

A reception will follow, with refreshments provided by Beta Sigma Phi sorority.


Firms Set Mon. Closing

Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill,

The Texas Legislature is still scrambling to propose a successful solution to school finance by June

1. The Texans Against Robin Hood organization has a plan and voters may wish to write or call Senator John Montford or Speaker of the House Pete Laney with suggestions or an endorsement of this plan?

1. Dedicate lottery revenues to property-poor districts.

2. Have the legislature define the minimal standards for a constitutionally efficient system, with the state ensuring that the basics are funded.

(This constitutionally efficient system would be first through twelfth grade at a minimum. It would require funding for principals, teachers and minimal administrative overhead. This legislatively-defined efficient system would set forth the basic required courses and basic electives for students to take, as well as paying for the instructional materials needed for those courses. The state would be responsible only for making sure that the basics are funded. School districts could decide what "extras" to include, and fund those programs or services at the local district level, utilizing local property taxes. This "no frills" approach to education by the state should end any dispute in the courts about substantially equal access, since the state would ensure that even the poorest districts would be able to provide a basic education to their students.)

3. Reduce a bloated educational bureaucracy that stands in the way of implementing a truly efficient system of education in Texas.

Development Program (RC&D) is meets quarterly. At the High a rural development program run by people who live in the area it representative shares project needs serves. The Soil Conservation Service provides coordinators in these areas as well as limited financial assistance. RC&D was established in 1962 to help local units of government conserve and properly use natural resources in solving local problems. The program has grown to now assist rural people and communities improve their quality of life.

Parmer County has joined with 13 other counties in the northwest and central panhandle to form the High Plains RC&D area. Currently the High Plains Council has submitted an application to USDA in Washington to be officially recognized and considered for funding in the form of a full time coordinator to assist each county with projects.

Projects that are possible under RC&D include: economic development, wildlife/hunting, rural fire protection, recreation, waste disposal, education, erosion control. rural health, tourism and water

Parmer County currently has 11 sponsors of the RC&D program, which is more than any other county in the area. These include: Parmer County Commissioners Court, Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, Friona Chamber of Commerce, Bovina Chamber of Commerce, Farwell Chamber of Commerce, Rhea/Hollene Volunteer Fire Dept., Lazbuddie Fire Dept., Lazbuddie EMS, City of Friona, Friona Evening Lions Club, and Pioneer Heritage Chapel and Museum of Friona.

Pamela Miller of Lazbuddie is currently serving as president of the Parmer County council. Bill McCoy is vice president and Jacquelyn Ryan is secretary/ treasurer.

Peppers Come In Several Varieties To Suit Individual Taste Desires

is spicy food. I don't necessarily like it so hot that it burns off my taste buds, but I do like a little bite to what I eat.

Any kind of pepper can be the scale and try something from roasted, but bell, Anaheim and poblano peppers are the most frequently roasted. Chiles can be roasted in the broiler, over a gas flame or on an open grill.

To roast chiles, place the whole peppers in the broiler, directly on the flame of a gas burner or on the barbecue grill. Allow the The most common peppers in chiles to cook, turning frequently, until they are charred and blistered-about 20 to 30 minutes.

Remove the peppers from the heat and place them in a paper or plastic bag or wrap them in a dish towel or paper towel for about 15 to 30 minutes to steam them and help loosen the skins. In a blender or food processor, puree

the pepper mixture until smooth. Return the mixture to the saucepan. Whisk in the cream and cook until heated through; do not boil. Salt and pepper to taste.







"Exceptional academic talent is a materials and publications. A precious national resource that is often undervalued or ignored in our society," said TIP's executive director, Dr. David Goldstein. "For many outstanding young people, recognition from TIP is an important source of support and encouragement for their efforts."

All students attending the ceremony scored as well or better than the average college-bound high school senior on either the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Testing Assessment (ACT). These tests are administered as part of an annual Talent Search. In 1992-93, the program identified almost 62,000 seventh-graders, nearly a six-fold increase from the original Talent Search in 1980.

TIP's Talent Search identifies seventh graders in sixteen states in the Southeast, Midwest and Southwest who have scored in the top three percent on a national achievement test. Students participate by taking either the SAT or the ACT. TIP provides all

to TIP students in the tenth grade. TIP is a non-profit, educational organization designed to identify and develop academic talent. Over the past decade, TIP has established itself as the largest program of its kind in the nation. Since 1980, over one-half million students from all parts of the world have taken part in a TIP program. The program receives support from student fees and donations from individuals, corporations and foundations.

About Diabetes And The Eyes

Most of us think of diabetes as a sugar/insulin imbalance, an illness to be managed with diet and drugs where needed. What few people realize is that the diabetes

affects the entire body, and in particular, the eyes.

A diabetic needs to take extra care of eyesight. Most basically, of course, blood sugar levels must be checked regularly and general diabetic diet and drug regimens followed. Eyes should be examined on a set schedule, every three months to every year, depending on need.

The optometrist will pay special attention to the diabetic's special eye concerns. Because there is a possibility of retinal changes to occur that will permanently affect vision, the eye doctor will check the retina often, even if the patient does not report vision changes.

Blurred vision may be a problem for diabetics, usually caused by a temporary blood sugar imbalance. This generally clears when blood sugar levels return to normal, if treatment is given promptly.

Mutual Fund Taxation

Mutual funds offer many benefits to shareholders, such as reinvestment of dividends, automatic withdrawal plans and nocost switching among funds. Unfortunately, all these transactions are taxable events.

(IRS) uses a simple principle for any security transaction: You pay taxes on the difference between the date, price and dollar amount of cost at which you bought and the each purchase or sale, the total cost cost at which you sold. Determining that difference, transaction, and the average cost per however, can be difficult.

Many shareholders unknowingly pay double taxes by not figuring the reinvested dividends (already taxed) into the cost of the shares sold. It is estimated that about 70 percent of shareholders do reinvest dividends, so this issue has become a major concern. For example, when your fund pays a dividend and you reinvest it, that dividend is still a taxable distribution. The reinvested amount then increases your cost basis. For example, if you invest \$1,000 and earn a \$40 annual dividend, which you reinvest, your cost basis is \$1,040.

If your fund does not yet offer this service, don't despair, and certainly don't change funds for this reason alone. More user-friendly statements are sure to become increasingly widespread as fund


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
