Court Re-Hashes Radio Problems

The two-way radio problems which the county law enforcement officers have been having, which also affect the local police departments in Friona and Bovina, was a major item of discussion for the second straight meeting of the county commissioners this week in Farwell.

Sheriff Bill Morgan was called into the meeting to summarize the situation confronting the officers since the Motorola engineers had spent two days the past week in Farwell trying to locate the problem.

"We've still got problems. Motorola brought two engineers down, one from Missouri and were going to send down additional equipment on September 29 (Tuesday) to look at the problem," stated Morgan of the situation.

According to the sheriff, the company was waiting for this piece of equipment which was being flown in, to arrive yesterday.

There was some additional discussion on perhaps going back to the 37180 equipment, which was a unit and type of equipment which was used before the present facilities were installed.

Morgan interjected that it was not solely the sheriff's office which the problem affected the most.

"We (the sheriff's office) can solve our problems easily. All we have to do is to unplug the present system and go back to the 37180," remarked

Morgan. However, the local police in Friona had done away with this

system earlier, and this type of equipment is what fire departments and ambulances usually transmit over presently.

"I don't think it is in the equipment," said Morgan. "I think it is still a problem in frequency...there is something that is interfering with the broadcast."

Some question was raised as to why the proper equipment was not on hand at the beginning of the process last week and why it was not here and ready to be used when the engineer from Missouri was flown in.

There was more discussion on possibly moving the tower, base station and other equipment to Friona, but Morgan brought up the point that it would be futile to do this if the problems in Farwell still persisted even after the move.

"Then what have we gained?" was Morgan's reply.

Some of the Commissioners suggested that leasing a tower and antenna from Friona Cablevision, might help in solving the communications problems. The land on which the equipment sets is owned by Glenn Reeve, Sr. and Friona Cablevision pays lease on the land. Commissioners did not take any action on this matter, but decided to wait until they could find out what Motorola was going to do about the present situation.

A change in frequencies was mentioned by one of the Commissioners but Morgan stated that the cost of doing such a thing would be almost prohibitive, as it would cost approximately \$200 per vehicle to change the frequencies and that it takes two crystals per unit to change the frequencies. It takes two crystals per unit to change the frequencies and in approximately 25 vehicles and base stations, that would run into a large amount of money.

"We have no problem on other channels, but we can't talk for any distance on Inner City from the

cars," lamented Morgan.

It was stated that when the transmission hit the repeater the transmission should be boosted, but instead it is being cut off.

Another point mentioned was that what ever different action that might be taken would have to be cleared through the Federal Communications Commission.

Some discussion was also brought up on the fact that all the cities which use this system should be willing to accept the financial burden of getting the system fixed, as it is not just a county problem.

In other business, the court awarded a bid for a new typewriter for the Adult Probation Department, in the amount of \$825 (with trade), to Curtis Smith Office Supply of Clovis. The other bidder was Moon-Lite Printing of Friona.

Also approved was a new calculator for the County Clerk's office, in the amount of \$260.

Frances Euler, Albert Smith and Wayne Spears, Justices of the Peace in Parmer County, were lauded for having successfully completed a 20 hour course of training for JPs, which was funded through the governor's office.

A discussion was held concerning the reapportionment of the commissioners' precincts according to population. After Judge Roberts reported on interviews with two firms doing this type of work, a motion was passed to engage attorney Steve Bickerstaff of Austin to perform the necessary work.

At the last meeting of the Friona City Council, the council approved a \$10,000 donation to the Friends of the Library for the group's building fund for a new library in Friona.

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland explained that the funds would come from Revenue Sharing Funds, and would not involve local tax money.

Representatives of the Friends of the Library were present to give the members of the council statistics on the use of the library, as well as the progress of the fund drive.

It was stated that the organization still has hopes of receiving a matching fund grant for the building fund drive, and that a good local response is vital to the success of the drive.

Gromowsky Wins Star Football Contest

Widdy Gromowsky was the weekly winner in the Friona Star's football contest for the past week.

City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland has received a citation from the International City Management Association in recognition of his 20 years as a city manager.

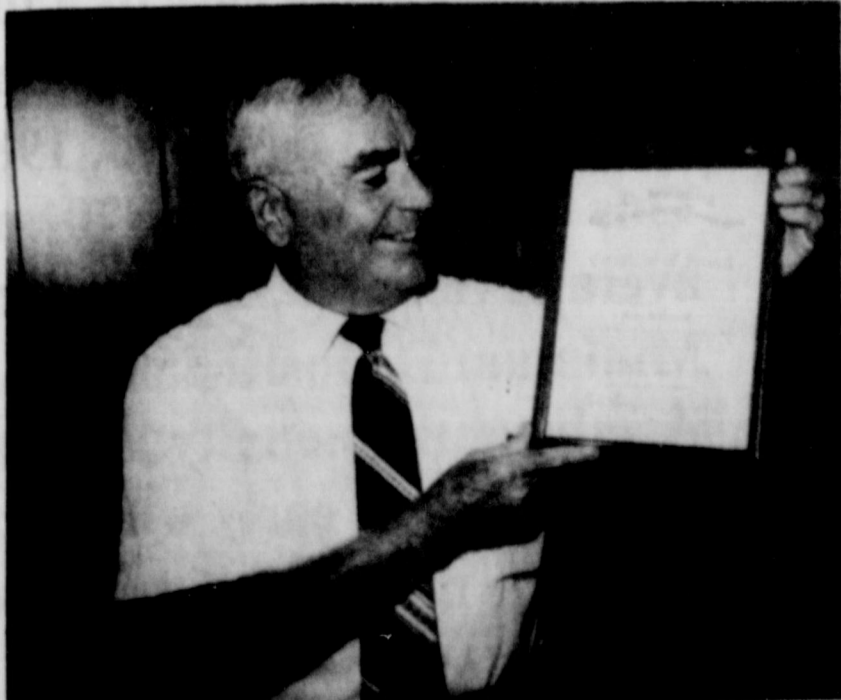
Outland will have been city manager at Friona 20 years on October 15, 1981.

ALMOST EVERY YEAR, it seems that someone decides to take down some of the Maize Days banners which the Friona Fire Department uses to decorate the city and help promote the city's annual celebration.

This year was no different. Fire Chief Ralph Shirley tells us that during the current season, the department lost 11 sets of banners. Of these, three have been returned.

Due to the price of the banners, it usually takes three or four years for the fire department to pay for the banners, before they start making a profit from the annual rental fee. When banners are stolen, this pre-empts the profit which might have been made.

The past year or so, the Friona firemen have rented some of the banners from neighboring cities to help fill the gaps left by the theft of the banners locally. This is just a break-even situation, to assure that everyone wanting a banner gets one.

So it's really a bad situation when the banners are stolen. It's sort of like stealing from the collection plate at church. Shirley says that if anyone has one of the banners, they may return it to the fire department, and no questions will be asked.

PRESIDENT REAGAN is currently trying to sell congress and the American people on his efforts to trim the federal budget by an additional \$13 billion.

The president received widespread support during the first round of his budget cuts, but the further the budget-cutter's knife whacks, the more opponents are coming out of the woodwork.

However, as spelled out by President Reagan in his speech to the nation last week, we believe that the president can effectively continue his budget cuts, without particularly harming any particular group or segment of the economy.

The first item on Reagan's list is that of welfare reform, and this is one area in which we have felt for a number of years that some fat could be trimmed from the federal program.

Welfare fraud has probably cost the American taxpayer more money in the past quarter century than any other single area. The admission in recent years that millions of dollars simply "fall through the cracks" in some of the federal agencies is proof that a crackdown is needed in policing the manner in which welfare money is distributed, assuring that only those who definitely qualify for payments receive them.

Next, Reagan says he will eliminate two agencies--the departments of Education and Energy. This would probably be in order; in fact, many people could recommend from two to two dozen additional agencies which could be wiped out, effecting an immediate savings of tax dollars, and doing very little hurt to the nation.

Other points to be pursued by the president include a crackdown on taxes, and user fees for those receiving government assistance--such as public transportation, etc.

President Reagan assured the recipients of Social Security that he would not take any action to threaten their monthly checks. The truly needy, he said, has no reason to worry about the loss of assistance.

"I will not stand by and see our senior citizens suffer financial hardship," the president said during his speech.

Reagan denied the fact that the increasing numbers of Americans on Social Security and Welfare has seen the number of people working to support those receiving payments decrease from 16 workers to one recipient 30 years ago, to 3.2 workers for every one recipient today.

The president indicated that this trend needs to be reversed, in order to assure the solid base for the Social Security system.

"We have it within our power to change things. We need to finish what

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Parmer County Law Enforcement Report

LOCAL POLICE REPORT

The Friona Police Department has issued a number of citations during the past week or so, according to Chief of Police Bill Denney. The main items included these:

On September 18, Brian Snyder, 23, was arrested for disorderly conduct and public intoxication. His bond was set at \$200.00. He is to appear before the city judge.

Larry Gentry of Friona was arrested on September 21 on an assault charge, but the following day the charges were dropped.

Three Friona juveniles were arrested on September 27 for theft over \$5.00 from White's Super Market. The youths were turned over to the juvenile authorities in Farwell on September 28.

Three out of state traffic violation arrests were booked during the week. Each of the violators posted bond and was released. One of the violators ran the stop light at Main Street and Highway 60 and the other two were arrested for speeding.

On Sunday, September 27, the police department received three reports of criminal mischief. A glass door was broken at Ethridge-Spring Agency with a big rock. Foster's had a large window broken out, also by a large rock, and the press box at the high school football field had two windows broken by a soft drink bottle. All three incidences are under investigation, according to Chief Denney.

DPS REPORT

In the report from Parmer County's Troopers, the following items were received:

One accident was reported by Trooper Jim Bishop of Farwell. This incident occurred on September 21 at 2:30 p.m. and it involved two vehicles and two persons with no injuries.

The operator of one of the vehicles was Travis Lewis Bessire of Route 3, Muleshoe, who was driving a 1981 Ford pickup. The operator of the second vehicle was Gene Paul Jarman of Route 1, Muleshoe, who was driving a 1981 Chevrolet pickup.

The vehicle driven by Bessire was pulling from a field road onto a county dirt road, turning east, when the Jarman vehicle, which was traveling west on the county dirt road collided, hitting left fenders.

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The Happy Homemaker

By JUNE FLOYD

If you'd like to plan an end of the summer party for fourteen to twenty people, you might like to try the following outlines. They will work for an indoor or outdoor meal and your guests will probably enjoy "making their own."

The first one is Decimae Beene's version of Helen Bailey's Hawaiian Hay Stack. All dishes may be prepared ahead of time and placed on a serving table in the following order: (1) Rice; (2) Chow Mein Noodles; (3) Chicken and Gravy; (4) Tomatoes; (5) Celery; (6) Green Peppers; (7) Onion; (8) Pineapple Chunks; (9) Cheese; (10) Almonds; (11) Coconut; and (12) Pimientos.

I bought three large chickens, cooked them in my pressure cooker, skinned and deboned, then cut or tore the chicken into bite sizes. Saved the chicken broth in which the chickens had been cooked to mix with soup and for cooking the rice.

For the gravy, which I poured over the chicken, I used two 10 3/4 ounce cans of Chicken Soup, one can Cream of Onion Soup and one large can pimientos with 1 cup chicken broth.

I cooked Minute Rice in chicken broth making four cups cooked rice. 9 1/2 ounce can Chow Mein noodles. Four or five tomatoes cut into bite sizes.

One cup chopped celery
 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
 1/2 cup chopped green onion
 1-20 oz. can pineapple chunks, drained
 1 cup grated Cheddar Cheese and 1 cup grated American Cheese
 1 cup slivered almonds
 1/2 cup coconut
 1-20 oz. jar pimientos--sliced or diced

For dessert Decimae recommends: **Jeanette Thurman's Dream Pie**
 For two nine inch shells mix two cups flaked coconut and 1/4 cup melted butter. Pat into pans and bake at 300 degrees until toasted--should take about 30 minutes.

Mix one No. 2 can cherries and one No. 2 can pineapple, which have been drained. Mix one cup sugar, 1/4 cup cornstarch and 1/2 cup pineapple juice. Stir into fruit, which has been heated with 1/2 teaspoon red food coloring. Stir until thick.

Add 1 box orange Jello and cool. Add five sliced bananas and 1 cup chopped pecans. Pour into shell and cover with 1 pint whipping cream which has been whipped.

The second is borrowed from Janiece Baxter of Faith, South Dakota. She's the former Janiece Bock and is a sister of Charlotte Ratcliff, who lives here.

Fiesta Meal
 Meat Sauce: Brown four pounds ground beef and three chopped onions. Add: 2 cans tomatoes, 1 large can tomato sauce, 2 small cans tomato puree, 4 tablespoons chili powder, 2 or 3 tablespoons powdered garlic and 1 large can Ranch Style beans. Simmer one hour. Add water, if necessary. This can be cooked a day ahead or even a week ahead and frozen.

Arrange following items in order given. Guests serve themselves by placing on plate one on top of the other.

(1) Crushed corn chips; (2) Rice; (I used a whole box of Minute Rice); (3) Meat Sauce--made by above recipe; (4) 1 pound sharp Cheddar Cheese, which has been grated; (5) Lettuce--two heads torn apart; (6) Large bowl diced tomatoes; (7) 3 large onions--diced; (8) 1 jar chopped olives and (9) one ten ounce bag chopped pecans.

Served with bottled hot sauce.

A dessert recipe borrowed from Janiece is for

Cocoa Sheath Cake
 1 stick oleo, 1 cup water, 1/2 cup Crisco and 4 tablespoons cocoa-mix well and pour over 2 cups sugar and 2 cups flour. Add 1/2 cup buttermilk, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 beaten eggs and 1 teaspoon vanilla.
 Mix well. Pour into 9x13 inch pan

and bake 20 minutes at 400 degrees F. Before cake cools, spread with icing.

Icing
 Melt together 1 stick oleo, 4 tablespoons cocoa, six tablespoons milk or cream and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add 1 box powdered sugar and 1 cup chopped pecans.

Beat well and spread on warm cake.

Muleshoe Jaycees will be sponsoring their annual Miss Tri-County Beauty Pageant at the Muleshoe High School on October 17.

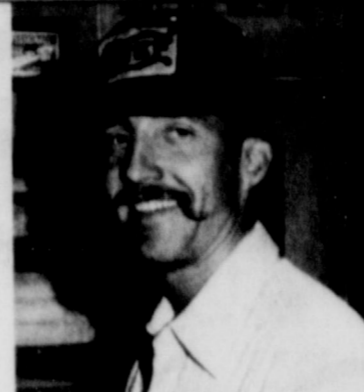

Recognizing the need for establishing a viable organization, the initial session was held in the Panhandle where most of the alcohol producing activity in Texas is a reality. Through this association, we hope to promote alcohol not just for fuel but for many other proven commercial and industrial uses," stated Awtrey.

Speaking of the benefits of alcohol produced from renewable resources, Awtrey proclaimed, "U.S. production of alcohol reduces our

dependency on imported oil and keeps dollars at home which would otherwise be flowing into OPEC bank accounts. Alcohol production creates jobs at home, provides a new tax base and will be of benefit to both the producer and the consumer."

State Representative Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, who sponsored the bill in the most recent session of the state legislature which will provide for a temporary exemption for alcohol which is blended with gasoline, will serve as the temporary vice-chairman of the TAPA. "After many years of waiting, we now have the incentive which will allow Texas to become the number one state in producing alcohol from renewable energy sources. Texas is the number one state in agriculture and energy production and we should become the number one alcohol producer which all others look to for leadership," Kubiak remarked.

The organization will hold a meeting in Dallas on Friday, October 2 to draw up guidelines for research, dissemination of information, promotion and marketing. Final changes to the bylaws of the TAPA will be made which will allow for the election of a slate of officers and to establish a central office.

Chiefs Snap Loss Streak With Big Win At Farwell

All good things must come to an end; according to some ancient sooth-sayer. The same can also be said for all bad things.

The Friona Chieftains are living proof of the latter statement, as they

broke their 0-3 winless record of this season, and a streak which had stretched to 19 straight winless games over three seasons, with a resounding 35-0 win over Farwell's Steers.

The game was played at Farwell last Friday night.

Nelson Jackson will never be nominated for "Man of the Year" in Farwell. Not after last Friday.

Jackson ran the opening kickoff back 85 yards for a touchdown; turned around and ran 93 yards for a score the next time Friona got the ball; scored four times in all; and had 153 net yards rushing.

For his efforts, Jackson was named "Player of the Week" by the Amarillo Globe-News.

The fans had barely settled into their seats when Jackson took the opening kickoff up the left sidelines, found himself in the open at about the 40 yard line, cut back and easily outran the defenders 85 yards for the score.

A try for two points by passing didn't work, but Friona had grabbed a 6-0 lead. Jackson's run took 15 seconds of clock time.

Farwell made three first downs, one on a roughness penalty, moving to the Friona 40. But the Chieftain defense stiffened, and forced a Farwell punt. The Steers got a good kick-out of bounds at the Friona seven.

If the Chieftains were in a hole, Jackson soon got them out. On first down, he took the handoff and bolted through the line, found himself in the secondary, and again was off to the races--and he won the race a second time.

Mark Tucker passed to Rocky Nichols for a two-pointer, and Friona

led, 14-0. Only 4:40 had elapsed in the first quarter.

And that wasn't the end of the first-quarter scoring.

Friona again held and took over near midfield. A holding penalty moved the Chiefs back to their own 45. Tucker lofted a pass to Anthony Brady who caught the ball in the open and ran it in for another tally. Mark Montoya's kick made it 21-0, with 3:33 left in the opening stanza.

Midway through the second quarter, the Chieftains partially blocked a Steer punt, and took over on the Farwell 48. The team picked up a first down rushing, then Tucker passed to Robert Osborn on a 19-yard gain.

A clipping penalty moved Friona back, but Jackson countered with an 18-yard gain. Tucker and Osborn clicked again on a pass, giving Friona a first and goal at the Farwell three.

Two plays later, Jackson punched the ball into the end zone. Friona led 28-0 after Montoya's kick, with 1:24 left in the first half.

Farwell received the second half kickoff, hoping for better things. But the snake-bit Steers fumbled on their first offensive play and Friona recovered at the Farwell 34.

Osborn gave the team a first down at the 18, and then Jackson made it first and goal at the six. A penalty

moved Friona back to the 11. That set the stage for the weirdest play of the game.

Tucker pitched the ball back to Osborn, but the ball went over his head, and Osborn had to retreat to about the 40 yard line to get the ball. He picked up a couple of good blocks, and turned the ball upfield. Finally, after running all over the field, Osborn was tackled at the Farwell five.

Jackson got his fourth TD two plays later, and Montoya's kick made it a 35-0 margin with 5:20 left in the quarter.

Coach Tommy Moss began inserting his reserves at this point, until at one point in the final quarter, it was virtually the junior varsity team in the game.

"We didn't want to run up the score. It was a good chance to let everyone play, and almost every player we took got to see action. Many of them got to play in every quarter," Moss said.

The Friona coach said the win was a good one for the team. "Everyone played well. The defense played a great game. When you have one game in which you only give up two first downs (Boys Ranch), and another when you only give up five (Farwell), that's pretty good defense," he said.

The How Of Worship

1. Go for the purpose of worship. If we go to be entertained, we will be disappointed. If we go to criticize we will find flaws. We go to put ourselves into the presence of God.

2. Go as a participant not as an observer. We go to church with a different attitude than we go to a

play, or a ball game. Then we go to watch others perform. In worship we are a part of the process.

3. The degree to which we become a part of the process depends upon our attitudes of humility and sincerity. Pride and insincerity cut off the possibility of worship. We go as seekers in the best sense of the word.

4. Realize that moods vary. Some days we are more receptive than others. Some days the sermon speaks directly to our needs, some days to the needs of others. Feelings of being in a spirit of worship vary, we appreciate the good days, we continue in spite of the others.

5. The values of worship are realized over a long period of time. They may not develop in just one service or even in many. There may be moments of high inspiration, but mainly such values come over a period of time, almost unnoticed. It is the accumulative influence of placing ourselves in the presence of the highest, week after week that produces lasting results.

6. Public worship is directly related to private worship. Those who benefit the most from public prayers are usually those who have spent time in private prayer. The reverse is also true. Those who meet regularly for public worship find their periods of private devotion have more meaning.

Worship is important, very important for the Christians. So go and worship God! The particular place of worship is not my key concern here. Sure I'd like to have you come and worship at the Congregational Church. I think worship is good and powerful there, but I'm more concerned that you worship God somewhere-anywhere. So, if you can't any sooner, make plans to get to the church of your choice on the 27th. Go and worship!

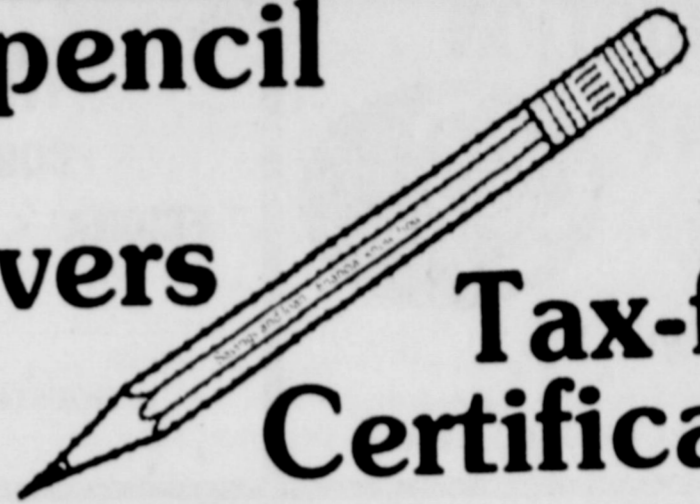
During their training, students learned all phases of the firing and tracking systems of this air defense system.

The Vulcan is a 20mm automatic six-barrel gun mounted on a self-propelled armored personnel carrier and is designed primarily for anti-aircraft defense.



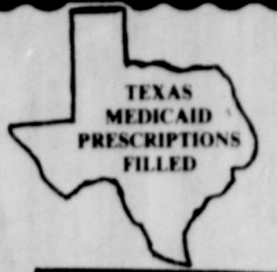
