

Centralization of government is on the increase and the implest way of learning this fact is to observe the growing amounts that are paid each year by the states to the local governments and by the federal government to the states. With these increasing grantsin-aid, a proportionate share of control is being surrendered by the recipient government to its "benefactor."

Local governments received \$1800 million from their states in 1942 as against only \$536 million in 1925. During the same period, federal payments to the states rose from \$114 million to \$800 million, a much larger proportionate rise.
