

Dedication Week Of Methodists Begins Sunday

Methodists of Floydada will join in a country-wide observance of a Week of Dedication, beginning next Sunday, February 28, in which nearly 8,000,000 members of the denomination will be asked to pledge a "new dedication of self, service and substance" in meeting the challenges and needs of a war-torn world.

Rev. Phil H. Gates, pastor of the First Methodist church, is issuing a call for all members to attend services on the next two Sundays to make personal commitments.

He is strongly urging that all Methodists in the community take an active part in the Community-wide revival which gets under way simultaneously with the opening of Dedication week. Community-wide services will be held each morning at the First Christian church.

Culmination of next week's special services, and of two months of preparations will come on Sunday, March 7, when personal commitments will be made and a voluntary, sacrificial offering will be taken to aid in meeting war-time emergency needs of the church.

The Methodist Council of Bishops and the General Commission on World Service and Finance, in joint session last August, approved plans for the Week of Dedication, and expressed the hope that more than a million dollars would be contributed for the various causes which demand immediate financial aid.

Bishop Ernest Lynn Waldorf of Chicago, chairman of a special committee, enumerated the emergency needs to benefit from the offering as follows: spiritual services for men in the armed services; religious work among families in industrial defense areas; relief for war refugees; aid to chaplains in the Army, Navy and Marine Corps; expansion of missionary work in Latin America; evacuating and re-establishing foreign missionaries; building churches in defense areas, and aid to Methodist schools.

"To challenge present-day threats of barbarism, paganism and materialism," declared Rev. Gates, "we must have a new spiritual power of Christian faith and idealism. It is our hope that this will be sought by Methodists during the Week of Dedication."

"Every member of our church can join in this vast effort—strong laymen, humble people, shut-ins, youth, little children, aged folks—all those who wish to help build a better world."

Methodists Answer War Need In Three-Fold Dedication



Across the nation in 42,000 Methodist churches during the Week of Dedication, February 28 to March 7, eight million members of the denomination will be called by their bishops and pastors to rededication of "self, service and substance." Spiritual emphasis will be climaxed in a sacrificial offering on Sunday, March 7, which will be used to meet emergency war needs of providing Christian ministry or financial aid to men of the armed forces, "uprooted families" in industrial defense areas, refugees in war-torn countries, evacuated foreign missionaries, churches and schools in Latin America, and other projects created by wartime conditions.

Marshall Formby Office At Austin Open All Time

Senator Marshall Formby of the important Finance Committee, and 13 other Committees in the State Senate. He holds one Chairmanship and one Vice-Chairmanship.

Formby was County Judge of Dickens county before entering the senate in 1941. He owns a farm at McAdoo where he was reared and also is publisher of The Plainview Tribune.

War Manpower Interviewer Due Again Friday

Miss Louise Lomax, a representative of the War Manpower Commission, will be in Floydada again on Friday, February 26, at 1 p. m. when she will interview those interested in war industry training. She will hold interviews in the courthouse.

The government is offering instruction in welding, sheet metal work, machine tool operation and radio installation, providing board and room, work clothing and paying \$10.80 per month to trainees in NYA-operated centers.

Training is open to girls 17 to 24 years of age and to boys 16 to 24, provided those over 18 have a selective service deferment. On completing 6 to 12 weeks of training, boys and girls go to jobs in shipyards, flying fields and aircraft plants starting at \$25.00 to \$40.00 per week.

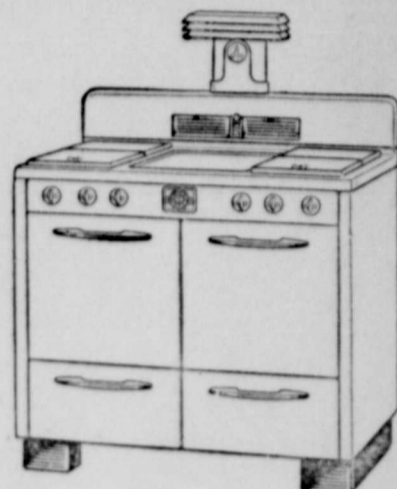

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Several families also produce turkeys, sheep and beef cattle and all plan increased production in these also. They plan to can 548 quarts of food per family and since the families average 4 persons per family this is 137 quarts per person. They also plan to store 12 bushels of food per family, besides planning to use 520 lbs. of home grown meats per family which is 2 1/2 lbs. per person per week; 127 dozen eggs per family and 632 gallon of milk per family. This is a 43 percent increase in the use of home grown meats; 1 percent increase in the use of eggs and 14 percent increase in the use of milk.

"Finger Of Earth" Inspired By Life On Peninsula Wins Acclaim For Violet West Sone



Inspired by life on a peninsula in South Texas, where she taught school for six years, Violet West Sone writes "Finger of Earth." Accepted first as a master's thesis at the University of Texas in August, 1942, it was one of the first manuscripts to be submitted under the university's new project to allow creative writing as a thesis. A former resident of Floydada, Mrs. Sone now resides at Corpus Christi with her husband and two children.

Accepted first as a master's thesis at the University of Texas in August, 1942, it was one of the first manuscripts to be submitted under the University's new project to allow creative writing as a thesis.

A Corpus Christi critic has said of Mrs. Sone's book of verse "It is fascinating from several standpoints. Her style is as fresh as crisp green lettuce leaf and the data which she has incriminated in her description of Live Oak Peninsula is as interesting as the region which she describes."

"Even if 'Finger of Earth' had not been so excellently conceived and written, it would merit the attention of all who profess an interest in current trends."

Mrs. Sone writes of a tract of land, a body of water and a chain of wind-swept trees with much the same devotion-sometimes tender sometimes passionate, ever loving which a mother shows her child.

She went to Rockport six years ago as a teacher of English and librarian in the high school, and it was there she made the acquaintance of Live Oak Peninsula. Says she in her foreword, "As for Live Oak Peninsula, 'Finger of Earth,' I have held it in my hand and looked at it, in my heart and loved it; now I give it to you—my home-land."
