

EDITORIAL As A Farm

INITIATIVE STILL NEEDED

We like a statement issued by Railroad Commissioner Olin Culbertson recently in which he pointed out that people of the southwest need not and should not look for a wholesale migration of plants and factories from the north and east to our part of the world because new freight rates are to be applied based on the recent order of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

What the new rates eventually will do will be to give our part of the nation an opportunity to develop its own resources, to build factories and to distribute manufactured goods to which our resources and our business initiative best fit us. Our area will be able to do these things on equal basis with competing areas of the nation. Heretofore, we have been penalized. Industry which by natural laws would have located in Texas was forced to locate elsewhere by this artificial barrier.

Undoubtedly the date of the Interstate Commerce Commission's order will go down in history as a momentous one in the history of the nation. No doubt the order will to a great degree untie the hands of people with initiative and new ideas in the southwest. No doubt a step has been taken to right a great and grave injustice. But the freight rate is only one of the factors, as the commissioner points out. Under wise leadership we must develop in our own way industries which fit our resources and environment.

EGG PRICES SLIGHTLY DOWN

Egg prices were down slightly last week-end from previous prices and presumably will continue to be slightly off for a few weeks while the quality is "pretty rough". A corollary reason is said to be that the government is out of the market for the present.

For a good many years abortive efforts have been made to get quality eggs sold in this part of Texas and while we hear of an occasional organization or area that sells and guarantees the weight and grade of eggs and thereby gets a better price, there seems to be no doubt that the general run of the people want to sell their eggs as is and let somebody else have the profit, if any. Also, the trouble of separating them out into sizes and grades.

Perhaps this arrangement gets the poultryman about the same in the long run especially if the egg and poultry business is a sideline. But they make it pay, they say, to do differently in other climes.

SOME TOO MUCH TALK

There is somewhat too much talk in America for the good of the country. Not too much freedom of speech, we mean, but too much conversation about the details of the war, where my boy is, and what he wrote home that got by the censor.

It is a fact proven by events that the Japs have paid agents in America. It is a fact that these piece little bits of information together from various sources and that this information has been getting to Japan. The army and the navy and the Bureau of Investigation and the Office of Censorship have had ample proof that the above is true. So much proof do they have that they continue to get out broadsides asking the people of America to be careful of their words. The censors can't catch all the words and phrases the boys in their eager loneliness send back home that might be damaging to America. And they wouldn't hurt a lot if only the family knew them. But when the news it told all and sundry who will listen—they may be—is most likely—an unfriendly ear listening—one paid to hear and to report.

Now that we are closing in on Japan they are desperate for information, how we will strike and where, for instance. And it will still pay not to talk for awhile.

Carey and Joe Ellis went in the tank and were playing with tubs. Two hours and five minutes flying time from San Angelo to Floydada is the speed made by Lee Wilkinson, local aviation enthusiast, in his Eaglerock plane Wednesday of this week. He left San Angelo at about 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and arrived in Floydada at 6:05.

O. T. Williams, vocational agriculture teacher in Floydada High school, together with his family, reached home the latter part of last week from Ames, Iowa, where they have been attending summer school at Ames university.

Nine Floydada boys are in camp at Palacios, Texas, this week where the Texas National guard is in its annual fifteen-day training. They went as members of Battery A, Field artillery.

While the area of Texas west, north and northwest and southwest of Floyd county was getting rains that averaged from an inch to three inches of precipitation, the fall being so heavy in some areas as to make roads and highways impassible for a day or two. Floyd county was also getting moisture but not nearly in such large quantities, and reports to this office indicate that probably a half inch would be an average for this county during the period from Saturday morning to Monday.

with dirt and blood crumpled on the hot ground. But Mr. Spikes began to reassure us he was not too badly hurt. He knew his right leg was pulled out of the hip joint. The two scared little boys and I waited while Wilda went for help and Wilma and Paul.

I could not get Mr. Spike's head in my lap and pushed my hands between his face and the ground. A breeze came, the sun which had had no pity on a helpless man began to hide behind the trees at the house. Soon there were kind friends, the ambulance and the ride to the Plains Hospital in Lubbock.

How did it happen? Only a pair of spectacles, a rubber shoe heel, a hat with the top cut out, a smooth place where a helpless body dragged on top of a mounting pile of cloths and dirt between a moving tractor and a row of eight big sharp discs. Paul read this way: Mr. Spikes remembered he went blind, then nothing else until he found himself wedged on his back in between the land wheel on the left, the axle against his neck, one foot between two discs, the other leg out of place tight between two others.

Paul picked up his glasses, stepped some 27 steps to where the tractor left the row. A shoe heel tightly clamped to a bar on the tractor, a bit of blue denim on the one-way lever, two long slits in the seat of blue overalls told where Mr. Spikes must have hung while the machine chugged on until the dirt changed the tractor's course to the

land already plowed. The hat fell off and passed under the discs, the overalls gave way and the unconscious man was pushed along on a growing pile of dirt until the load became too heavy and the engine died some 30 feet from the row.

Mr. Spikes finally came to. He does not know how long he was "out". Knew he was wedged in with a leg out of joint at the hip and that he might have to stay there until finally we became uneasy and looked for him. He began digging under his shoulders, a hand-full at a time until he was released. Then the pain came, the sun was hot, his mouth and throat were parched, but he had to wait.

Yes, the tractor was only a thing of iron and steel and gas. It died and was still. No six-horse team broke away from the plow to run and kick and tear up the harness.

Household insects, not only those which fly, but those which crawl, are at their annoying worst in midsummer. But Mrs. Bernice Claytor, specialist in home improvement for the A. and M. College Extension service, says that care of screens and free use of proved insecticides will go far toward keeping the home free of flies, mosquitoes and roaches.

Mrs. Claytor lists some simple practices for controlling cockroaches, one of the most common pests which Texas housewives have to contend with. As roaches live to eat, keeping all foods covered is the first step in discouraging them to remain in the house. Another means of reducing the roach population is to examine all boxes, paper bags and packages coming from the grocery and laundry to see that insects they may harbor don't escape into the house.

But probably a good many have become permanent guests, and to get these under control, Mrs. Claytor suggests using sodium flouride.

Use enough of this material in powder form to about half fill an ordinary tin fly spray. Spray the dust in cracks and crevices, in drawers, on tables, in shelves, around baseboards and other runways of the roaches as thinly as possible. Do not put it out in piles or as a thick coating. When it's sprayed thickly the roaches will avoid it. It should be thin enough so that the roaches will run through it.

Sodium flouride is most effective when it is put out in the evening because the roaches move around mostly at night. If the powder is swept up, spraying should be repeated every three or four days. The powder is poisonous and should be kept away from children and pets.

Flies and mosquitoes are not only annoying, but flies spread disease. Accordingly, says Mrs. Claytor, keep them out of the house by tight screens on doors, windows and chimney openings, and destroy as many breeding places as can be found. If they get in, kill them with a household fly spray.

Glenn A. Finley Hospital Cook In Netherlands E. I.

SOMEWHERE IN THE NETHERLANDS EAST INDIES: Private First Class Glenn A. Finley of Floydada, Texas is now assigned as a cook in the 27th General Hospital, one of the largest, and busiest, Army general hospitals in Dutch New Guinea handling battle casualties from the Philippines and other combat areas.

Pfc. Finley cooks in one of the numerous kitchens in the hospital that feeds thousands of patients daily.

The current daily average of patients in the hospital in which Pfc. Finley is on duty is over 2,000, although it was organized to care for 1,500. Every few days 200 to 300 new patients are brought in from hospital ships, as convalescent men are returned to duty or are evacuated to the United States for further hospitalization.

Since a jungle area was cleared for the hospital by an Engineer Aviation battalion and it began to function, shortly after the invasion of Dutch New Guinea by American forces, almost 18,000 patients have been handled.

Pfc. Finley has been in the Army since June, 1942 and arrived overseas in January, 1944. In civilian life he did ranch work in New Mexico. His brother, Corporal Mill F. Finley is now serving with the Air Corps. Pfc. Finley's wife lives in Rochester, Washington.
