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Side Lights From Washington

(By George Mahon)

In this column last week I referred to our efforts in Congress to pass legislation providing an additional \$100,000,000 loan authorization for REA. This must be done by March 1 if a lag in REA construction is to be averted in Texas and 20 other states.

On February 14 the House approved an amendment to an appropriation bill making the funds available. It is hoped and believed that the Senate will take favorable action in the near future and send the measure to the President for his approval. REA loans are being repaid to the Government; people in the rural areas are getting the benefits of electricity; industry is being afforded a new market for electrical gadgets and equipment; and more work is provided for the laboring people in industrial areas. I joined the others in pointing out these facts during the House debate on the measure, the chairman having given me the privilege of closing the debate.

The conclusion seems inevitable that the job of disposing of surplus Government property has been badly bungled thus far. The top responsibility has been booted from one agency to another.

First the sales were under an agency of the Treasury Department; then the responsibility was shifted to the Commerce Department under Secretary Henry Wallace. From there the job was transferred to the RFC. Today the War Assets Corporation, an agency of the RFC, is in the drivers seat, but next month the War Assets Corporation becomes the War Assets Administration and will no longer be associated with RFC. This, undoubtedly, will be the last shift in responsibility.

While all this tossing about has been in progress, the confusion has been terrific. Lt. General Edmund B. Gregory has now assumed the top job as Surplus Property administrator. That fact offers hope. The General was formerly Quartermaster General of the Army, and he has the reputation for being a man of efficiency and action.

The businessman has become disappointed with the administration of the surplus property program; the veteran has become not only disappointed, but disgusted, over the run-around that he has received--and he has received the run-around. Certificates have been issued to veterans out of all proportion to the availability of surplus property. It has been impossible for a veteran or anyone else to get accurate and complete information, but there has been an abundance of misinformation which has caused many people to make long and expensive trips, only to be disappointed.

I talked personally with General Gregory yesterday, telling him of the dissatisfaction of the people with the way the program had been administered and urging him to do something about it. I based my complaint upon facts which I learned from veterans and others when I was in Texas in January and the letters which I am presently receiving about the surplus property program.

A check-up on the disposition of surplus consumer goods in the four-state area which includes Texas reveals total sales to date of fifty million dollars. In this same region last month there were 1,399 sales to veterans who held preference certificates. But there are many additional thousands of these certificates outstanding.

The over-all job of disposing of surplus Government property is only one-tenth completed. I hope the instant demand for better service will get results in the future handling of the program.

as a specialty, the Bateys now have one of the larger flocks of purebred turkeys in Texas. An elaborate three-day culling, blood testing and weighing procedure last fall under the watchful eye of a representative of the National Turkey Breeders Improvement association resulted in certifying the largest flock of birds for 1946 the couple have yet undertaken to prepare for the mating season.

While the Bateys carry on regular farming operations their turkey business has outgrown expectations and last year had arrived at big business.

The oven and the sales room being the final test for turkeys it can be assumed that the nation-wide demand for their birds as breeding stock will grow to tremendous proportions.

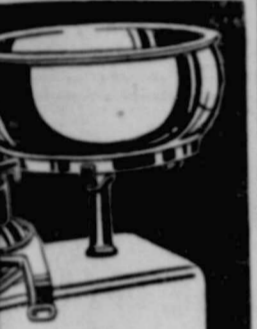

Interesting Story
of Colombia Life
Told by Moss'

Apartado Aereo 1320
Call Colombia, S. A.
January 23 1946.

Dear friends:
Greetings to you from the Mosses
down in Call, Colombia; It has been
our intention to get a "long newsy
letter" off to you for some time, but
it takes a lot of time to get settled
and adjusted in a new country. Even
though we can't preach or teach now,
nor have Baptist work here in Call
we stay busy and on the go all the
time.

At present our main business is to
learn the Spanish language. We
are supposed to spend five hours a
day in study. We have been in
Colombia almost three months now
and I guess our language is coming
up very well, but it seems very
slow to us. We have three one-
hour classes each week under a private
teacher. We can speak enough
to do our marketing and buying, etc.
We are to be here in Call one year
for study, so give us ten months more
and we will be speaking much better;
in fact we hope to be preaching and
teaching by then.

Thrilled By Prospect

We wish it were possible for you
to have traveled with us from Miami
Florida, to Colombia (Oct. 20), to
see all the sights and to observe other
peoples, and above all to see the Baptist
work in Colombia. We left
Miami at 5:30 A. M. and landed in
Barranquilla, Colombia at 12:30 P.
M., after brief stopovers in Cuba and
in British owned Kingston, Jamaica.
We ate breakfast in Miami and
lunch in Barranquilla with the H.
W. Schweinsberg.

The Baptist work in Colombia was
four years old this past November.
Dr. Everett Gill, Jr. Latin American
Secretary, and others say that the
response here in Colombia has been
nothing less than a "modern miracle"
in missions. God has indeed blessed
the efforts of these missionaries,
who have been working hard here,
and you cannot imagine how it thrilled
us and encouraged us as new
missionaries. As you may know,
all of the work here is pioneer work,
beginning from the very start without
one believer. For example, there is
a great possibility that we will be
located in Cali for work. There is
not a Baptist here other than mis-
sionaries and other foreigners. Be-
fore we can have a church we must
win converts, and that is the kind of
work all Colombian missions are
having to do.

Rev. and Mrs. Schweinsberg opened
work in Colombia, in the city of Bar-
ranquilla where they now live. With
them are Misses Darline Elliott,
Helen Meredith, and Carree Spears
(Secretary for the Colombian Mis-
sion). They also now have two
native pastors for 2 of the churches.
Statistics for all the work will be
given at the end of this letter. The
figures may not sound large to you
there, but you must remember that
other fields have worked many years
with a smaller following than this.

Visit to Cartagena

On Tuesday morning (Oct. 23)
we boarded a bus and went to Cart-
agena, about the most historical city
in Colombia. It is a city of about
100,000 people located on the coast
of the Caribbean Sea. The old
Spanish Inquisition house is still
there, as well as the old walls around
the city and old Fort. The Tom
Neeley's opened work here about
two years ago, and now have a good
work going. The Gerald Reddel's
are there now and have been for
almost a year. There is some per-

section there but not much, some-
one stoned the building the night
that we attended services there. A
beautiful building is almost complete
now. It will be a great asset to the
work. We were there three days
and had a very delightful visit with
the fine workers there. They were
really glad to see us, as they very
seldom get to see other Americans
as we do in the other cities where we
have work. The Catholic church
tries to keep the cities isolated as
some years ago they tried to keep a
road from being built that connected
with Barranquilla, only 90 miles
away. All the cities are isolated
here in comparison to even the most
undeveloped parts of the States.
The mountains and the marshes
make highways tremendously ex-
pensive. The majority of the people
here in Call have never been outside
the city. We have been here nearly
three months and not been out at
all. Travel is quiet difficult.

Fly Over Snow Caps

On Friday we returned to Barran-
quilla, and on Saturday morning at
10:30 we left by plane for Bogota, the
capital of Colombia, (a city of 300,000
people and no Baptist work at all),
and landed at 2:30 P. M. We stayed
over night there and made fine
though, neither of us spoke Spanish
nor they English. We really felt
like strangers in a foreign land.
There the temperatures average
about 57 degrees the year round, and
is quite different from Barranquilla
and Cartagena which are both hot.
Sunday morning at 6:10 we boarded
the plane for Cali. Enroute we
flew over mountains and looked
down on snow capped peaks that
were very beautiful. At 7:30 A. M.
we landed in Cali and were glad to
be met by the C. W. McCulloughs
and Misses Todd and Rindour who
are studying the language also. A
great sense of relief came over us
when we saw them.

Cali is a city of 120,000 people and
more, located in the heart of the
rich Cauca valley. It is over 300 feet
above sea level and has a tempera-
ture average of 75 to 78 degrees.
The climate is very pleasant except
for tropical sun at mid-day, but
it does get monotonous and some-
times we wish for a freeze. The
people here in Cali in general are
very liberal, and we believe we will
enjoy a good bit of freedom in our
work here.

The city has a good water sys-
tem. In fact is very modern in
some respects, we have electric lights,
telephones, etc. The standard of liv-
ing is pretty high, though the morals
of the people are very low. All big
holidays and feast days turn out to
be days of drinking and revelry.
No sense of honor or honesty are

This country is called or could be
called the land of locks and keys, as
every person carries a big ring of
keys. We never leave the house
without locking all doors, pantry,
closets or any place where anything
of value is kept. We keep a maid in
the house and mainly for the keep-
ing of the house when we are gone.
(It surely is a help to have her
wash dishes, etc., Ha! We pay her
\$12 (pesos) a month). This condi-
tion exists all over Colombia, so you
see some things of the great need
of the Gospel and the principles for
which it stands.

Customs Interesting

there. All foods are very high, with
the exception of fruits. We do not
buy canned foods at all. A No. 3
can of peaches costs \$2.50. A small
can of soup is \$1.00 (these prices are
Colombian money, of course. The
rate of exchange is \$1.70 for \$1.00
our money). Butter is \$1.50 a pound,
bacon \$1.50 a pound, lard 80 cents,
flour 35 cents a pound. Most of our
food is prepared in the home and
takes much time.

Because of better climate and
other advantages Cali is to be the
language center for all new mission-
aries to Colombia, and also the loca-
tion for the Seminary which we
hope to have before too long. In
the light of recent developments we
are very likely to be stationed here
for work. We will know more defi-
nitely when we write again.

Church Statistics

Following are a few statistics of
our work in Colombia. It is given
by cities:
1. Barranquilla: 3 churches, 3
missions, 500 in Sunday school, 175
church members.
2. Cartagena: 1 church, 1 mission,
50 in Sunday school and 30 church
members.
3. Sabanalarga: 1 church, 90 in
Sunday school and 50 church mem-
bers.

This place is between Barranquilla
and Cartagena and has a native
pastor.

Attendance at Cartagena was low
because of lack of room at their
meeting place. They hope to be in
their beautiful new building by March
(money for their building was
given by Jarmon of Jarmon Shoe
Co.)
We are very happy here and are
looking forward to a busy life when
work opens here. On the whole Col-
ombians are very kind and courteous
to foreigners and that makes life
easier here than it would be other-
wise. Another thing that helps is
getting letters from home. We wel-
come mail at all times. Address us
as given at the first of letter. Air-
mail letters have been coming
through in four days, while boat
mail comes for 3 cents and a month
to reach us. Air mail 25 cents.

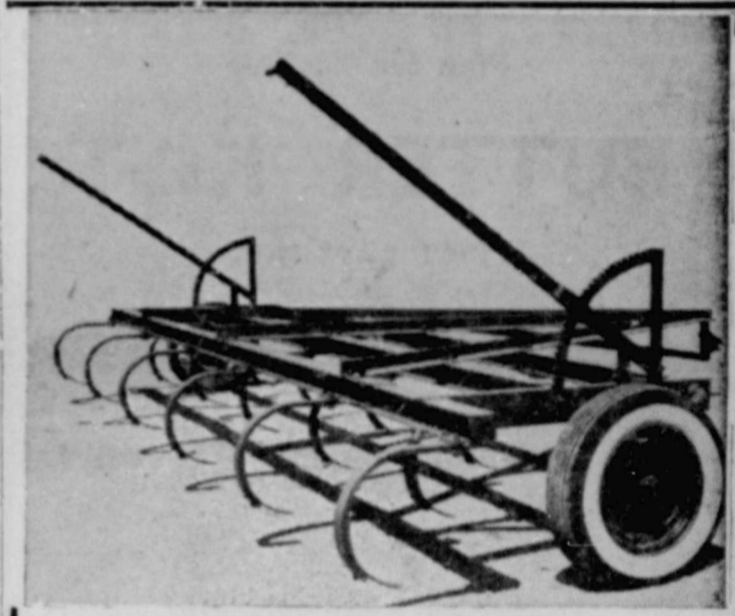

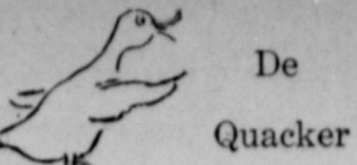
