Star Lites

THE CURRENT "LION" Magazine contains an interesting article, tracing the development of computers, particularly home computers. It points out that in 1976, two college drop-outs, Steve Wozniak and Steve Jobs, sold a beat-up Volkswagen van and a calculator.

With \$1,500 in research capital, they set up shop in a garage and developed an idea into a new product. Their invention was the first low-priced home computer. The couple went on to found Apple Computer Corporation, which today is one of several companies in the booming new industry.

Home computers were once limited to primitive games played on television screens, but now have evolved into economical ways of solving problems and retrieving information. Compact units the size of a portable TV set and electric typewriter can now accomplish what once could be done only by giant computers which filled entire rooms.

The development of the computer industry is illustrated by a statement by James Finke, president of Commodore International, Inc., one of the computer producers: "From the beginning of time through 1980 there were approximately one million computer systems. During calendar year 1982, Commodore itself will produce that many."

The field is becoming highly competitive. Besides Apple and Commodore, other computer manufacturers are Atari, Texas Instruments, Tandy, APF and Mattel, just to name a few. And in 1981, two other corporate giants entered the field—Xerox Corporation and International Business Machines (IBM).

It is predicted that those companies will survive who are able to continue to build better and smaller computers at lower prices. This phenomenon is said to be unique to the electronics industry.

One writer said "Had the automobile developed at a pace equivalent to the computer during the past 20 years, today a Rolls Royce would cost less than \$3, get three million miles to the gallon and deliver enough power to drive the Queen Elizabeth II."

Some of the possible uses for computers in the home include storing all family financial information (that would be handy about this time every year), balancing bank accounts, monitoring credit card purchases, computing income taxes and setting up budgets.

With the proper equipment, a computer could also adjust heating and cooling systems, teach foreign languages and music, and retrieve information from large central computer banks.

Microprocessor silicon "chips," about half the size of a fingernail are responsible for the incredible memory capacity of the new generation of computers. Since the first integrated circuits were introduced in 1960, the number of elements that can be built into a single chip has doubled each year.

Today, there are 100,000 transistors encompassed into one chip. Transistors less than 1/30th the width of a human hair now can store information, and perform computing jobs.

So, if you are interested in a computer for your home or small business, just hang in there. The industry is bound to have one suited to your needs, and at a price you can afford in the near future.

Twelve Friona High School students qualified for the regional UIL literary meet in fourteen events, at the District 2-AAA spring literary meet hosted by Friona last week.

Pacing the Friona contingent in the district meet was senior Stanley Ellis, who won three first-place medals and added 45 points to the FHS school total. Ellis won his medals in feature writing, headline writing and calculator applications.

Other first place medals were won by Amber Smith in prose reading and Angie Castaneda in shorthand. Julie Wilshire won first place in ninth grade oral reading, although this event is not contested on the regional level.

Also qualifying for regional were Karla Fleming, who placed third in feature writing; Christy Bengé, second in newswriting and third in headline writing; Andrew Fleming, second in calculator application.

A whirlwind write-in campaign was successful in unseating Mayor B.K. Buske, in a larger than average local election turnout here last Saturday.

The final tally showed 241 voters had written in Wright Williams for mayor, while 213 voted for incumbent mayor Buske.

The 481-voter turnout for the city election almost caught the election officials by surprise, as only 500 printed ballots had been ordered. The turnout was only 158 less than the record set last April.

The 1981 races were spiced by nine candidates seeking two spots on the school board and five seeking three seats on the city council.

Hearings Are Slated

The Railroad Commission has scheduled a public hearing in Amarillo on the application of the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railway Co. to close its agency stations in 12 cities.

Santa Fe proposes to discontinue its agencies in Happy, Tulia, BOVINA, Canadian, Dumas, Etter, FRIONA, Hereford, Kings Mill, Pampa, Panhandle and Stratford. The railway plans to serve Happy and Tulia through a regional agency in Plainview, and the other towns through a similar facility in Amarillo.

Santa Fe also wants to dismantle the depot buildings in Happy, BOVINA, Etter, FRIONA, Kings Mill, Panhandle and Stratford.

The hearings will begin at 9 a.m. on April 26 in Amarillo at the Hilton Hotel, 1-40 East at Lakeside Drive.

City Sets Sealcoating Work

The Friona City Council gave authorization to advertise for bids for the city's annual sealcoating program for city streets at its regular meeting Monday, April 5. The council also agreed to advertise for bids for 20 new trash containers, such bids to be opened April 19 at 3 p.m.

In other business, the board passed on first reading ordinances to (1) close streets on Friona Wheat Growers' property, for title purposes and (2) adopted the 1981 National Electric Code, updating the city's previous code.

The council approved an application for new radios for the Police Department, and passed a resolution extending the time for consideration of Southwestern Public Service Company's rate increase request. Arvel Block of General Telephone Co. presented the group the company's proposed rate change, which calls for an increase in local service charges by approximately 50 per cent. The mayor and council indicated they would challenge such an increase.

City Manager Jerry Lewis reported on the status of the new water field, the scheduled dog vaccination day and touched on needed work for the swimming pool. Engineers fees on the water project come to \$19,753 through February, Lewis said.

Squaws Place Second In District 2-3A Meet

The Friona Squaws placed second in the District 2-AAA meet last Saturday at Hereford, qualifying nine girls in six events to the regional meet.

The team was paced by a record-setting performance by Sherry O'Brian, who set a new district mark in the 400-meter dash in 60.95 and tied the district high jump record at five feet.

Reeva Duffey won the shot put at 30-6½, and the 1600-meter relay team won in the time of 4:20.37.

Shawn Osborn qualified for regional by placing second in the 800 meter, 2:37.33. Miss Osborn is alternate in the 400-meter, where her 65.83 placed third.

Nikki Osborn was third in the 800

at 2:41.99; Cara Brockman was third in the 100-meter, 13.39; Rene Noland was fourth in the 400 meters, 66.76; Nikki Osborn was third in the 1600 meters at 6:11.81.


