**WE ARE CURRENTLY** in the period of time observed by this area every year known as "Will the early-blooming fruit trees survive the late freezes?"

Prompted by early spring-like weather, the apricot and peach trees always bloom out much earlier than they should, causing the owners of the trees to "sweat out" the latter part of March, and early April, wondering if the early blossoms will make fruit.

(We had just such a test for the trees on Thursday of this week, when a cold front blew into the local area early Thursday morning, dropping the temperature to 31 degrees).

Another foe which the blooms and small fruit has in this area is high wind, of which (if you didn't already know) we get a considerable amount during March and April.

Many times you will see the blossoms survive the late freezes and make small fruit, only to have a major part of the crop blown off by a gale-force breeze.

Old-timers will tell you that you will only make a good fruit crop every six or seven years in this area, which in some ways makes all the pampering of fruit trees hardly worth the effort.

But then, one of those good years (such as we had last year) will come along, and you'll begin to hope for "two in a row."

I wonder if they made it through Thursday and Friday night??

**THE CURRENT** feud between the two major airlines based in Dallas-Braniff and American--has raised some interesting statements in recent weeks.

Braniff charged that American Air Lines had tried to put them out of business by hoarding and later dumping \$9 million worth of Braniff tickets for reimbursement at the Airlines Clearing House--a move which created a critical cash squeeze at Braniff.

The president of American Air Lines, Robert Crandell, was quoted as saying "I don't want those people (Braniff) to stay in business."

The ironic thing about the current airline war is that the chairmen of the two companies are brothers. Must be one instance where blood isn't thicker than water.

## New Pickup Bid Awarded At Meeting

The Parmer County Commissioners awarded a contract for a new pickup-truck for the County Agent's use to Friona Ford Sales, Inc., on a bid of \$11,488.70 at the commission's regular meeting this past Monday.

At the suggestion of County Treasurer Benna Felts, a motion was passed to re-invest \$100,000 of General Fund money in a certificate of deposit to mature June 25, 1982, and \$18,000 or right-of-way money, to mature April 30, 1982.

Expenditures of \$1,036 for boarding care for five Parmer County foster children were approved.

It was agreed for the county to be represented at the August meeting of the Texas Association of Counties in Austin. More information on the conference is to be secured later.

A request for repairs to a county road near Lariat was turned over to Commissioner Archie Tarter.

Motion was passed to re-imburse County Judge Porter Roberts for out-of-pocket expenses involved in copying maps showing the re-appointment boundaries.

Judge Roberts was given approval to order a new probate book from the Texas College of Probate Judges.

Several requests for soil conservation work were approved, to be performed when county equipment is in the areas where the work was requested.

## UIL Contest Play Wins District Honors

Friona High School was named a winner Thursday in the UIL Contest Play competition for District 2-AAA schools, held in Muleshoe. Plays from Friona and Muleshoe qualified for the area contest at Plainview April 3.

"I Never Saw Another Butterfly" was the presentation by the FHS group. It is a dramatic epic concerning the suffering of Jewish families, particularly youngsters, during World War II in Nazi Germany.

Gaining "Best Actress" accolades was cast member Heather Fortenberry, and two other cast members, Christy Benge and Amber Smith, were named to the all-star cast.

Jim Rambo, of Western Texas College, Snyder, judge for the event, said "The production was very sensitive and honest." He said he was

"overwhelmed" with Miss Fortenberry's performance.

Joy Morton, faculty director, said she was very proud of those involved with the play, saying they "did a great job."

The performance Thursday gives FHS 42 points in the race for the Spring UIL Literary district meet, which continues next week. Journalism and ready writing will be held here Monday, and other events will be contested on Friday, April 2.

## Doctors Day Slated For March 30th

Seventy-nine years--28,835 days--and nights of colds, colic, and chicken pox, accidents and appendicitis, heart attacks and strokes, the sadness of ushering old friends and neighbors out of this world mitigated as new babies are welcomed-in. That is the awesome record of our local doctors, Paul Spring, Lee Spring and Bob Alexander.

Honoring physicians on a special day each year was the brain child of Eudora B. Almond. As a child she was impressed by the gentle kindness of her family doctor in the small village of Fort Lamar, Georgia.

Later she married a physician and as she worked alongside her husband she became convinced that medicine was the greatest profession on earth.

Mrs. Almond presented to her local medical auxiliary the idea of having a day on which to honor doctors. This idea was adopted nationally in November 1935.

March 30 was the day selected in honor of Dr. Crawford W. Long, discoverer of the anesthetic powers of ether in surgery, 1815-1878. Dr. Long spent eighteen months in New York hospitals where he witnessed great suffering in surgical operations without successful efforts to relieve pain.

"Laughing Gas" parties were popular at that time--early 1800s--and Dr. Long noticed that as people inhaled ether for its exhilarating effects, they could receive falls and blows yet feel no pain.

On March 30, 1842, twenty-six-year-old Dr. Crawford Williamson Long, in practice for less than a year, administered sulphuric ether in a surgical operation for the first time in history. A young man had a tumor removed from the back of his neck, inhaling ether throughout the surgery. The patient was later incredulous when shown the half-inch diameter cyst, having experienced no pain during its removal.

The quiet young country doctor said of his discovery, "It is a divine gift from on high," and after more than forty years of practicing medicine said, "My only wish is to be known as a benefactor of my race."

So it is with our local doctors. They work long hours, fill out endless forms, have interrupted sleep and much of their spare time is spent in reading of new procedures and attending medical meetings to further their knowledge and benefit their Parmer County patients.

If you run into Dr. Paul, Dr. Lee or Dr. Bob, on their day, March 30, tell them "Hi" and that you are glad this area has three dedicated doctors when so many small towns are without.

## Groundbreaking Held For New Library Bldg.

A long-awaited moment arrived this week for those interested in the Friona Public Library, when ground was broken for the new library building.

A 3750-square foot building will be built in the 100 block of West Seventh Street, on property owned by Friona State Bank.

Delton Lowellen is contractor for the building, which will be of steel construction with brick trim. The library will be 50 feet by 75 feet in dimension, and will be set back off Seventh Street, for off-street parking.

The building will face north, with the long side of the building having the entrance.

Starting of construction climaxes a successful fund drive for \$70,000 which has been waged by local library leaders and those interested in a library building.

Helping the drive reach its goal were gifts of \$25,000 from the Don & Syble Harrington Foundation, \$5,000 from the Amarillo Area Foundation, and \$10,000 from the City of Friona. The remainder of the money has come from local contributions.

It was pointed out that additional money is needed to provide some items for the new library, such as new (additional) shelves. It is hoped that some of these things can be purchased by the time the new building is completed.

"If those who have not had an opportunity to give will come forward and make a donation, it can surely be put to use," stated a library official. Gifts of \$500 or more will be

recognized on a plaque listing donors' names.

Among those present for the ground-breaking ceremonies this week were librarian Billie Fairchild, and former librarian Zora Gaede.

Also, Ann Osborn, immediate past chairman of the library board and Mary Johnston, immediate past president of Friends of the Friona Library.

Irene McFarland, who was chairman of the original Friona Library committee, also was present, along with Robert Neelley and Charles Allen, of Friona State Bank.

The building is slated to be completed in May, barring unforeseen delays.

## Jr. Bands Concert Set

The Junior High Bands will present a spring concert on Thursday, April 1 beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the junior high school auditorium.

The sixth, seventh and eighth grade bands will perform in the concert.

Admission of \$1 for adults will be charged. Children under 12 will be admitted free.

The eighth grade band will participate in the UIL concert and sight-reading contest April 6. They will perform their contest music in the competition, according to James Ochoa, director.

### 50 YEARS AGO--MARCH 25, 1932

L.G. Simpson, city water superintendent, is quite busy this week setting water meters for water users who have no meters. It is the plan of the city commission to place all water patrons of the city under meter service just as rapidly as is possible.

### 40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 20, 1942

The Regal Theatre, which has been closed for the past three months, will be re-opened Friday night and will continue with a regular picture show program four nights each week, with matinees on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, Ray Landrum, owner of the theatre, announces.

Lee Spring, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.L. Spring of Friona, made the fall semester honor roll at Texas Tech with an average grade of A, according to a press release from the Lubbock College.

### 35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 21, 1947

The official staff of the Parmer County Community Hospital, which included physician and nurses, was host to the people of Friona and surrounding communities, by holding an open house at the hospital from 4 until 8 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, when the public is invited to attend and be shown through the building. Dr. R.C. Stokes, whom our people are learning to know and love, is the head of the hospital's medical department.

### 30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 20, 1952

Another cotton gin will be located in the Friona area, according to reports being circulated this week. Two Burk Burnett men were in the Hub vicinity this week, and they told farmers of the area that they had purchased 20 acres one mile south of Hub and would commence construction of a new gin within two weeks. The men were H.A. Mills and G.W. Fleming.

### 25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 14, 1957

Tom Atkins of Farwell joined the staff of the Parmer County sheriff's department on Monday of this week. The announcement was made by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace, who says that Atkins will serve as deputy sheriff. He is the first full-time deputy sheriff ever hired in the county.

Billy Nichols began his duties as agriculturist at the Friona State Bank

this week. He will act as a consultant for farmers and will make on-the-spot inspections. For the past several years he has been engaged in farming near Sentinel, Oklahoma.

### 20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 22, 1962

A giant Air Force weather balloon ended its fluttering plunge to earth in the wheat fields of Russell O'Brian, ten miles west of Hub, last Friday. The balloon is reported to have been released by Holloman AFB at Alamogordo, N.M. Lloyd Chesher, O'Brian's son-in-law, was the first to spot the balloon. He said he at first thought it was a parachute falling to earth, but could not see a man attached.

Rheumatic fever is an inflammation that may affect the heart, joints, brain or skin. It is almost always the result of a strep throat infection and is accompanied by fever. The most

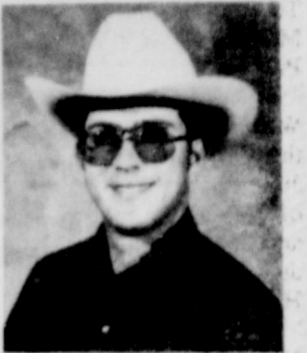

# TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS.

## Don't overpay your Property Taxes.

The Texas property tax system provides certain rights and remedies for property owners. The law also offers tax relief measures to qualified taxpayers. But they do not go into effect automatically; you must apply for them by May 1. To help you understand your rights as a taxpayer, the State Property Tax Board has prepared a free pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, available from your new county appraisal district or local tax office. The publication will help you understand the types of exemptions that are available and what you must do to obtain them if you qualify.

**Rendition**  
One way to assert your rights as a taxpayer is to render your property. This means filling out a rendition statement at the appraisal district office, telling tax officials what you believe the value of your property should be. When you render, the appraisal district or appraisal review board must officially notify you if the value of your property is increased over the amount you rendered.

**General Homestead Exemption**  
If you qualify for a residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the appraised value of your home for school tax purposes, and a \$3,000 exemption for the portion of county taxes levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control. Some jurisdictions may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead.

**Exemptions for the Elderly**  
If you are 65 or over, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the appraised value of your residence homestead for school taxes. And, when you apply and qualify for this exemption, the school tax bill cannot increase on your home, unless you make additions or improvements to it.

**Disabled**  
If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are

entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the appraised value of your home for school taxes. Other taxing jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions. All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.

**Farmers and Ranchers**  
If you qualify, your agricultural or open-space land may be taxed at its productivity value instead of market value. Certain farming implements and machines may also qualify for exemption.

Tax exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications should be made this year, before May 1, at your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax office to find out where to apply for tax relief.

While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rests on the taxpayer. You can obtain more information and apply for your rights and access to remedies as a taxpayer by applying for exemptions and rendering your property before May 1.

Ask for a free copy of *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities* at your appraisal district or local tax office. Or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.
