## First Wheat Is Marketed; Harvest General in Week

Floyd county wheat growers this week are poised ready for the harvest of the small grain and it appears that cutting will begin in considerable volume by the first of next week, assuming fair weather. Already first barley and oats have been harvested and trial runs in many wheat fields have been made.

First load of wheat of the 1945 crop to reach Floydada was received late Tuesday by the Producers Cooperative elevator from Fred Jones of Lakeview. The wheat tested 39 and had 16 per cent moisture. Work was stopped to give the crop a day or two more to dry.

In most of these it developed that the moisture content was too high. Fields which appear to be ready for the combine are found to have green heads not so tall as the main crop and these add the moisture that make the content too high.

As Good As Last Year  
The crop, barring destructive hails or some other untoward event, will be equal to that of last year, considered an "average" wheat year. Many say their crops, acre for acre, will out-yield last year's crop. Nobody wants to be quoted but there is general agreement that there is "lots of 20 bushel wheat in the county, more 15 bushel wheat and low yields will run seen bushels better." Irrigated lands are going to show up well, with yields above the dry land some 10 bushels per acre.

Plenty of Machines  
Outlook this week is that plenty of help and machinery will be available for the harvest. Machines from outside of the local area are coming in especially from the east where the harvest is just being completed. The cutting problem will not be a problem at all and it appears that the cost will not be excessive either.

Lead Tests Over 61 Pounds  
As indicating that the crop is going to be of high test this year the second load of wheat to reach the market Wednesday tested 61½ pounds. Moisture content was low enough that the grower got the green light on harvesting. This load was raised on the Ted Jones place below Dougherty by Homer Newberry. It came from summer-fallowed land and was estimated to be yielding 14 bushels per acre. Mr. Newberry told Troy Leonard, manager of Farmers Grain company. The load was 190 bushels.

## Named Home Ec Head At TSCW, Denton

Miss Johnie Christian, daughter of Mrs. J. D. Christian of Floydada, who has been a member of the home economics faculty of Texas State College for Women for some time, is now head of the department. ## 28 Miles Farm To Market Road Allotted Floyd

With the announcement that two more pieces of Floyd county road had been accepted in the Farm to Market postwar road construction program in Texas, the total road mileage in the county in the first allotment was brought to 28 miles.

Acceptance made of record this week by the Floyd county commissioners include a 13-mile road from a point on Highway 207 south of Floydada west to the Hale county line at Petersburg through Starkey, McCoy and Allmon communities; and

Seven miles of road from a point four miles east of Floydada on Highway 70 to the vicinity of Lakeview.

Already accepted in the program is the Lockney "cut off" from Highway 70 at Lockney to Highway 207 due east of that city; and the Dougherty spur. The latter already has had some improvement made including a hard-surfaced base and is due to be finished sometime this summer as materials and men are available.

## Chas. Massie Returns Home

Chas. M. Massie, who had been hospitalized in Lubbock for seven weeks, was brought home last Friday and is "doing nicely" according to report from J. M. Massie a brother, yesterday.

"Charlie was a very sick man for days and days," his brother reported, indicating that with care the patient is expected to continue normal recovery.

Charles Massie became ill while at work at the Massie Wholesale grocery, which he manages, in April. He was carried to a hospital. For a time his condition was considered grave by the family and physicians.

## OK Cafe Has New Management Now

OK cafe operated on West side square for the past several months by England and Roddam, is under new management. Lowelda Myrick, the new manager, bought the interests of the former owners last week and re-opened the cafe Saturday.

Mr. England's plans were indefinite the first of the week. Mr. Roddam said he would resume his former trade of painter.

## Alfred Stewart, Edgar Owen, Last American Prisoners of War In Europe Reported Safe, Well

The last two Floyd county's soldiers reported missing in action in the past year and later found to be prisoners of war in the hands of the Germans, have been liberated.

They are Private William Alfred Stewart, son of Mrs. Ollie Stewart of Floydada, and Sgt. James Edgar Owens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Owens of Pleasant Hill. The Owens family received their good news several days ago. Mrs. Stewart received a telegram June 2. In this telegram she was told that her son was back with the Military control. No word was received directly from him.

Stewart had been in the military service four months when he was made a prisoner by the Germans in Italy on October 10. He was with the Fifth army infantry. He has a small son who lives with the soldier's mother.

Owens liberated April 29  
The Owens family were long getting the news of their son's liberation on April 29. A letter from him dated May 29 was their first information. He was in France had been a prisoner for a year, with a total of 27 months in the service. He was in good health, he wrote.

Staff Sergeant James Edgar Owens, waist gunner on a B-17, was shot down on his 21st mission over Europe. He has been awarded the Medal of honor with two oak leaf clusters. His mother received the honors for him in his absence last week in ceremonies at Lubbock army air field.

Maximum penalty for the offense of tampering with mails is three years imprisonment.

## Oil Test Down 2195 Feet, Shut Down 48 Hours

The drill on the oil test at Pleasant Hill on the C. Alexander land was down to 2,195 feet Wednesday morning at 3 o'clock when the rig was shut down for 48-hours to give cement poured at the surface of the well time to dry.

In the 12 days since the test was started progress had been fast with formations following the general trend of former tests in that portion of the county, according to an unofficial report. No statement of any kind was obtained from the drilling contractors.

For the record the test is known as the George P. Livermore No. 1 Alexander in the northeast corner of the J. C. Cooper survey.

## Donald Cornelius Adds Third Oak Leaf to Air Medal

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, ENGLAND—First Lieutenant Donald R. Cornelius, 20, of Floydada, Texas, navigator of a B-17 Flying fortress of the 95th Bombardment group, has been awarded the 3rd Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air medal for "meritorious achievement" while participating in Eighth Air Force bombing attacks on vital industrial targets in Germany, and on Nazi airfields, supply dumps and gun emplacements in conjunction with advances by Allied ground forces on the continent.

The presentation was made by Lieutenant Colonel Robert H. Stuart of San Jose, Calif., group commander. Lt. Cornelius is a member of the Porters' group which has received two Distinguished Unit citations.

The AAF navigator is the son of Mr. Ermin L. Cornelius of 120 East California street, Floydada, Texas.

"Mr. Hartzog is boy and boy's club minded," said Judge Grimes after the court meeting with the district agent, "and we feel we are getting a tested man who will step right in the work here and do of great service to the county and to our boys."

## \$796 Needed To Complete 'Lung' Fund

Yesterday Fire Chief Carl Rodgers said, following a check-up that \$796 of a total of \$2,500 is still needed to finish the purchase of the "iron lung" resuscitator and infant lung.

At the same time he announced that the resuscitator has been received and that it will be especially valuable in cases of drowning and carbon monoxide poisoning. The infant lung also is enroute here from the makers.

"We certainly don't want to be alarmed but it is a fact that polio is on the increase in Texas at this time, and should the epidemic extend to this region we will be in position to meet the situation to this extent with this equipment," Mr. Rodgers said. The epidemic is more pronounced in the City of Houston, where 22 cases were reported by medical men the first of the week.

## Baby Is Victim Of Car-Truck Crash At Goose Creek

Funeral services for little Terry Nell Patton daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Patton, formerly of Floydada were held at Goose Creek, Monday and burial was made in the Floydada cemetery yesterday under the direction of Harmon Funeral home. The baby was born October 29, 1944 and was killed in an automobile accident at Goose Creek, Texas June 1 when a truck driven by a negro ran into the family car.

## Floyd County, Typical of Better Agricultural Sections, Included in Country Gentleman Survey

PHILADELPHIA, June — Floyd county because it is so typical of the better agricultural sections in the country, was one of the 320 counties carefully chosen by Country Gentleman magazine for a nationwide survey on postwar rural housing.

Personal interviews with over 50 rural families in 44 states disclosed that 16.6 per cent of the farmers expect to build new homes, two-thirds having already set aside

funds; 71.5 per cent expect to repair or improve houses at an average cost of \$399; 74.2 per cent expect to repair or improve farm structures at an average cost of \$525; 49.9 per cent expect to buy furniture and home furnishings at an average expenditure of \$253; 68 per cent expect to buy household appliances at an average expenditure of \$211 for this purpose.

Prospective builders will spend an average of \$3,500 for a farm house.

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## Mrs. Wright Tells of United Nations Conference

(Alice Paddock Wright, formerly of Floyd county, now of Los Angeles, had a chance to look in on the United Nations conference in San Francisco recently. Her impressions of the things she saw and heard will be of general local interest.—Ed. Note.)

It was a most interesting experience to be in San Francisco during the United Nations Conference where the forces for good in the world are taking advantage of the opportune time to write an International Charter acceptable to all nations.

At the time that I was there, as an observer, most interest centered around the Russians and the Arabians. Regardless of the time of day or night, when handsome Moslems and his body guards were expected to emerge from the St. Francis hotel, there was always a huge crowd waiting to catch a glimpse of him.

I heard the Argentine question and also the Polish one discussed and the general consensus of opinion was, that it was necessary to admit Argentina following the Act of Chapultepec consummated at Mexico City where the Latin American countries brought pressure to admit the Argentine in order to strengthen

the Pan American Regional Bloc. As to the Polish question it will undoubtedly be settled at a later time and may have been too much played up at the conference.

Secretary of State Stettinius and our delegation had headquarters at the Fairmont hotel and quite in contrast were the conspicuous Arabian princes who were also housed there and who created much interest in their long flowing robes and turbaned headresses. Most unfortunate is the disturbance in Syria at this time. In Algeria and Tunisia which I visited a few years ago the large Arab population seemed very loyal to the French and to appreciate the many improvements made there by France.

Although to bring about agreement of fifty nations with their eight hundred delegates seems quite a stupendous one there will be developed some worth while Charter for world peace provided the major powers remain united and we in the United States assume our responsibility as individuals as for instance the adoption of the Bretton Woods plan without amendments and the continuance of the Reciprocal Trade treaties.

As one commentator has written "We have in each individual a spiritual content that is forever pressing for recognition and expression."

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State

funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over One (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or an account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal Funds; and, provided further that the total amount of money to be expended

out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 25th day of August, 1945, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"For the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and

## The Home Front

(Edith L. Wilson)

Saturday, June 16, at 3 o'clock in the district court room is the date of the first book review sponsored by the Home Demonstration Council. Each member is urged to attend and bring a visitor. The admission is 1 pint of used fat for each person.

Upholstered furniture should come in for its share of refreshing when housecleaning time comes, and for this job try dry suds which work like magic says Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, specialist in clothing for the A. and M. Extension service. The method is simple and effective, and the results satisfactory.

To make the suds, dissolve 1/2 cup of natural soap flakes, beads, chips or bar soap shaved in small pieces in one quart of hot soft water. To test the soap to see if it is neutral, put a bit of it on your tongue. If neutral it will not bite or sting. When the soap solution has cooled to a jelly-like consistency, beat it with a rotary egg beater until it looks like cake icing. Then suds die down.

Remove the dust from the upholstered furniture with a vacuum cleaner or whisk broom. Before shampooing the fabric with dry suds, test in an inconspicuous place to see whether it is washable. If so, then apply the suds to a small area with a brush, sponge or cloth. Use a light circular motion. Scrape off the soiled suds with a spatula. Rinse with a sponge or cloth wrung from clear lukewarm water using a circular motion. Rinse several times. Be sure no soap remains in the material. Use as little water as possible so that the foundation will not become wet. Work quickly and wash a small area at a time and let each new area overlap the last one a little. Place furniture in an airy place to dry, but not in the sun.

If fabric as a nap, brush it after it is thoroughly dry so that the threads will be in the right direction. Leather covered furniture can be washed with suds in much the same way.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

**Section 1.** That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

**Article 5. Section 2.** The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes or to consider applications for writs or error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified.

**Sec. 2.** Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:—

**"FOR** the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members"; and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:—

**"AGAINST** the amendment to the

State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."— If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said

amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.— Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.
