expressed concern over the proposed rate increase for the postal service. In hope of a better understanding of the postal service let me explain a few
facts. 1. The USPS has 74,000 fewer
employees than in 1970 handling an annual volume of 6.5 billion pieces of mail. This volume is up 20 billion pieces since 1970 .
2. The 17 billion in sales of postage and other services in 1980 make the USPS larger than such companies as Shell, Chrysler and Dupont. 3. Only 4 per cent of its operating,
budget is supplied by federal budget is supplied by federal
subsidies. This is down from the 25 subsidies. This is down from the 25
per cent subsidy in 1970. Other Government agencies could improve by using the USPS as a guide. If I as the postmaster, have a problem in my
office, it is my iob to solve this office, it is my job to solve this
problem rather than wasting money problem rather than wasting money
and resources just delaying the problem.

increases 1 , it increases postal costs by 3.5 million dollars. The postal
service has some 160,000 carrier routes from Alaska to Puerto Rico for letter delivery at $15^{*}$ per ounce.

If the Postal Service is such a
model of model of economy, why is it
persisting with plans (while the rest of persisting with plans (while the rest of us are asked to cut back) on building
a multi-million dollar, country-club type facility in the Washington area, where its "upper echelon" executives will be trained? How much of the postage rate increase is really going to
pay for this facility, and how much is pay for this facility, and how much is
it really needed?? We are aware (painfully) of how inflation affects the cost of services, and we don't mind paying our fair share. But why is it that in the
proposed postal rate hikes, third class or "junk mail," (termed advertising mail by postal authorities), had the lowest proposed increase of any of the levels of postage??
In the last 16 years, our second
class postage has increased by com class postage has increased by some
800 per cent. As a user of first and 800 per cent. As a user of first and
second class mail, we're getting tired of subsidizing the users of "junk mail," and we believe most patrons would just as soon not have
cluttering up their mailboxes cluttering up their mailboxes anyway.
You didn't mention the proposed
addition of four more addition of four more Zip Code
