



Control may be obtained by applying PDB crystals around a tree after removing weeds and grass for a distance of 18 inches from the trunk. Dosages are one half ounce of crystals for a tree under three years of age; three-quarters ounce for a tree just coming into bearing; one ounce for a bearing or mature tree, and one and one half ounce

for an old or large tree. Treat only those showing signs of borer The crystals are applied in a cir-

half or two inches from the tree trunk. If the borer's entrance hole is above the ground, build a dirt lege Extension Service.
