Rural Hi School Election Called For August 21

Reconsidering their vote of last week the Floyd County School board assented to petitions of citizens of the six districts of Lockney, Sterley, Prairie Chapel, Ramsey, Pleasant Valley and Irick on Monday of this week and voted to order an election for a Rural High school district embracing the area aggregating more than a hundred square miles.

The order issued is for the election to be held on Wednesday, August 21. The six districts have been trying to get together on a working basis for several months in order to meet their scholastic problems in some kind of a consolidation.

This latest effort stems from failure in an election three weeks ago in which it was planned to effect consolidation on a common school basis.

The proposition will state on the ballots, "For the Grouping for high school purposes", and "Against the grouping for high school purposes".

Bonus on Alfalfa Is Prompted by Desperate Need

Floyd county alfalfa growers have the opportunity to cash in on the 1946 alfalfa seed program which was announced this week by the Production Marketing Administration (AAA).

Ray S. McEntire, administrative officer of the PMA, said, "Seven cents per pound will be paid for alfalfa seed harvested in 1946 and sold into commercial channels before January 1, 1947. There is a desperate need for legume seed to help restore the nation's soil which has depleted rapidly during these high productive years."

He continued, "Satisfactory proof of sales will be required as well as purity tests since the payment is made upon a clean seed basis."

This payment will be made in addition to the regular farm assistance. Prior approval by the county committee is not required.

\$300 Needed For Ground Lighting Fund

After finishing the job of installing flood lights at Floydada Rodeo grounds, the sponsors this week indicated that about \$300 is lacking to complete payment on the improvement. They are hoping to have sufficient donations to take care of the deficit. Charley Bedford at the bank and Char Glover of the softball league will receive any donations made.

Meanwhile the lights are being used in rodeo practice and also in league softball games almost nightly.

Mrs. Crawford Injured When Hit by Auto

Mrs. Crawford, mother of Mrs. B. P. Sandefur of Route 1, Floydada, sustained severe injuries Thursday night of last week when she was struck down by a car driven by Leonard Alexander on South Main street. The accident occurred in front of the home of Mrs. Minnie Smart at approximately 8:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Crawford was thrown 10 feet from the car and received a broken arm and leg. She was brought to the Floydada hospital and then taken to the hospital in Plainview, where she is in a serious condition. An investigation by Sheriff Lee Howard showed that Mr. Alexander did everything that was possible to avoid hitting Mrs. Crawford, who stepped into the car's path from behind a parked vehicle.

PLEASED ABOUT THAT

The fact that the pre-election
 pollers made a major miss on the
 poll of the voters on the governor's
 race in Texas lends some satisfac-
 tion to a person who views such in
 the light as we do.

"Samples" from all strata of the
 social make-up were taken by the
 pre-election pollsters, they said
 and they announced with confidence
 their findings of what would hap-
 pen on election day.

Our inclination to think that this
 cannot be done successfully over a
 run of years, got somewhat of a
 jolt in the last two national elec-
 tions when the poll-samplers an-
 nounced so nearly exactly what
 would happen days before it did
 happen. Perhaps the science of
 "sampling" had come to such a fine
 point, we began to think, that a
 man who knew how could put the
 electorate under a glass as it were
 and come up with the answer to
 what the voters in a whole nation
 intended to do and would do some
 days hence.

However, it is only when the
 trends are all in the same direction,
 probably, and when the samplers do
 their work in a wholly objective
 manner and ask the right questions
 to get the right shade of answers,
 that this can be true, it now ap-
 pears. When there are currents and
 cross-currents of public opinion and
 the minds of the people are still in
 a flux the "samples" do not turn out
 to be correct for the whole of public
 opinion. That seems to have been
 proven in Texas this year.

PREDICTING IS HAZARDOUS

About every so often some person
 comes up with one of these "in-
 falible" predicting plans for deter-
 mining what the voters will do in
 an election. It will be recalled that
 the Literary Digest had such a
 scheme. So strongly did the pub-
 lishers believe in their scheme that
 they gambled the high reputation of

that periodical and its long money-
 making record on the turn of a
 presidential campaign.

The Literary Digest was so wrong
 and its ego was so badly punctured
 that what had been a three million
 dollar investment was worth practi-
 cally nothing on the day following
 the election. A human is fallible
 and his works are also.

HARD ELECTION TO REPORT

This year's election was one of the
 hardest to report that newspaper
 men have tried to handle in a good
 many years. Perhaps it was that the
 newspaper makers had forgotten the
 technique of it or possibly a great
 many new and untried workers were
 on the job. Whatever it was that
 will get designated as the cause, the
 fact remains that at 11:30 Saturday
 night, four and a half hours after
 the polls had closed, Texas Elec-
 tion bureau had less than 200,000
 votes accounted for out of nearly
 a million and a quarter. In pre-war
 years that would not have been ac-
 ceptable to the members. However,
 much other work that newspaper
 people are doing these days is far
 below the pre-war standards, and
 the publishers may accept this first
 primary election job as just another
 manifestation of the times, and let
 it go with hoping for another and bet-
 ter day.

A VERY FEW DROPS

The clouds which assembled on
 primary election day in Floyd county
 and squeezed out a few drops of
 moisture in the early morning hours
 of July 28 did not do a good en-
 ough job to get credit for it. We
 would call that a miss.

The combination of the candi-
 dates shaking the bushes and the
 walk in and the Hesperian hang-
 ing up a bit outdoor board for the
 raindrops to splatter up ought to
 have been enough to make a good
 rain. It always had for a quarter
 of a century or so before the war.

These are new times under a
 great change. Perhaps rain-making
 has undergone a change like other
 things. Anyway we want to have
 credit for a brave try and we want
 our people to understand that we
 think the candidates did not begin
 soon enough and work hard enough
 if anybody is going to get the blame
 we'd like for them to have it. It's
 all over now with the most of them.
 But the Hesperian has got to keep
 on trying to please the public.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

For the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collecting derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, how-

ever, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1945, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and the constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and construction and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for

any purpose.
 "Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

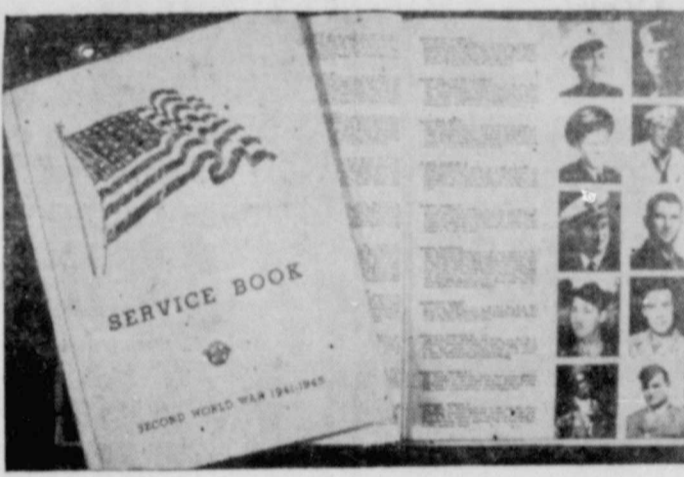

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School Musts Youngsters

From a health standpoint children are not ready for school until they have been vaccinated against diphtheria, tetanus, and typhoid. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, reminds parents to enroll their youngsters before school opens. Many school children have never been vaccinated, and

also those vaccinated in babyhood should be taken to the physician for vaccination now, so that the scar will be well healed before school opens.

Immunization against diphtheria is also strongly recommended for further protection. Parents are urged to have their children protected from diphtheria by immunization with toxoid. Children who had this protection in infancy should receive a booster dose before entering school in order to maintain immunity at a high level.

These two types of protection against disease should be considered 'musts' for preschool children, Dr. Cox declared. "Any other immunizations that the physician recommends will, of course, provide additional health security."

In addition to this protection against specific communicable diseases each child getting ready to enter school should also receive a complete physical examination by his private physician or at the nearest clinic. Any treatment or correction of defects advised by the doctor should be undertaken immediately in order that the child may enter school in the best possible condition.

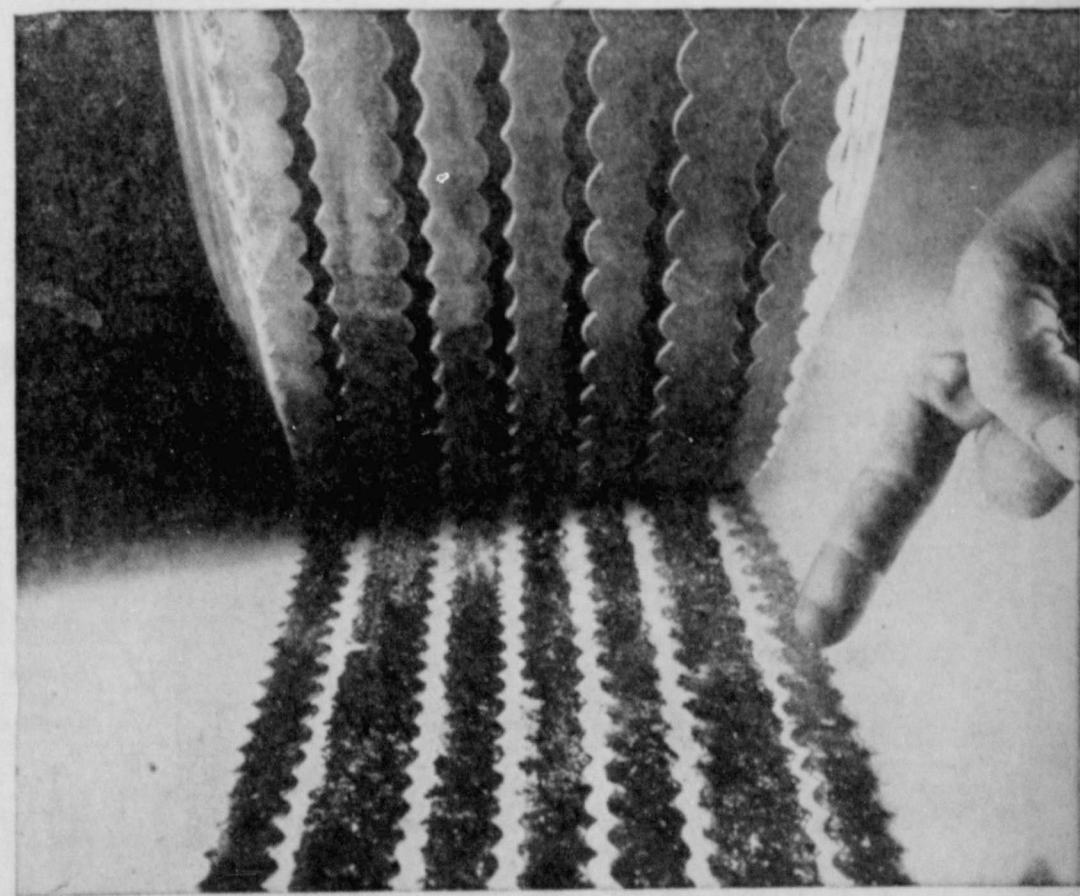

Conservation District News

The July meeting of the supervi-
sors of the Floyd County Soil Con-
servation district was held Tuesday
morning, July 23. The following
supervisors were present: W. F.
Ferguson, W. H. Nelson, Cecil Pur-
cell and John Bell. Mr. W. Scott
Amend, district conservator of the
Soil Conservation service also
attended.

A letter of resignation from M. H.
Taylor, another member of the
board was read. Mr. Taylor stated
ill health was the reason for offer-
ing his resignation at this time.
The board voted to request that
he remain in the position until his
term expires in October. At this
time an election will be held in
the portion of the District now
represented by Mr. Taylor.

The rental charge to cooperators
for the two whirl-wind terracing
machines owned by the district
was discussed. It was decided to
continue the old rate of \$10.00 per
day when the machine was in use
plus \$2.50 per day for time it re-
mained on any cooperator's farm
and was not in use except on Sun-
days, holidays and when bad weather
prevented its use.

It was disclosed at the meeting
that the Floyd County Soil Con-
servation district had recently re-
ceived from the State Soil Conserva-
tion board, a check for \$704.00
which was this district's portion of
money received from the recent sale
of surplus equipment owned by dis-
tricts in Texas.

Mr. Ferguson stated that no word
had been received from his inquiry
to Rising Star concerning a possible
supply of hairy vetch seed for dis-
trict cooperators. It was estimated
that between 7,000 and 10,000 pounds
would be needed to provide cooper-
ators with an ample amount to
sow for cover this fall.

conservation work were received

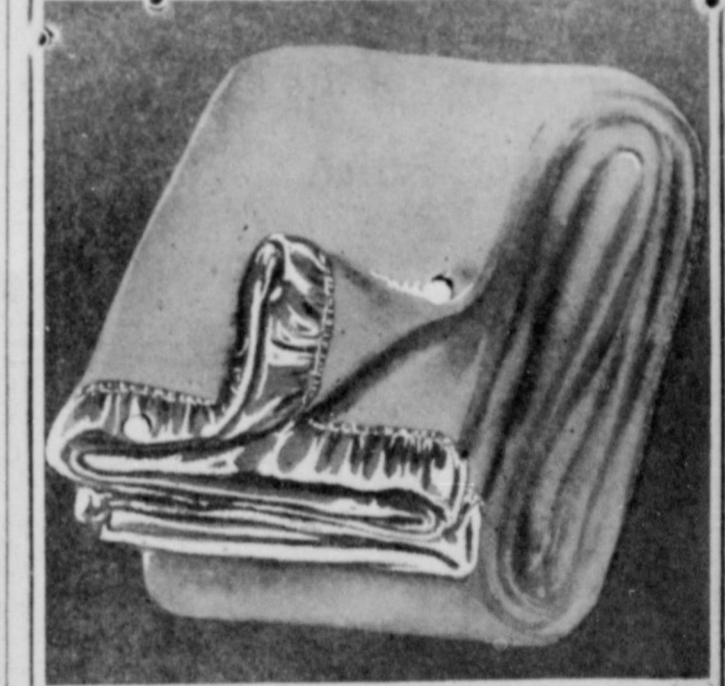

Veterans to Get Home Town Service on Prescriptions

The Veterans Administration has signed a contract with the Texas State Pharmaceutical association to provide "home town" prescription service to veterans with service-connected disabilities.

The service will be available to disabled veterans as soon as the state association works out administrative details with more than 1,000 member druggists in Texas." Dr. Lee D. Cady, VA's Medical Director, said.
