Acie and Laeie Kirk, twin brothers showed twin heifer calves in the recent county show. The heifers placed third and fifth in their class. These boys are members of the Barker 4-H club.

Clyde Farish, of Lockney, bought the grand champion Jersey bull of the Plainview Dairy show this year. Clyde owns the cow that won the grand championship in 1943. He should be able to get some outstanding show animals from this breeding in the future.

Jack Brian of Lockney has bought a good Jersey bull. The bull placed fifth in his class at Plainview, and has good production records behind him.

Of interest to all 4-H club boys is the Achievement day that will be held next fall when all records have been turned in to the agent's office. The Floydada Chamber of Commerce will sponsor the event and furnish official 4-H club pins to all members who complete their demonstrations and turn in their records. The pins will have "First," "Second," etc. on them to denote the number of years that the boy has been a club member. Highlight of the day will be a "feed" followed by a good program.

Earl Edwards, Jr., has been elected to receive a \$25 award in a contest sponsored by the Producer's Grain Corporation, based on his record as a 4-H club boy. On May 17, Earl, Jr., his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Edwards, and the agent will be guests of the corporation at their annual meeting in Amarillo, at which time the award will be presented. Earl is a member of the Lakeview club. This honor was won by Jackie Brock of the Floydada club last year.

Water your grain sorghum land once before planting and once 30 days after planting, was the advice of Don Jones at the irrigation meeting in Lockney last week. Mr. Jones, superintendent of the Lubbock Experiment station, declared to the fifty farmers present that watering two times in this manner has paid the highest dividends on the station. He also advised the farmers to wait until May 20, before planting their grain sorghum crops. This is to avoid the extremely dry period around July 20, from catching the plant in the "boot." Milo planted April 20, will mature only 10 days earlier than when planted on May 20, he stated.

Cotton farmers were advised to water twice before planting and once 30 days after planting to get the greatest returns for their water and labor. The soil is like a reservoir, Mr. Jones said. Fill it full before you start and you'll make a crop.

W. L. Jones, irrigationist at the station, said a 600-pound application of 8-12-4 fertilizer on potatoes has given the greatest returns. The "8" refers to nitrogen, the "12" to phosphorus, and the "4" to potash in the fertilizer. This formula is not being made at this time but a farmer can make the same thing by applying 600 pounds of 4-12-4, which is being made, and adding 75 pounds of ammonium nitrate or 150 pounds of nitrate of soda.

Cook snap beans with chopped bacon in a frying pan with chopped onions, green tips included. Add the beans and heat together. Serve beans in white sauce with hard eggs or cheese added. (Civilian supplies of cheese are more plentiful this spring) Homemade chile sauce is good on canned beans. Cook a finely chopped onion in a little fat or drippings until it is tender and yellow. Add chile sauce, then beans. Heat together. Several seasoning seeds are good with beans—celery, dill or even mustard seed.

Use beets to give crimson color to spring salad bowls. Shredded green cabbage, hard cooked eggs, lettuce or curly endive and sliced beets makes a delicious chilled bowl if tossed with French dressing. Beets are also good sliced and heated in bacon fat with a dash of lemon juice, a sprinkle of sugar and perhaps a little dry mustard.

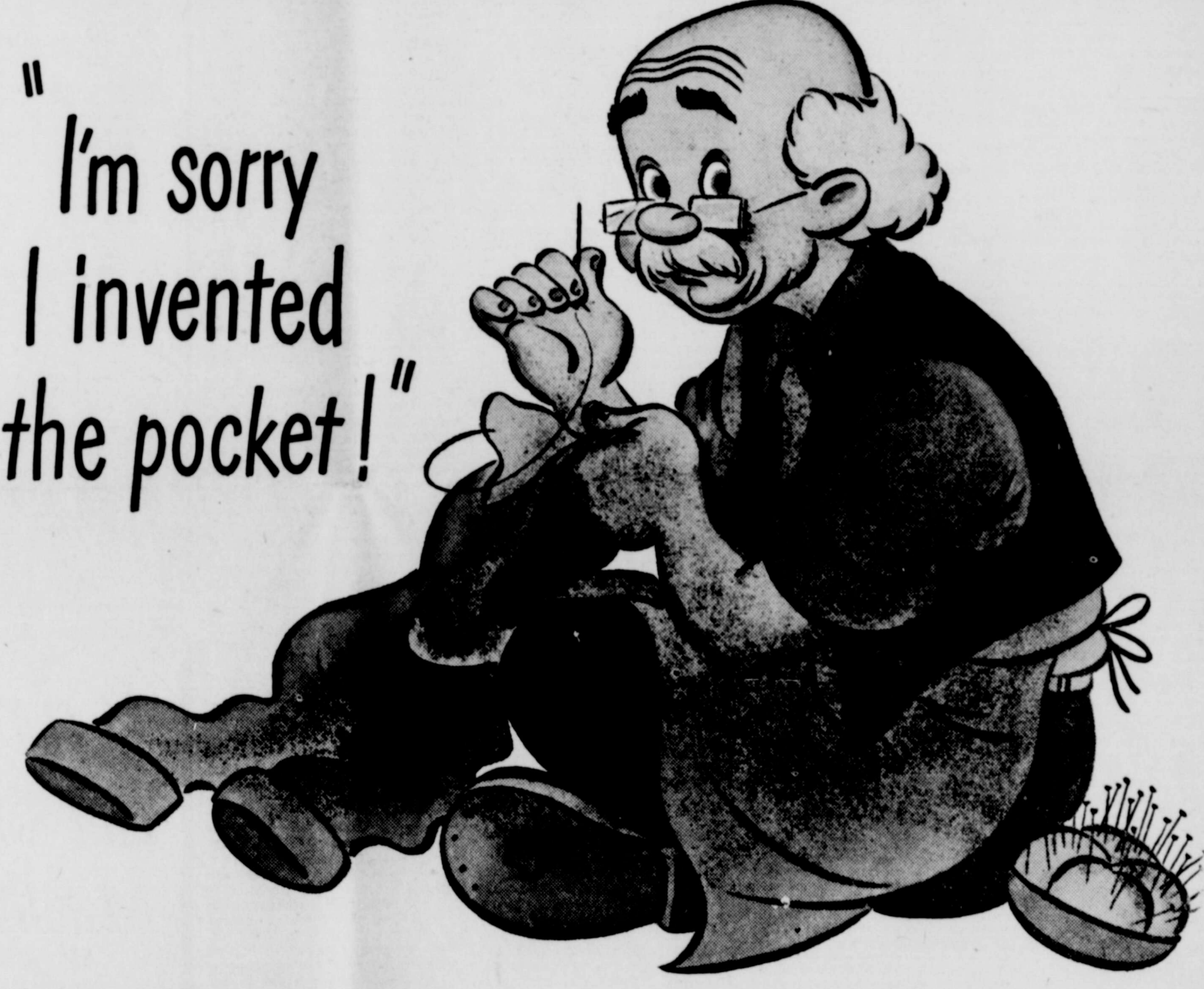

This Floyd County Man Has Unusual Job In U. S. Navy

R. E. (Bill) Gilbreath, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. N. Gilbreath, of Lockney, Route 2, has an unusual job in the U. S. navy—unusual at least for a boy from the high plains of Texas. He is a diver and works under water, his rating being motor machinist's mate second class. Writing something of his experiences in the Southwest Pacific, where he has been since last July, Bill says in a recent letter:

"I am still diving and like it more than ever. It is really a lot of work but interesting. When I go down for about four hours in one day it is no trouble at all to sleep at night, although I have done much more than that plenty of times.

"At first a guy is inclined to be afraid down below and can imagine everything that could happen. Then when he gets used to being down there is no thought of it at all and you go about what you are doing. If something happens and the air goes off for a few seconds I just hold my breath and hope the guy on top side will fix things. He always has!

Some Deep Sea Fish
"I wish you could see some of the deep sea fish down there. There are all shapes, sizes and colors. Some of the small ones are real curious and will come up to your face plate and try to look in at you. There are others that come within a few feet and follow everywhere you go, never leaving. There are some small animals that live down on the bottom called sea urchins that have quills like porcupines. (We call them sea-going.) I have gotten quills in my leg a couple of times. It is not so funny.

"About the worst thing to look out for is the sharks. We have seen a few of them since we have been diving. A few days ago my buddy and I were down below and there was one about 15 feet long came by pretty close. There are a lot of stories about what they will and will not do, but I don't want to stick around to see if they are true."

Bill says he likes to dive and work under the water and that the extra pay helps a bit. He joined up in the navy in October a year ago and trained at Great Lakes and Navy pier.

The Southwestern Public Service Company has been furnishing Floydada with electric and ice service since the fall of 1942, having acquired the Texas-New Mexico Utilities Company system at that time, and in order to better acquaint our friends and customers with the Company and its operating policies, we are instituting a series of statements to be published in the form of advertisements once each week for the next few weeks.

The Southwestern Public Service Company was organized in New Mexico in 1925 and, before acquiring the electric and ice facilities in Floydada, and in neighboring cities and towns, it served principally the Central Panhandle of Texas and the Pecos Valley area of New Mexico.

Soon after its organization, the Company established a general policy of operation which has been continued through the ensuing years.

This policy consists principally of the following:

- (1) The best possible service to the public with friendly and courteous handling of our customers' dealings with us.
- (2) The fair treatment of our employees, supplemented by a continuous program of training them in an eager willingness to serve the public and in good citizenship in their communities.
- (3) A program of voluntary reduction in our rates to the public, made periodically as business conditions permit.

As a result of the repeated rate reductions made during the period of our operations from 1925 until the outbreak of the war, the average rate per kilowatt hour for all lighting and power sold by the Company, in the original territory served, was reduced to less than one-third of what it was in the beginning. These reductions in rates were accompanied by large increases in electric plant and line investment, to provide adequate service at all times.

This is the program of service to the public which we bring to the people of Floydada. Although we are handicapped along with all others by war conditions, it is our purpose to put our operating policy in full effect in the years of peace ahead. These matters will be amplified in later statements, and additional information will be presented to you, in order that you might become better acquainted with the Company and the service which it renders.
