County Council Elects Delegates To District Meet

Miss Wilson announced that a member of the dehydrating plant at Plainview had visited the county recently and told her that potatoes and carrots would be the only things dehydrated this year and tomatoes would be canned.

The best variety of sweet potatoes for the dehydrating purpose the visitor said was Maryland sweet; and for tomatoes to can he said Rutgers was a good variety.

Some planting suggestions were given as follows: For carrots have soil very loose and plant on slight ridge; 1 pound of tomato seed is enough for 12 to 15 acres, and should be planted in rich soil, old feed lot would be ideal. Tomatoes should be planted in April and transplanted in May.

Five bushels of sweet potatoes were given as about the proper amount to supply slips for an acre of ground. Irish cobbler was given as the best variety for Irish potatoes and should be irrigated often when potatoes are very small.

The Year Book committee reported sufficient funds to finish paying for books. The finance committee reported the budget the same as for last year with the exception of \$5.00 for council dues. Prior to this year the dues have been \$2.50 for the past several years.

College Training Offered Youths By Army-Navy

College training under the supervision and at the expense of the U. S. government is being offered by the Navy for young men who will be 17 years of age but not over 20 years of age on July 1, 1943, and by the Army for young men who will be 17 years of age but not over 22 years of age on July 1, 1943, according to Walter Travis, superintendent of the Floydada schools. Supt. Travis and Homer Poole, principal of the high school, will administer the tests Friday morning, April 2, beginning at 9 o'clock at the high school building.

Those eligible for the training must possess one of the other of the following three qualifications: 1. High school or preparatory school graduates; 2. High school or preparatory school seniors; 3. Students who have not graduated from high school or preparatory school but are attending accredited college.

Further requirements for those desiring to take the tests are: a male citizen of the U. S., morally and physically qualified, including a minimum of uncorrected visual eyesight of 18/20 for each eye. They must be unmarried and agree to remain unmarried until they get their commission unless they are sooner released by the Army or Navy. Also they must evidence potential officer qualifications, including appearance and scholastic records.

Men connected in any way with the armed forces at this time are not eligible.

Those accepted will take their college training while on duty, in uniform, receiving pay and under general military discipline. Upon completion of their college training they will receive further training leading to commissions.

Nephew Was Heroic Fighter At Guadalcanal

Among those who assisted in the cleanup of Guadalcanal was Pfc. Sam Ayres, of Hawesville, Kentucky, a nephew of Mrs. Donald H. Pitts of Floydada. The part this youth and several others had in the final battle for Guadalcanal, written by Sgt. Samuel E. Stavisky, a marine Corps combat correspondent, and delayed in transit was recently received by Mrs. Pitts. It read as follows: "A crack crew of one battery, which arrived in November and set up positions under Jap shellfire, has been officially credited with neutralizing 20 Jap Guns, with hits on three more; with demolishing six enemy ammunition and gasoline dumps, and with destroying or damaging a number of Jap roads and bridges.

Love Message To Tojo
"These howitzer batteries not only can dish it out—they can take it. Big guns like these with their devastating effects on Jap dumps and supply lines, are prime objectives for the "Millimeter Mites." Jap artillery—and "Washing Machine Charleys"—Jap night bombers. And the boys are constantly harried by snipers who filter in through the jungle brush.

"In the tradition of artillery men these lads do not fail to write messages on their shells. Typical are: "A red hot mamma for Yokohama." "With bursting love—to Tojo." "Kiss the Japs goodbye," and "From Mike to Mikado."

Substitute Waxy Grain Sorghum In Starch Making

AMARILLO, March 23.—The use of a waxy type grain sorghum as a substitute for tapioca starch and the development of a new industry in the South Plains area of the Texas Panhandle was forecast today by H. M. Balmer, general agricultural agent of the Santa Fe Railway system.

Imports of tapioca starch or flour, from the roots of the tapioca plant or bitter cassava, principally from Java, were cut off at the start of the war. In 1940 these imports amounted to 352 million pounds. In addition to making tapioca and other foods it was used, mainly in the manufacture of high speed packaging glues, adhesives for stamps and envelopes, and in the sizing of paper and in cloth materials.

With all imports of this product cut off, manufacturers searched for other sources and believe they have found it domestically in the recently developed Waxy Blackhull Kafir. Credit for the development of this sorghum is given by Balmer to R. E. Karper, assistant director of the Texas A & M Experiment Station, who resides at Lubbock. Karper has been working with the kafir for several years and he believes that the waxy sorghum will replace the cassava or tapioca starch in every way. In the plans for further development of this sorghum it is expected that 20,000 acres will be planted in 1943 in the territory embracing Levelland, Lubbock, Littlefield, Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Abernathy and Chillicothe. It is estimated that this acreage should provide a total yield of 32,000,000 pounds for the 1943 crop and that the acreage will be increased later as more seed is made available.

FLOYD COUNTY HAS TWO WAVES RECRUITS, AGNES COOPER ENLISTS

Miss Agnes Cooper, of Lockney, was recently sworn in as a Navy WAVE at the Naval Officer Procurement Office in Washington, D. C., which makes two recruits from this county. Miss Bobbe Maurice Muncy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Muncy, was recently sworn in as an apprentice seaman.

Miss Cooper who has been employed in the War Department in Washington for the past year, will receive three months training at the Naval Reserve midshipmen's school at Smith college in Northampton, Massachusetts.

Upon completion of her training, she will receive a commission as Ensign in the Navy and will be stationed somewhere within the continental limits of the United States.

Miss Cooper, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Cooper, expects to spend a few days with her parents in Lockney before she receives her orders to report to Northampton.
