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#### MANY DO FORGET THIS

It is a great pity that more of us do not realize what the Constitution means to everyone. Our will-being, our happiness, our freedom, all our many blessings, all that America is and all that America stands for has been made possible by this great document described as the greatest charter of liberty ever penned by man.

Of the 40,000,000,000 people who have lived on this planet since the birth of Christ, probably not more than 3 percent have lived under a government where they might call their souls their own; where they were something more than herded cattle to be ordered about by someone in power. And by far the great majority of that tiny 3 percent who have had any liberty are those who have lived in this country under our Constitution, since its adoption in 1789.—Address of Frank E. #### WHO WILL PLANT COTTON?

The face of the earth is covered with fall-planted wheat and the prospect is that what is in the ground will look good enough long enough that any of this land is not likely to be abandoned and planted to something else, for instance cotton.

But we are constrained to believe that surely the cattleman, if he can't get any cotton men to plant cotton this year, will undertake it himself. Cattle just naturally need some concentrated feed and the shortage at this current feeding time is ample proof of this fact. Thirty-five dollar cottonseed meal is selling (with OPA controls) up above \$60 per ton. The black market has it nearer \$75. And the man

who is trying to get his at the legal market naturally is finding the supply limited or gone.

A rancher planting cotton would be an anomaly that has no precedent. But a rancher is a man who looks at the actual facts as they are. And we wouldn't be surprised to see men who never planted cotton before taking a chance on getting some cottonseed this fall as they could have a reasonable guarantee on a supply of 43 per cent protein cottonseed meal and cake. Where they will find the land to plant cotton and bundle feed, too, we do not know. But it is interesting to note that men often find a way to do what they think has to be done.

#### DID HE GET HIPPED?

This editorial writer for the Hesperian must have got hipped on the subject of high priced land on the plains, particularly in Floyd county. Unable to quit writing about it, it seems that there are numerous angles that are intriguing. For instance, one reads his history and finds that the man who bought during and following the last war, if he went into debt on his land, lost his breeches, too. With this background, which indicates that credit buying of land now would be equally as bad, one could take a course of thought and arrive at the conclusion that a good many men are headed for the financial rocks again.

But it may turn out that the actual result this time may be entirely different. We have in mind, when we say this, that the national government has put a floor under prices of farm products. Such a thing was undreamed of during and following the last war, so far as we know. This floor is not wholly a protection for the farmer but it is a mighty stiff helper when the time comes. For the government is pledged to keep the man who produces from taking a loss as compared with 1910-1914 income from commodities produced.

Here is the crux of the matter as we see it, and a lot of people cannot realize it is actually so:

The government is to all intents guaranteeing good prices for basic commodities of the farm through 1948. We do not mean to 1948 but through that year. Lawyers of the Department of Agriculture already have decided that is true. So with the stop loss in effect for three crops so far as the market is concerned the land owner's problem is what the weather is going to do. Can he pro-

If he did, what would the price of land be in another three years!

list of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, has predicted. Beef frozen at 18 degrees and then thawed is about 9 per cent more tender than comparable unfrozen beef, he said. The usual freezing temperatures now in use are from zero to 10 degrees.

Snyder explained recent findings of the U. S. Department of agriculture research workers which showed that beef frozen at 114 degrees below zero was 29 per cent more tender than unfrozen beef by pointing out that the increased tenderness was due to action of ice crystals.

In slow freezing at 18 degrees large ice crystals form between the muscle fibers. These draw water from the fibers as they form and push the fibers out of shape without breaking them.

In the fast freezing at 10 degrees, smaller crystals form within the crystals because there is not time for the water to be drawn out. As they form, the crystals break the fibers.

The lower the temperatures and the faster the freezing, the more small crystals form within the fibers and the more the fibers break, Snyder said.

At 114 degrees below zero the freezing is so rapid that nearly every fiber in the meat splits.

## Side Lights From Washington

(By George Mahon)

A suggestion has come to me from a Haskell county citizen that flame throwers which were used in the war may be made available to the counties to combat Johnson grass, cocklebur, and sunflowers along country roads and public highways. For those who hate Johnson grass, as nearly everybody does, this is an intriguing suggestion. But the War Department says no - that the flame throwers are too dangerous for such work and would not be practicable anyway.

A State agency in Mississippi tried out the flame throwers against the underbrush along the lower Mississippi River. The idea was abandoned.

The ordinarily portable flame thrower has a capacity of four gallons of fuel. It has a maximum range of 60 feet and exhausts itself in nine seconds. The tank type flame thrower has a range of 100 yards and a capacity of 270 gallons of fuel which is exhausted in one minute of operation.

So the answer to the Johnson grass menace is yet to be found. It is too bad that the deadly toxicity of the flame thrower cannot be released against it.

West Point Cadet Max Minor, of Tahoko, broke two records and won top honors at a track meet at the United States Military academy a few days ago. His home town of Tahoko did not get due credit in the big write-up about him in the Washington Post. Max was referred to as the speedster from "Cahokia," Texas.

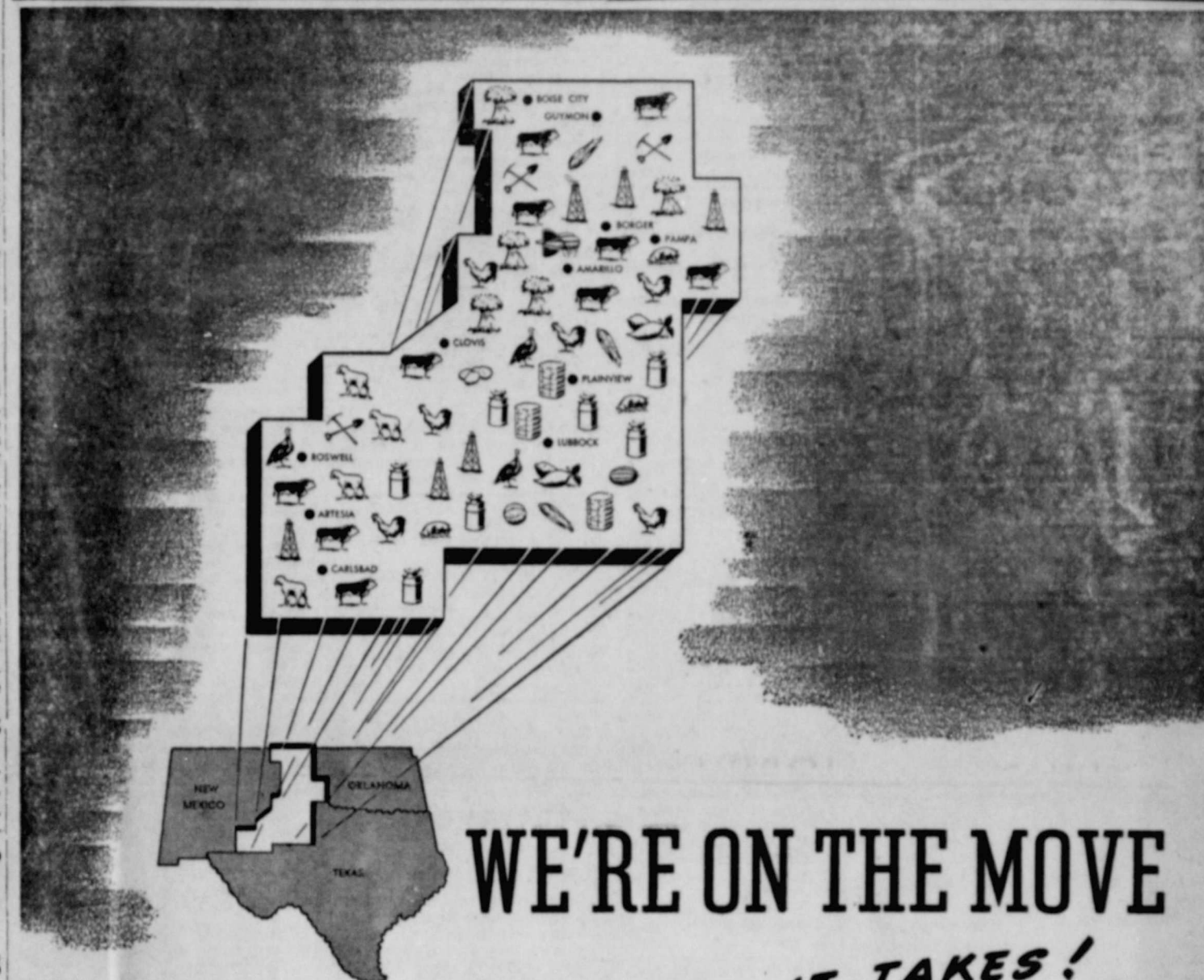

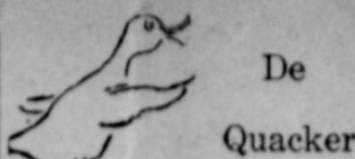
## NEW FACULTY MEMBERS GIVEN WELCOME TO HIGH SCHOOL
