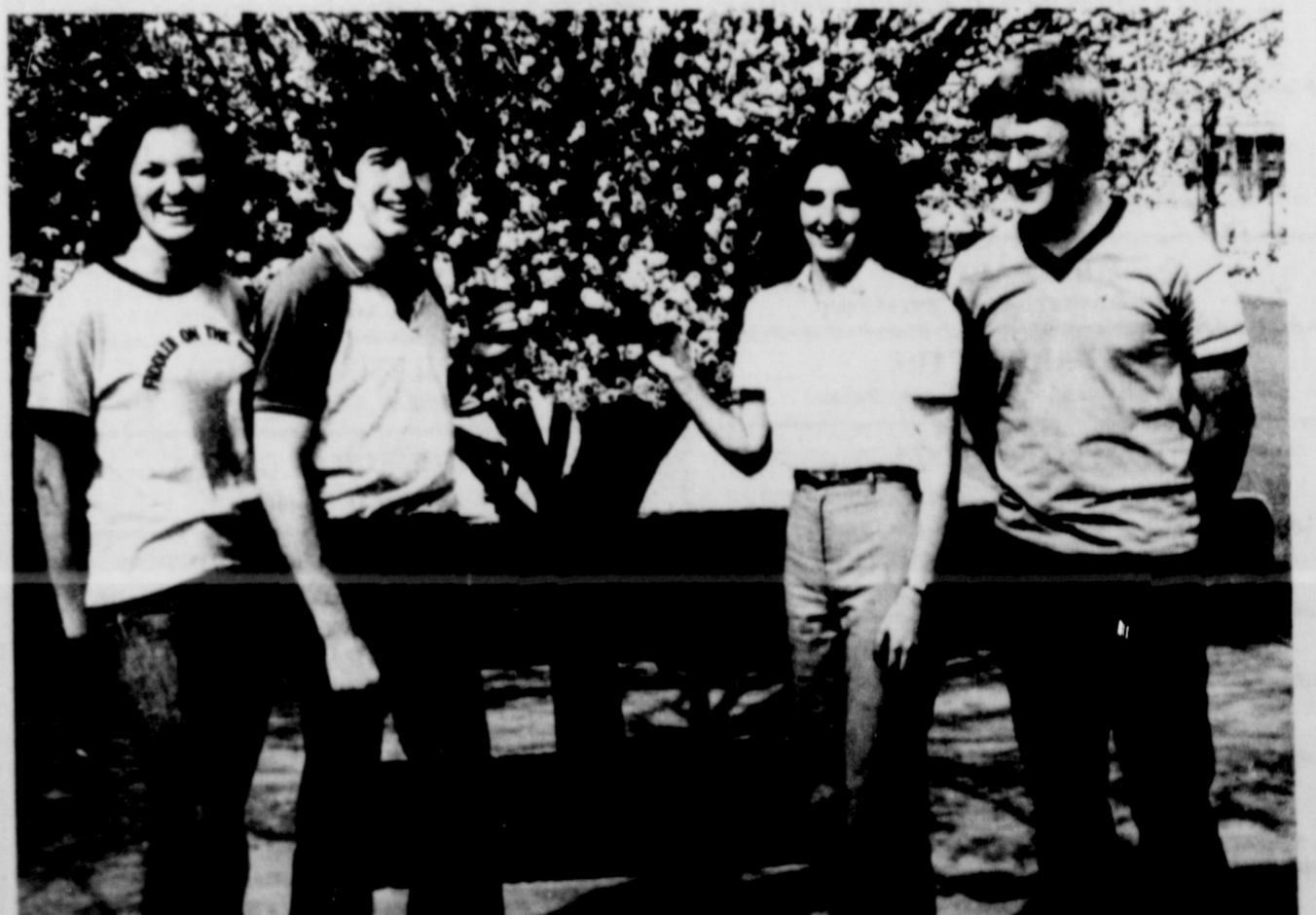

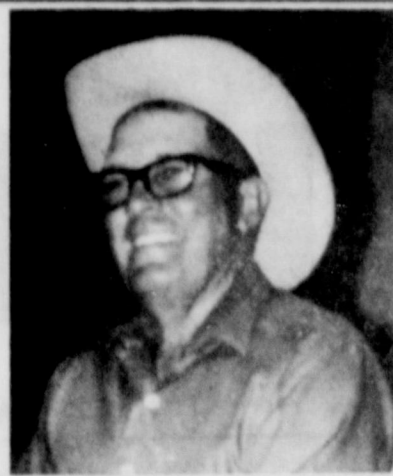
### Soil and Water Conservation

It is important that we conserve our soil and water so that we can raise the food the world needs. The Soil and Water Conservation District helps a great deal in this area. Even though the world population is increasing about seventy-five million each year, the land we have is not going to expand. So we must use what we have wisely.

More than half of Texas' total agricultural crop value is produced utilizing ground water for irrigation, mainly from the Ogallala Aquifer on the High Plains. The Parmer County underground water table, situated in this same aquifer, is dropping several feet each year.

There are several things I think we could consider doing to practice conservation. One of these is to rotate crops. Since a national inventory showed that more and more soil is being lost each year by wind erosion we need to keep barren land plowed so the soil will not blow as bad. We should also use pivot sprinkler systems to retain excess water for future use.

Regardless of how well we conserve our soil, land in this area will not be fully productive unless we practice good conservation methods. The top six inches of soil is the most productive, so we need to conserve it.

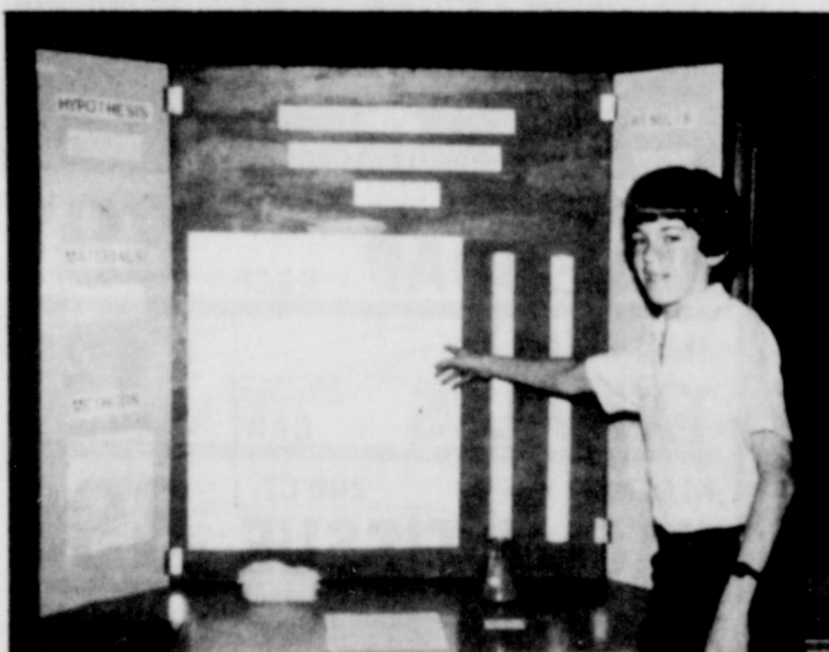

# TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS.

**Don't overpay your Property Taxes.**

The Texas property tax system provides certain rights and remedies for property owners. The law also offers tax relief measures to qualified taxpayers. But they do not go into effect automatically; you must apply for them by May 1. To help you understand your rights as a taxpayer, the State Property Tax Board has prepared a free pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, available from your new county appraisal district or local tax office. The publication will help you understand the types of exemptions that are available and what you must do to obtain them if you qualify.

**Redemption**  
One way to assert your rights as a taxpayer is to render your property. This means filing out a redemption statement at the appraisal district office, telling tax officials what you believe the value of your property should be. When you render, the appraisal district or appraisal review board must officially notify you if the value of your property is increased over the amount you rendered.

**General Homestead Exemption**  
If you qualify for a residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the appraised value of your home for school tax purposes, and a \$3,000 exemption for the portion of county taxes levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control. Some jurisdictions may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead.

**Exemptions for the Elderly**  
If you are 65 or over, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the appraised value of your residence homestead for school taxes. And, when you apply and qualify for this exemption, the school tax bill cannot increase on your home, unless you make additions or improvements to it.

**Disabled**  
If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are

entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the appraised value of your home for school taxes. Other taxing jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions. All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.

**Farmers and Ranchers**  
If you qualify, your agricultural or open-space land may be taxed at its productivity value instead of market value. Certain farming implements and machines may also qualify for exemption.

Tax exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications should be made this year before May 1 to your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax offices to find out where to apply for tax relief.

While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rests on the taxpayer. You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights and access to remedies as a taxpayer by applying for exemptions and rendering your property before May 1.

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# F. Hinksons Recognized Nationally

Frank and Marilyn Hinkson, Friona, have been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having registered Angus cows qualified to be listed in the Association's 1982 Pathfinder Recognition Report.

The Pathfinder Program identifies superior Angus females in the breed based upon economically important production traits including regularity of calving and weaning weight, according to Dick Spader, executive vice president. Angus cows with superior performance records are listed in a Pathfinder Report published annually by the American Angus Association, with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

To qualify a breeder must have had his herd actively enrolled in the Association's Angus Herd Improvement Records Program. In order to be listed in the Pathfinder report a cow must produce a calf at a young age and continue to wean a heavy calf on an average of every 12 months. Each calf must have a weaning weight ratio of 105 or higher with at least 10 herdmates evaluated each year. A minimum of three calves is required for a cow to be listed in the report.

In the 1982 Pathfinder Report a total of 2,900 cows are listed. That represents less than one per cent of 300,000 head reviewed for publication. In addition a total of 80 bulls that have sired five or more Pathfinder cows in the report are listed in a Sire Summary.

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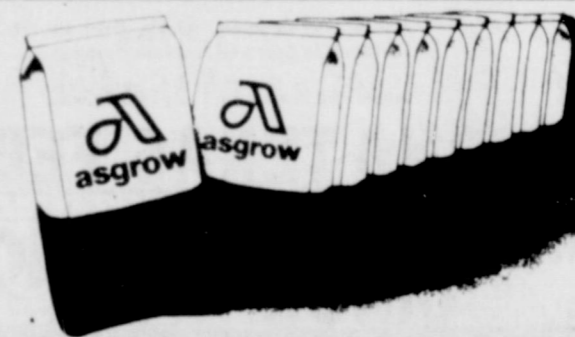

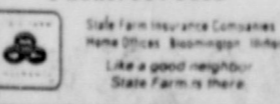

The Reed family moved from the Starr Ranch to a farm 3 1/2 miles north of Friona, which later belonged to the late Mr. and Mrs. M.A. Black, in 1925.

As was the custom in those days, Bud was needed to assist in the care of livestock and do farm work and he missed so many days of school that he got behind and soon lost interest in attending at all.

From the time he was about fifteen, he spent a great deal of time taking care of cattle on the ranch while his dad broke sod and made a crop north of town.

Juanita, the oldest child of the late Ed and Bessie Boggess, moved to a farm south of Friona from Woodward County, Oklahoma in 1927.

She attended Friona school and at the end of the 1931 term, she lacked one credit having enough to qualify for graduation.

She and Bud were married August 16 of that year in Portales, New Mexico. She said, "My parents and other interested adults advised me to go to school that fall, but I didn't want to and didn't realize the importance of education at the time."

The Reeds farmed and raised livestock in the Friona area and had three children, Ralph Raymond, Patsy and Roberta, who grew up and attended school here. Ralph Raymond and Patsy are both

graduates of Friona High School.

Roberta, who is better known as "Bertie," was married to Gene Watson and quit school before she graduated. Patsy was married to Eugene Bandy before she graduated, but attended school and was a member of the 1953 graduating class.

She and Eugene have lived on a farm south of town most of their married life and have four sons, Johnny, Clay, Chad and Todd.

Johnny and his wife, Carla, live in Terrell, Texas. Clay and his wife, Pamela, and their son, Joseph Ryan, live on a farm near his parents. Chad lives in Lubbock, and Todd and his wife, Lori, live in Tucson, Arizona.

Ralph Raymond and his wife, the former Mary Skeen, also live here. They have two sons, Max and David, who are at home; two daughters, Mona, who is married to Donny Campbell; and Jeannette, who is married to Garvin Thorn.

Mona and Donny and their two children, Michael and Rebecca, live here and Jeannette and Garvin live in the Lazbuddie Community.

Bertie and Gene lived in Pampa and had five children before they were divorced several years ago. She later married Bill Klapper and they still live in Pampa.

Her children are Tommy, Kathy, Regina, Bobby and Douglas. Tommy

and his wife and two children, Regina Carnes and her two children and Douglas and his wife and daughter also live in Pampa.

Kathy and her husband, Tim Dossey and two children live in Tulsa, Oklahoma; and Bobby and his wife and two children live in Briscoe, Texas.

Since 1980, when Bud and Juanita sold Reed's Cleaners to Henry and Cleo Gauna, they have spent most of their time at home. They visit their out-of-town children and grandchildren occasionally and do some fishing.

The Reeds attended Friona United Methodist Church and Rebekah Lodge. Bud is an Oddfellow and Juanita is a long time member of Friona Woman's Club.

Bud concluded the interview by saying, "There was a time when I had no trouble looking around and finding someone who had been here longer than I had, but that situation has changed and it is getting harder and harder."

As we were discussing club membership, Juanita remarked, "I have been a member more than 40 years."

The couple agreed that Friona is a wonderful place to live and that they feel privileged to be a part of such a fine community.
