

With the announcement that two

Floyd county wheat growers this week are poised ready for the harvest of the small grain and it appears that cutting will begin in considerable volume by the first of next week, assuming fair weather. Already first barley and oats have been harvested and trial runs in many wheat fields have been made.

First load of wheat of the 1945 crop to reach Floydada was received late Tuesday by the Producers Cooperative elevator from Fred Jones of Lakeview. The wheat tested 59 and had 16 per cent moisture. Work was stopped to give the crop a day or two more to dry.







#### A GOOD CHICKEN YEAR

Whatever else can be said about 1945 todate, and some of the boys are making some rather pointed remarks that must have the year's chicken year

Nothing like in recent years the up days. high persentage of chicks saved and nothing like the way the young pullets and roosters are developed. Everything has just worked fine for the little feathered barnyard fowls, not only in the barnyard but in the brooder house, the backyard and everywhere they've been stuck around. Town folks have gone in pretty strong for chickens so as to meet the meat situation a bit better, and all of them have been well repaid. It is estimated that town chickens haven't cost their owners more than twice what they could have bought them for, if they could have bought at all. Usually counting losses et cetera a town chicken costs his owner about four times or five what the owner gets back.

Now here is another feature of high interest to all the chicken raising folks. Being on our toes, it sometimes seems although not so ry laugh often as to create jealousy among the neighbors, we have watched the development of the young pullets while plucking the ripe roosters and we note that the early pullets are just now shedding and are putting on their seventh set or coat of feathers. After they do that it is not long until they begin laying. This means that we will have lots of eggs from pullets in August. Always somebody has a few August eggs from early chicks but this time

it will be just pretty general. We often round up facts like this for our reader. Thus he keeps a jump or two ahead of the others.
