The Home Front

A new method of cleaning strawberries now is being recommended by the Texas A. and M. College Extension service. Mrs. Wladimir J. Laverone, Extension specialist in food preservation, says Texas housewives who use strawberries for use in ice cream and other desserts like short cakes and gelatins, will find that the new method preserves better flavor and color.

The new method calls for the berries to be washed with sugar without washing. No liquid is used, and later the berries are treated in their own juice in 50% of sugar. Previous methods called for adding of sugar, Mrs. Laverone explains.

There are several additional ways to help berries retain their red color. Sugar is one aid, especially in strawberries, but it will also help to add the sweetness of berries when in every kind of berry. The berries also should be washed just before eating. If they are used, Mrs. Laverone recommends, "it is better to use them in 100% sugar syrup, than to use them in a 50% sugar syrup, because they will keep in color, regardless of the sugar given them."

Mrs. Laverone says that in making strawberry jam, one cup of sugar should be allowed for each quart of berries. This recipe and another standard recipe for strawberry preserves are available from county home demonstration agents.

Mrs. Laverone says that in preparing for some of the sugar, should also be used, but it is better to use the berries in such that it is not desirable.

### Non-Highway Gas Coupons Rule Changed

An important change in the rules governing the issuance and accounting for non-highway gasoline coupons will be effective on May 1. It was announced this week by Mark H. Martin, chairman of the Gas Panel of the Floyd County War Price and Rationing board. Here is the new set-up:

Beginning May 1, to all persons to whom are issued E and R coupons for non-highway or tractor gasoline, will also be issued a delivery record. This record will answer the same purpose as the mileage record does for passenger cars.

Quoting Mr. Martin: "When the wholesale delivers tractor gasoline regardless of the amount he must write on this delivery record the amount delivered and when you come to the office for a renewal you must present this delivery record. For instance if your rationing board issues you a thousand gallons of gasoline and your card shows you have only purchased nine hundred gallons you will have to account for the other hundred gallons."

"In a recent check of fifty cars near a popular resort center forty

two of the fifty cars were being operated with E and R coupons so you can readily see why O. P. A. had to get very strict over the use of non-highway gasoline."
