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

Autumn Flowers at Floydada Garden Club Show

That many pretty fall flowers greeted visitors at the Floydada Garden club's fall show last week is indicated in these panels, which, however, include few of the roses shown. Large flowers dominated the show but many of the more delicate blossoms also were shown. In the lower panel the large vase of lilies, centering the display, is not lilies, but

bare grass flags. The arrangement was done by Mrs. Maud Hollums. The inset, bottom, was a display of begonias, pansies and verbenas.

Many flowers formerly thought impossible of culture in the blustery areas of West Texas are being grown successfully by members of the Floydada Garden club and others.

As overcast became lighter this week from the week-end of heavy rains, Floyd county and area residents counted up seven and more inches of rainfall recorded Friday to Monday in the heaviest rain period since 1942.

And although farm lands and ranges were already soaked with water from late September mois-ture, the run-off was light because nearly 60 hours was consumed from the first downpour late Friday night until the last shower of Wednesday Floydada station recorded a fall of 5.42 inches.

The unusual experience of many nours of continuous rainfall caught many local travelers on the highways and on the farm to market roads, but no accidents of more than minor nature were reported through out the period. Relatively few passenger cars or trucks were in the bar ditches from slippery roads and most of the mail on more than 300 miles of rural routes out of Floydada Post office made destination as usual Monday.

Maize Damage Depends

A considerable portion of the wheat crop of the fall planting is yet to be done and most of these fields will have to be plowed again before the drills are set to rolling. Likewise, wheat men say that a considerable acreage already in the ground will have to be re-sowed for various reasons - winter weeds washing, standing water on the ground, and the like.

A source of anxiety for many forage feed growers are the fields of heavily grained maize and hegira, where \$80 to \$100 worth of grain per acre is waiting for the harvester and won't be benefitted by any delay. Some of this feed has been ready for two to four weeks but has been kept in the field by wet under-

Late feed is booting and range grasses are maturing seeds and the moisture is quite beneficial to these. The "bundle crop" is going to be a big one, some of it very light, (See HEAVY RAINS, back page)

Engineer Makes New Road Plans

Approval of Floyd county's next farm-to-market road construction and a contract letting for December is one of the possibilities foreseen this week in the office of resident engineer James W. Potts, who says, however, that much depends on what happens at Austin and Washington in the State Highway engi-neer's office and the Federal Good Roads administration.

The Floyd county road that has the nod is Number 54 in the farmto-market highway system. It extends westward from Highway 207 between Starkey school house and Blanco canyon through McCoy and will join up with hard-surfaced roads in Hale county at Petersburg. Mr. Potts said. If the letting does not make the December list it will come shortly after the first of the vear. Next Floyd county farm-to-market road due to get attention is the Lakeview road. Plans will be started on it before No. 54 is completed.

Only 42 years ago, a little town one hundred and some miles from the nearest railroad but a little town where people lived and needed and bought medicines.

We are used to the delay in all kinds of things from ginghams to refrigerators and as to now there has been no deluge of these desired things. Not so with the rain which was somehow held up in shipping or maybe manufacturing. It came later than was ordered and in such large quantities we have been almos drowned.

We long for the sun even tho it may be mildewed as Uncle Jim Witt used to say and speaking of our loved Uncle Jim we recall the sorghum syrup he made every year. My how good it was to take a long simmering syrup and lick off the clean cane stalk and run it in the goody. The sweetish sour odor of

the old stalks run through the mill, the heavenly scent of cooking mo-lasses, the creaking of the grinding rollers. Wish some one now had a mill near and we could take some

cane to make up. This makes me think of what my neighbor, Mrs. Jim Crump, told me of her girlhood. She said she and her sister cut and stripped a load of cane, hauled it with a team some seven mile and had a barrel of syrup made. They brought it home and put it on some logs in the home and put it on some logs in the smokehouse so they could draw it easily. But someone in the night came and took some of the syrup. That would not have been so bad, but they left the faucet open and all night the thick sorghum spil-led from the tipped barrel and run all over the floor. "Not only a few gallons were left." Mrs. Crump still mourns, and who wouldn't?







