



HOW WELL DO YOU know your state? Most folks who have lived in Texas for any length of time are pretty familiar with many of the basic facts, such as Texas being the second largest state, the bluebonnet is the state flower, etc.

Here's a quiz to see if you are a real true Texan with some obscure facts gleaned from the Texas Highways magazine.

How big is Texas?

What is the state tree?

Name the six flags which have flown over Texas.

Where did Texas get its name? How many head of cattle are there

in Texas?
What percentage of Texas' 176
million acres is farm or ranch land?

If you've had trouble answering those, we'll give you a little help. Texas is 801 miles long and 773 miles wide with a total of 275,416 square miles.

The state tree is the pecan tree. The six flags of Texas were Spanish, French, Mexican, Republic of Texas, Confederate and U.S.

Texas evolved from the Indian word "tejas" for friendly. Guess that's why Texas is called the Friendship state.

There are over 15 million head of cattle in Texas, which is more cattle than there are people.

A survey in 1976 showed that an estimated 205,000 Texas farms and ranches covered about 141 million acres, some 80 per cent of the state's land area.

Texas boasts the nation's largest inland port at Laredo with dollar volume of imports and exports exceeding four billion dollars.

The state's two longest rivers are both state boundaries. The longest river is the Rio Grande which separates Texas from Mexico for 1,248 miles. The Red River on the Texas-Oklahoma border is the second longest with 640 miles through Texas and along the boundary.

When was the first cattle drive in Texas? Although the first cattle drives were not recorded, James T. White was known to have sent cattle from his Liberty Ranch in present Chambers County to New Orleans in the early 1830's before the Texas Revolution. His JTW brand is believed to have been first recorded about 1830 and it is likely that he established the Longhorn cattle industry in southeastern Texas when he brought a herd of Longhorns to Turtle Bayou in 1827.

The largest flathead catfish ever caught in Texas was landed at Lake McQueeny in 1956 and weighed 104 pounds. And that's no fish story!

The first Texas Navy was really nothing to brag about. The Texas Navy became a reality in January 1836 with the purchase of four schooners which had been authorized by the General Council on Nov. 25, 1835. However, the lifespan of the first Texas Navy was short: by mid-1837 all four vessels had been lost.

During the Civil War, Sophia Porter earned the title of "woman Paul Revere" when she forded the Red River to warn Col. James Bourland of the approach of federal forces. It is not recorded whether she shouted, "The bluecoats are coming."

Popular TV star Dan Blocker was probably about the biggest Texas fellow to ever make it B-I-G in TVland. He was most famous for his role as "Hoss" Cartwright on the Bonanza show. He was born in DeKalb, Texas and weighed 14 pounds at birth. He was said to have been the largest baby ever born in Bowie County. When he was 12 years old he stood over six feet tall and weighed 200 pounds. As a football player at Sul Ross, he measured six feet, four inches and weighed more than 275 pounds. Blocker died in 1972 at the age of 43.

Council Approves Patrolman Addition

Approval for the hiring of an additional patrolman for the City of Friona highlighted the regular monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday evening.

Chief of Police Bill Denney presented the request, and pointed out that by adding a patrolman to the force, the city could have an additional patrolman and patrol car on duty through the late hours, taking in the period when most trouble calls occur.

After much discussion of the matter, in relation to the city budget, the Chief of Police was authorized to employ an additional certified

patrolman.

In other business, Mayor B.K.
Buske pointed out that he and Robert
Neelley, president of the Board of
Governors of the Friona Community
Center building had discussed
adjustment in the costs of renting the
facility, to assist in the utility costs
and making needed repairs.

In this regard, the council passed a motion to increase the rental to \$50 for non-profit events and \$100 for ticket-selling events, with one-half of the rental being held as escrow. Half of the rental then would be returned if no damage to the building was noted upon inspection by the city.

Mayor Buske presented a petition from George Rushing, requesting annexation of five lots in Western Addition. Noting that extension of

Child Welfare Board **Created For County**

The County Commissioners and the County Judge, working with the Texas Department of Human Resources, created a five women, 2 men Parmer County Child Welfare Board in the fall of 1980. Now the term "welfare" is immediately a problem for some folk, but it need not be in this case. Let me explain what our Board is organized to do.

In every community and the cities in Parmer County are no exception, there are needs on the part of children that need to be met. One of the most challenging problems rests in the fact that there are children who need protection because they are victims of abuse or neglect.

The needs of children like those mentioned above are not the concern of one person or group of persons; rather, they are the concern of society. That means folks from national and state government all the way to folk on the regional and local levels. Our Child Welfare Board is a local expression of this concern by our society. We are interested people who, through mutual cooperation and use of available resources and talents, try to give the unwanted, unloved, abused and or neglected child a better chance to become a respected and contributing member of society.

For our local board that means our responsibility is a wide one. We are to help recruit adoptive and foster parents, to secure funds for clothing and medical expenses, for transportation and special needs the children may have.

One of the other major functions is publicity and public awareness. We want to let folk know that:

If the Postal Service is such a model of economy, why is it persisting with plans (while the rest of us are asked to cut back) on building a multi-million dollar, country-club type facility in the Washington area, where its "upper echelon" executives will be trained? How much of the postage rate increase is really going to pay for this facility, and how much is it really needed??

We are aware (painfully) of how inflation affects the cost of services, and we don't mind paying our fair share. But why is it that in the proposed postal rate hikes, third class or "junk mail," (termed advertising mail by postal authorities), had the lowest proposed increase of any of the levels of postage??

In the last 16 years, our second class postage has increased by some 800 per cent. As a user of first and second class mail, we're getting tired of subsidizing the users of "junk mail," and we believe most patrons would just as soon not have it cluttering up their mailboxes anyway.

You didn't mention the proposed addition of four more Zip Code numbers, and the cost and inconvenience this would be to mailers. Wasn't the Zip Code first devised just because some postal employees refused to learn (or could not) in which section of the country each of the states were located (But they COULD count to ten)? Why should the users of the mail continue to suffer because some postal workers couldn't master sixth grade geography?

And, if the USPS has postal routes in Alaska and the sparsely-populated areas of our own state, why is it that some patrons living between Friona and Bovina have never been able to get on a rural route of ANY kind. even though they have applied, repeatedly??

Please answer us these questions, if you will, and then we will discuss further the "model student" that the USPS has been in the use of its budget.

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

FHS Squaws Win Third In First Track Outing


The Friona Squaws turned up with some good performances last Saturday in their first track and field meet of the spring.

embarrassment, won't let us use the word "Help" very much.

We ought to use it more with our children. When the lines of communication break down and all we are doing is ordering, perhaps we should try saying, "Help. Help me understand you," or "Help things to work out better around here." We should be careful that this is not just another order, but a genuine plea for mutual support.

"Help" is also a word young people might try on their parents. You might be surprised how understanding and supporting your parents would be if you shared some of the problems you have been keeping from them.

I have a personal wish that people would say "help" more to their pastor. We often want to keep up a good image in front of our pastor and therefore are reserved to share any weaknesses we have. Our pride keeps us from asking for help from the very person that is trained to help. We pastors may not be professional counselors, but many times just a listening ear and a prayer of concern can make a world of difference.

You might try saying "help" to your friends, also. Many people are willing to help in times of crisis, but simply don't know how. Tell them! Let people know how they can help and most will respond quietly and

Finally, we need to say "help" to God. There may be some of us who feel self-sufficient and in control of everything. However, I am persuaded that not one of us will make it through life without deep-down knowing that we need HIM. If not in life, at least in death we realize we are not the final "captain of our fate."

When I was a teen-ager I plowed for a farmer one full summer. The day I started to work, I was too embarrassed to admit I didn't know much about tractors. I told the farmer, "I can do it." And so I made the first round in the deep sand without using the brakes to turn. It was a mess. The farmer came back to the field and said, "Maybe I should help you for a while." How much simpler it would have been if I had said "Help" in the beginning.

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
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


Dr. Elmer Krehbiel, Beef Cattle Specialist with the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University, will conduct the program
