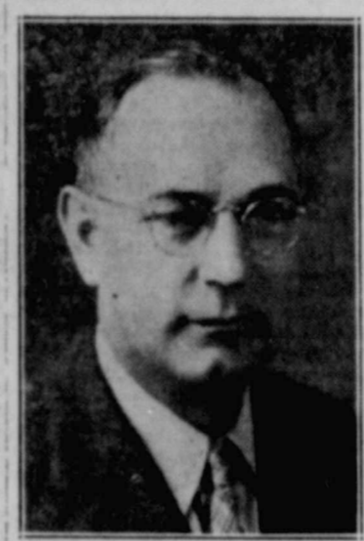

FAVORED VEGETABLES

What are the favorite garden vegetables? A sample survey by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics last fall gives a reliable guide by listing the kinds that gardeners actually did plant, many of them after years of experience, others after from one to three seasons of experience in Victory Gardens during the war years.

The following list of seven vegetables includes those favorites, each of which was growing in 1945 in more than half the gardens not on farms, named in order of frequency of planting: Tomatoes, string or wax beans, onions, lettuce, radishes, beets and carrots.

In farm gardens, where the space available was greater, there were five additional kinds of vegetables, each of which was grown in more than half of all the farm gardens: Potatoes, cabbage, green peas, sweet corn, and cucumbers.

Social Security Representative Due Again Wednesday

John Palmer, Social Security board representative will be in Floydada at the United States Post office at 11:00 a. m. Wednesday April 10.

He is in Floydada one day each month for the purpose of answering any questions people may have on social security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who may be entitled to benefits, and of taking applications for social security account number cards.

After a worker begins to draw old-age and survivors insurance payments he should remember that if he has a living wife that she too may be entitled to benefits when she attains age 65. Therefore, it is important that contact be made immediately with the field office manager who will gladly furnish all the necessary information concerning the filing of claims for benefits.

FOSTER PLANT DISEASE

Weed growing on western ranges are a problem in control of curly-top of sugar beets, beans, tomatoes and some other crops, because the weeds foster the beet leafhopper, the carrier (or vector) of the disease. Weedy ranges are the breeding ground of the insect. Some U. S. Department of Agriculture scientist have developed varieties of beets resistant to the disease. Others have studied the relationship of weeds and grazing practices to the damage done to crops by curly top.

Pathologists have found that where grasses and perennials cover the range, the leaf-hopper menace is reduced. On the other hand says R. L. Piemeisel, pathologist of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Soils, and Agricultural Engineering, the plowing of range lands that are later abandoned, or damage to range vegetation by burning and over-grazing permits weeds such as Russian thistle and mustard to come in. Rodents and jack rabbits may damage the weed-excluding grasses and make ranges weedy.

The studies show that after the original cover is destroyed, there is a succession of vegetation that tends to recover the area with the native perennials that do not harbor leafhoppers. In time weedy ranges may come back to provide good grazing.

The first stage of the return succession is Russian thistle; second, mustards, and third, downy chess, an annual grass that is not host to leafhoppers. Perennial grasses may then come back unless renewed damage sends the succession back to start. But the thistle and mustard stages may recur, over and over again, and the annual and perennial stages may fail to follow and restore the range.

The recent studies indicate that rodent and jack rabbit control may make the difference between success and failure, not only in natural successions, but also in the large scale programs of drilling adapted grasses to hasten range restoration. Jack rabbits are sometimes overlooked as a factor, but scientist find that because of their destruction of grasses in the succes-

ion, rabbits may keep the land more or less permanently in weeds that are no good as forage and that because of the beet leafhopper are a source of damage to crops.
