





Although not realizing immediate-ly by growers and handlers of wheat, this week impact of the order was being seen plainly by handlers es-Pfc. Edgar R. (Buddy) Gound, son of W. A. Gound, landed in New Jer-

The order does not as yet force sales of privately-owned wheat in the hands of the grower. However, it does force handlers to report weekly and millers who need wheat may order this wheat at the established price. Red tape of processing the order includes forwarding it to a central agency for approval. One immediate effect will be to make it difficult for feed processors to ob-tain supplies of wheat. Another will be to stop truck hauling of the grain. At this time there is no way by which a trucker can obtain authority to move grain to market. Farmers may sell to their elevators or other buying agencies which may later be recognized and licensed. Not Much Loan Wheat

> A hurried survey of the county indicates that little government-loan wheat is here. Practically all that is in storage in elevators and on farms is privately owned. Deal-ers anticipate headaches incident to the movement of the grain will be numerous.





Side Lights From Washington


(By George Mahon) This column is being written on Saturday afternoon, March 9, and will be air-mailed to Texas before 6:00 P. M. During the war, mail service between West Texas points and Washington, D. C. was quite erratic and undependable. The service is now improving. Regular mail requires about three days, sometimes four, and air mail deliveries are usually made in two days. Recently I made some tests on air-

mail service between Washington and the two towns in our District that have commercial air-line ser-vice—Lubbock and Big Spring. All of the letters were delivered within two descent as of them were detwo days; a few of them were delivered overnight

The eight cent air-mail postage rate is too high and, in my opinion, it will be only a matter of months before the rate will be reduced and service improved.

There has been a serious break-down in the delivery of mail to and from the far Pacific on account the reduction of Air Force act-I presented a number of ints which I had received to ivities. the Adjutant General some time ago, urging that immediate steps be taken to provide adequate air-mail facilities to our men in Japan and China and other Pacific areas. Both your dealer and we were encouraged by this production picture at the turn of the year. But the strike changed all that. As you know, the CIO United Farm Equipment & Metal Workers of America called a strike in ten of our plants, on January 21, 1946.

What Is The Strike About?

Wages are a basic issue. At the time of the strike, Harvester employes were among the highest paid workers in American industry. When the strike began, the average hourly

earnings in the ten plants, not including overtime, were \$1.15%. If present wage proposals are adopted, this figure will become \$1.33½ per hour.

When the strike began, negotiations were broken off by the Union on the issue of compulsory union membership. The Company has no desire to weaken the Union. We will definitely reserve a percentage of our cars for those who have served in the Armed Forces. We feel sure that all our customers will agree with the justice of this exception.

3 If definite need for a new car is a factor, we will, in the public interest, determine such cases on the basis of the now abolished, but publicly accepted, OPA priority lists.






