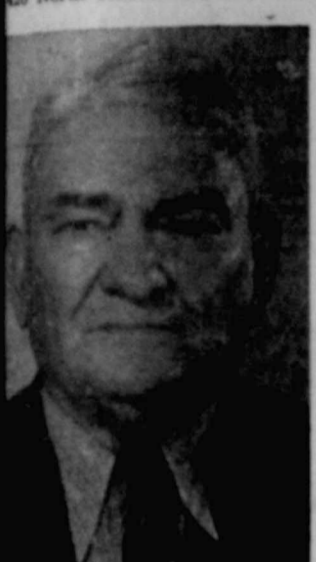

## Problem Being Tackled Placing Returned Men

With 600 veterans of Floyd county already home from the war and 300 more due back by June 1, a realistic approach to the problems of these men in getting back into civilian life is being made by an informal committee of Floyd county business and professional men.

Seen by F. M. Dougherty weeks ago as a Number One problem for the community during this year and urged by him on American Legion and other organizations, the placement of men in business and on farms, where they fit in by talent and inclination, will have attention of some of the best minds in the county.

The county-wide organization will have no official connection with any government agency but has been and is working in close coordination with any representatives of the Veterans Aid and Veterans administration.

Last week McDermott post, American Legion, named five men who are being impressed into service to urge a program that will place veterans in jobs or at work for themselves.

Dougherty's program urges that veterans be given preference, where sound business practices can be followed, even to the extent of taking land away from capable lessees of long standing and turning it over to veterans to operate.

Working through the County Veterans' aid, Darnell Ayres, and through any other available agencies, the committee anticipates being helpful in many instances.

### Schools of the County Will Be Closed Friday; Teachers Meeting

Superintendent H. P. Clemons of Lockney, Superintendent I. T. Graves of Floydada, and County School Superintendent Clarence Guffee of Floyd county, are members of the house of delegates at the meeting and Mr. Graves in on the nominating committee for the election of officers the ensuing year.

Control of the movement of wheat and flour, nation-wide, went into effect last Saturday, with the U. S. Department of Agriculture administering the order.

Although not realizing immediately by growers and handlers of wheat, this week impact of the order was being seen plainly by handlers especially.

The order does not as yet force sales of privately-owned wheat in the hands of the grower. However, it does force handlers to report weekly and millers who need wheat may order this wheat at the established price.

A hurried survey of the county indicates that little government-owned wheat is here. Practically all that is in storage in elevators and on farms is privately owned.

Retailers who beginning to receive the new type of flour say that they anticipate little complaint from consumers.

The program is urged by the government to save millions from starving in war-ravaged areas and home consumption will be curtailed in every possible way.

**AMMONIA VS. TOOTH DECAY**

Tooth decay, America's No. 1 ailment, has been blamed on bacteria, lack of fluorine in diet, too many carbohydrates.

Whatever causes it, four Illinois university scientists think they have found how to prevent it. The magic preservative is—ammonia.

An ammonium-nitrogen compound (not the same as household ammonia) was found to exist naturally in the saliva of people immune to tooth decay, the doctors found. With this clue, they began testing.

Test. Patients who used ammonia-phosphate mouthwashes and tooth-cleansers soon showed "significant" decreases in Lactobacillus acidophilus (micro-organism whose presence in the mouth is "yardstick" of tooth decay). Other test-cases, eating the same foods but using no ammonia, continued to breed L. acidophilus.

## Garden Growers Make Ready For Season as Agents Point Out Possible Great Need for Foods

With the nation's food picture still critical A. L. Hartzog, Floyd county agent, expressed the opinion this week that our war-time victory gardeners who met family food needs in part by growing and canning or storing home-grown vegetables throughout the war had made a great individual contribution to the welfare of their community and it was his hope that, as gardening time is almost here again, each gardener will prepare his soil, select his seeds and again demonstrate his ability to produce a fine variety of food products for the consumption of his and neighboring families.

Industrial steel shortages have reduced the vegetable and fruit pack in winter garden areas. However, the probability is that canning materials will be available in reasonable quantities in time for processing local production which develops late in the garden season.

If early garden crops of other areas are lost to processors food stuffs grown here for local processing may be urgently needed to supplement the short supply of canned goods which will be found on the grocer's shelf.

The agent said that now is a good time to arrange and plant frame gardens and hot beds or to plant potatoes, English peas, and New York 12 Lettuce (heading) in open ground.

To insure better production from the home garden plot the following points may be considered: Soak overnight in water seeds which germinate slowly. If barnyard fertilizer is used apply it several weeks in advance of planting. Rotate garden site or rotate vegetables within it. Replant every week some kind of vegetable and keep the garden plot in full production.

Both your dealer and we were encouraged by this production picture at the turn of the year. But the strike changed all that. As you know, the CIO United Farm Equipment & Metal Workers of America called a strike in ten of our plants, on January 21, 1946.

**What Is The Strike About?**

Wages are a basic issue. At the time of the strike, Harvester employees were among the highest paid workers in American industry. When the strike began, the average hourly

earnings in the ten plants, not including overtime, were \$1.15½. If present wage proposals are adopted, this figure will become \$1.33½ per hour.

When the strike began, negotiations were broken off by the Union on the issue of compulsory union membership. The Company has no desire to weaken the Union. It recognizes certain reasonable needs of the Union. But the Company does oppose compulsory unionism. It feels strongly that an employee's membership should be a matter of his own choice.

### Material Costs and Price Relief

Wages and materials are the great costs of operating our business—together they consume all but a few cents of every dollar the Company takes in. Wages are obviously going to be high—and nobody knows just how high material costs will go.

In the face of rising costs of materials, the Company does not see how it can pay the wage increases recommended by a Government fact finding board until it has definite and satisfactory assurance from the Government that reasonable price relief will be granted to the Company within a reasonable period of time. This matter is of such importance that it will not be discussed here, but will be covered by future advertisements devoted to both prices and profits.

Speaking for our dealers and ourselves, we can assure you that no customer is more eager than we are to resume production. We are doing and shall continue to do everything in our power to bring about a fair settlement as soon as possible.

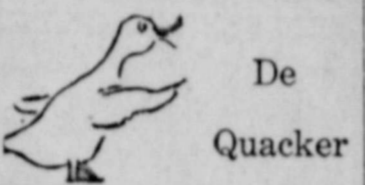
