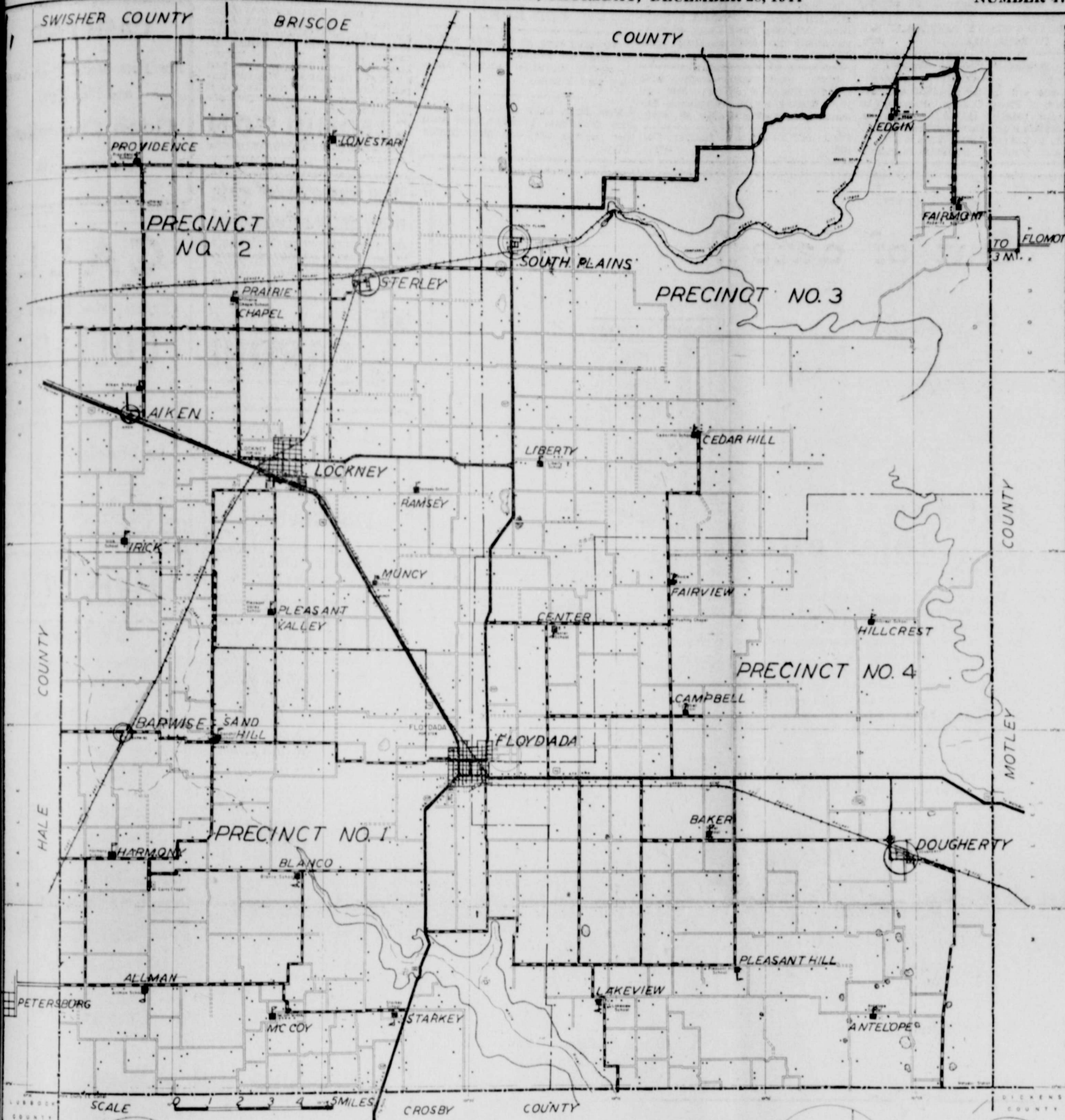

Suggested County Road Program for Floyd County

This map, by the State Highway Department was prepared and the improvements suggested on the following controlling factors, according to the letter of transmittal to County Engineer Geo. A. Linder:

- (1) Usage of existing roads based on traffic volume.
- (2) Anticipated traffic from isolated areas by improvement of existing roads.
- (3) Giving each town and community an all-weather road to its trading center.
- (4) Serving the greatest number of strictly rural inhabitants with the minimum amount of mileage, and
- (5) An connection with towns in adjoining counties.

Highways Also Shown
 A study of the map shows quickly, of course, the routes through the county that are a part of the highway system are included to make up the whole county system. They are: East and west Highway 70, north and south Highway 207, the cut-off from Lockney eastward to Highway 207 and the spur to Dougherty. The two main arteries have been completed, the Lockney cut-off is in the planning stage, having already been designated, and the Dougherty spur being built.

As will be noted by the map the whole county system has 1242.15 miles of road, of which at the time the whole county system was made by the highway department 239.7 miles was proposed to be made all-weather roads based on priorities demanded by the traffic count. The department does not recommend bituminous surfacing but all all-weather roads can be built that will carry the traffic adequately.

What the 'Inventory' Showed
 The State Highway Department's 'inventory,' made in 1941, showed that the entire mileage of the county road system (not state highways) was 1167 miles. These 1167 miles carried 30,605 vehicle miles daily. Their recommendation of the 239.7

A county road improvement plan (see drawing above) based on a long range program of permanent road construction has been recommended to the Commissioners court by the State Highway department for study and for guidance in their future planning.

The necessity, long seen, for building roads to permanent grade and drainage structure and for their completion as all-weather roads as funds will permit, is the dream of every commissioner and road man in the state. Floyd county has made a modest start in this direction.

East and west on the Allmon-Petersburg road, east and west on the Lockney-Cedar road, north and south on the Lockney-Pleasant valley road, and a few other shorter road beds in the county give an idea of what has been done in this connection. Experience of road men with these stretches of roadway, which lend themselves to maintenance at a much lower annual cost than roads not built to grade, indicate that the saving to the county annually in upkeep would be a tremendous item, that money which has to be spent in order to make travel possible) put on roads that are not up to grade is largely a waste so far as any permanent results are concerned.

Floyd county at this time is spending maintenance money on many roads which have been and will continue to be the same type of problem from year to year, that is they will have to have the same attention every recurring spell of rain, and that they will not be travelable for two and three times as long as if they had been built on a proper grade.

This map, then, is presented with this thought in mind. It is subject to changes that might be properly made, but it is based on actual travel figures made by the State Highway department in the year of 1941.

From the above it will be noted that while 74.7 per cent of the rural road mileage would still be unimproved, it would carry only 15.9 per cent of the traffic, while the 25.3 per cent of the rural mileage which is improved or selected for improvement, would carry 84.1 per cent of the travel.

Number of Dwellings Served
 The exhaustive survey made by the state highway department also reveals a very interesting fact as to number of residences served now and which would be served when and if the road improvement program were carried out. At this time there are 154 rural dwellings within one mile travel of an all-weather road. This is 9 per cent of the total 1,629 dwellings in the strictly rural area of the county, 15.9 per cent of the traffic.

The completion of the proposed county road plan would add an additional 811 dwellings that would either be directly served or are within one mile of an all-weather road. This would be 49 per cent of all the county's rural dwellings. Fifty-eight per cent of all rural dwellings in the county would then be served directly or would be within one mile of an all-weather road.

Bus and Mail Routes
 It is interesting to note that although bus and mail routes were not a determining factor (the factor being strictly that of vehicle miles) in selecting roads for the suggested county road system, most roads selected are now either a school bus route or a mail route or both.

Here is how the road mileage allocated to each commissioner's precinct in the county sizes up

In precinct No. One 67.5 miles of road with 7125 vehicle miles of travel daily;

In Precinct Two, 69.8 miles of road with 6,084 vehicle miles of travel daily;

In Precinct Three, 41.7 miles of road with 1,819 vehicle miles of travel daily; and

In Precinct Four, 60.7 miles of road with 3,819 vehicle miles of travel daily.

While this is a more ambitious improvement program than can be carried out within the very early years, the map should serve as a guide in selecting the roads to be improved in each precinct, the manager of the department's Planning Survey told County Engineer Geo. A. Linder in pointing out the great benefits ultimately to be had from a planned program of road building, such as has been found highly valuable in many other counties of the state.

Red Cross Procedure in Cases Where Emergency Furloughs are Needed and Discharge Requests

Dozens of requests from service men's families pour into the Floyd county Red Cross chapter office for emergency furloughs and discharges, Red Cross officials reveal.

Because emergency furloughs for men overseas and in this country have been granted, under extreme circumstances, many requests are being made every day.

Red Cross chapters, although serving as clearing houses for such petitions, cannot institute requests nor offer recommendations for the discharge or furlough of members of the armed forces.

Use Military Channels
 Actions on matters of this sort can be taken only through regular military channels, it is pointed out. The responsibility of the Red Cross is to collect information and verify home situations in order to provide the military with a basis for decision. No recommendation is made by the Red Cross to influence that decision in any case.

In each instance of local requests, the Red Cross has advised the families of the necessary procedure and recommended that the servicemen in question be contacted and that he in turn make the furlough or discharge request to his commanding officer.

Three new county officials and one new justice of the peace will take the oath of office and assume their respective duties Monday morning of next week, according to scheduled plans for the biennial change reflecting the franchise holders' verdict in the November general election.

The three new county officers will be W. E. Grimes, who succeeds G. C. Tubbs as county judge; S. H. Millwee, who succeeds Kenneth Bain as county attorney; Mrs. Ethel Graham, who succeeds Geo. B. Marshall as assessor-collector. Of these, Bain was holding office by appointment and was not a candidate to succeed himself.

New precinct officials will be Charlie Smith, who succeeds E. R. Harris as commissioner of Precinct No. 2, and C. C. Hackney, who succeeds Frank Perkins as justice of the peace Precincts Two and Three. Perkins was not a candidate.

Also the new commissioner court will have as one of their early duties the naming of a justice of the peace to fill the term to which Judge Jno. W. Howard was elected. Judge Howard, who had been chosen to succeed himself, died within a short time after the election. O. B. Olson has been holding the office by appointment in the interim.

Other officers who will qualify to succeed themselves as members of the county's official family Monday are:

Lee Howard, sheriff; Mrs. P. G. Stegall, district clerk; Margaret Collier, county clerk; Clarence Guffee, county superintendent of public instruction; Mrs. O. M. Conway, county treasurer; W. D. Newell, county surveyor;

W. H. Brock, commissioner of Precinct No. One; W. C. Plumlee, commissioner of Precinct No. three; and R. B. Calhoun, commissioner of Precinct No. Four.

Final Session Saturday
 The final session of the old court will be held Saturday to wind up the affairs of the current year and clean the slate for the new court to take over Monday morning.

Sleet Brings Slick Roads; Snow Follows

Sleet that left only a quarter of an inch or so of moisture but covered roadways and pavements to make them icy slick for holiday travel, fell beginning Tuesday morning and remained on the ground throughout the most of Wednesday.

The wetness and slick resulted in several minor accidents on highways and on streets in Floydada and other plains and panhandle towns. Considerable damage was done to half a dozen automobiles here and three members of one party of New Mexico travelers were treated at Pitts hospital for injuries of a minor nature Tuesday morning.

Monday's high temperature was 30, the low 22; Tuesday's 28 and 20; and Wednesday the high was 33 for several hours, the early morning low being 28 degrees.

Snow this morning that began shortly after midnight had covered about two inches deep on the ground at 8 o'clock.

War Dept. Notifies Family Geo. T. Smalley Is Dead

Geo. T. Smalley, reported by the War department about November 1 as missing in action since October 14, Tuesday wired members of the family, including his wife at Houston and his mother Mrs. Anna Smalley at Clovis, that he was killed. The news was relayed here Tuesday night to relatives. His death occurred in the neighborhood of Aachen, Germany.

With the First army as an infantryman, the Floyd county man had been in service since October, 1943, and had been overseas about six months.

His wife is the former Martha White, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. R. C. White of Houston. They were married in January, 1943. They have a son, George Russell, one year old. A sister, Mrs. Jimmie Hardgrove, of Clovis, also survives. Born in Fannin county, Geo. T. Smalley was reared in Floyd, finished school here and graduated from University of Texas in 1938. He trained at Camp Wolters.

Among the surviving relatives are two uncles, W. G. and Gene Collins, and an aunt, Mrs. O. L. Stansell of Floydada.

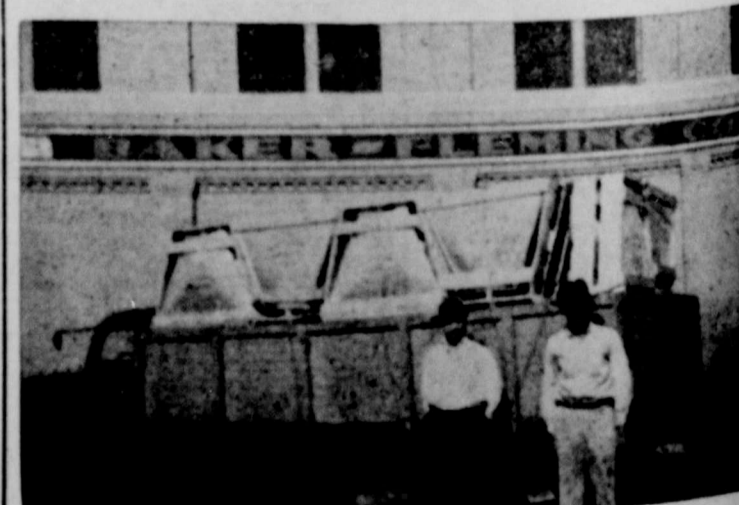

(Continued from First page) Application has been made to the proper authority that the Red Cross operates, it is reported. Even then the Red Cross does not enter into the case except when asked to gather information for the military. This is handled through the Red Cross field director whom the commanding officer contacts and who, in turn, communicates with the local chapter for date.

When an emergency home situation develops important enough to warrant a serviceman's presence at home on leave or furlough, he should be advised immediately by the family and information also given to the local Red Cross chapter. This may facilitate action on the application by enabling prompt transmission of the date to the field director for the use of the commanding officer.

Families are asked to not make requests for emergency furloughs unless the situation is urgent.

The Red Cross responsibility is simple if the families just remember two points, it is stressed. First, only the military can decide matters concerning military personnel.

Second, the Red Cross supplies facts only and does not recommend any specific course of action.

OPA Clamps Down Again

OPA's recent action making five important changes in the rationing program was taken overnight because present supplies, according to the supply agencies, will permit use of currently-valid stamps only, the office of Price administration announced.

The only sugar stamp that is now valid is No. 34. All others were in validated, as well as all outstanding homecanning sugar certificates.

Red stamps that are now valid are Q5, R5 and S5. Presently-valid blue stamps are X5, Y5, Z5, A2, and B2.

Five new red stamps—T3 through X5—will become valid December 31. Five new blue stamps—C2 through G2—will become valid January 1, 1945 and both blue and red stamps will be worth 10 points each.
