SILLY ACCORDING TO LAW

The committee on Public health of the House of representatives by about the time this will appear in print, are likely to have okeyed a measure to prohibit physicians, optometrists, etc., from advertising as to skill, fees, and equipment used.

The fact is there is no reason why the newspaper people should appear in the matter, it seems to us. Anybody who wants to pass a law to keep somebody from being silly should be allowed to be silly without somebody else being silly enough to try to keep them from being silly.

So far as we are concerned, we leave our representatives in the House and the Senate to vote as they desire. They know and we know that the charlatans will operate the same as ever. You can't legislate honesty any more than you can legislate sobriety. The latter has been tried. Likely the general result of an honesty law will be the same as the sobriety law.

Why do sober, honest, industrious, fairminded, men get that way? The only answer we know and it may be wrong is that a \$10 thousand dollar man up on the seventeenth floor wrote them to do so. They may be argument. afraid! Reckon that is right?

GETTING MUCH TOO TECHNICAL

These young people who have new babies and these doctors that try to get along with them are getting too technical about how much did the baby weigh. Not satisfied with getting the newcomer warm and snug and all diapered and gowned the doctors have put
