EDITORIALS

Handling of Saturday's heavy crowds and traffic without accident or any considerable annoyance in Floydada may be taken as the result of before-hand planning by the city council and therefore as a compliment to that body. We would say that elimination of the hazards of double parking, irksome as it may be to some at times, speeded up traffic a big lot, cut down the dangers to pedestrian and machine travel and made it possible for people to get into and out of stores with a minimum of convenience. Perhaps if the same number of people had "taken in" the town three years ago, when travel in streets and on highways was at a much faster pace, the story might have been a different one. However, there is no way of comparing present traffic with former traffic in this part of the world at least, and it is needless to speculate on it.

Perhaps the thing that would have crowned the handling of traffic as an ideal job, and would have quieted any fears as to accidents materially, would have been the operation of the street traffic lights at the main intersections. And it would be a fine thing if the city would get settled the misunderstanding, or whatever it is in the way, and get the lights to going again. We do not know where responsibility lies that the lights are not being operated by the city. Perhaps the council may not know what farmers are thinking, but we "go" for farmers considerably. We learn much from them, we think. And one of the things we learn is that they wish "their" town had street intersection lights going. How much it would cost to get a settlement of the traffic light controversy we would not know. But anything in reason would pay dividends. The lights are a valuable safety measure, many think, and a day like last Saturday and Saturday night renews the thought and the resultant conversation.

Saturday's crowd of people were buyer minded. They wanted food and they bought food, practically gutting retail stores. They wanted winter wearing apparel and shoes and they took the clothing emporiums by storm. Likewise, they wanted to eat and drink and the cafes and drug stores were over-run. In more than one instance eating establishments closed their doors during the day to make it possible to serve those already in, and then to let in another bunch of hungry people. Cafe owners spent Sunday hunting something to "open up on" on Monday.

Cotton production is better by far in Floyd county this fall than any had reason to anticipate. There are numerous dry land fields yielding "way up toward a bale and even the "sorry" cotton is producing well. With ginners and growers suffering from the lack of manpower and facilities one hears little grumbling. The open fall has been a great aid to those who had the opportunity to get help and as well to those who did not, saving their crops intact, with every passing day giving that much insurance against damage until manpower could be applied. Gins have

"suffered," meaning the operators, for lack of help and for lack of repairs when they were needed seriously. One of the things about pioneers and sons of pioneers, they can improvise a long, long time before they quit entirely—and even then just do without and still not quit.

Speaking of manpower shortage in civilian life, the situation is due to get just a little more serious within another month or two if Selective service goes ahead with its drafting plans, which undoubtedly will. However, by the time the December draft hits, perhaps much of the heavy load incident to the harvest may be over, offering some relief in that respect. The fact is that if it keeps on staying dry manpower needs in this part of the world will shrink a lot as the days grow into late winter and then the spring.

Brutal double murder of the Littlefield doctor—Roy Hunt and his wife—last week reminds us that there still are fields in the world, men who kill and garrot and maltreat the human body far beyond the demands of the fury of hate. Possibly this particular murder will not be solved, but one feels confident that it will be—and, will hope, without involving the South Texas doctor alleged to have attempted the highway killing of the same physician some two years ago. The Hunt family's plains origin is in the vicinity of old Estacado. There wasn't anything hidden or dubious about the life of the young physician, just in his prime, and a useful citizen appreciated by his neighbors. Thus all the grapevine reports tell us.

Peculiar country we have. Peculiar climate. Just in the right spot on the earth's surface for anything to happen weather-wise. The Hesperian, this column notes, has failed to report two or three local hail storms that hit in spots a farm or two in area during October, wiping out an otherwise excellent cotton prospect, and damaging feed also. These natural phenomena spotted over practically every county in the plains area.

We wonder how the things that live by nature as it is, and not as it is made to be, can feel or sense or in some manner foretell that a winter is to be late coming or early. Like this year, all the signs pointed to October frosts and they came. Last year the prairie life said a late frost and late it was. The "signs" are always right but they are not always read properly, appreciatively enough. Now you take us. We read 'em right. A lot of the neighbors don't. This year we missed a wee bit account of the war. We just didn't have time to get out and commune with nature. We anticipated a killing frost on October 20, according to word brought in by scouts. The first frost fell on the fifteenth or sixteenth and the almost killing frost a little after the twentieth. Also the prairie life had news about the dry fall, which we gave out in the summer. You can't help knowing things when you are told in plain "language."
