three more farms in the county

this year. These rural rehabilitation program makes FSA loans available to low income farmers who are unable to get adequate credit else where. The loans are for the pur chase of seed, fertilizer, livestock, and farm equipment and are based on a carefully worked out plan of farm and home man agement, according to Mr. Me-Knight. About 450 farm families in Callahan County have been

assisted under this program since

it started in the county. All farmers, as well as F S A borrowers, may seek the assistance of the Farm Debt Adjustment committee. The purpose of tris is to assist creditors and debthis is to assist creditors and deb ment of debts, based on the ability of the debtor to pay. Credit tors as well as debtors may ask for the help of the committee, according to Mr. McKnight.


