You might remember these latest polls when you see headlines in the future, jumping to conclusions about why balancing the budget, or just about any other major issue, should be abandoned, for one reason or another.

RESIDENTS OF THE area need to mark their calendars for Monday, April 26, which is the date for a Railroad Commission hearing in Amarillo, on the application of the Santa Fe Railway to close its agency in 12 area cities, including Bovina and Friona.

Santa Fe also wants to dismantle the depot buildings in Happy, BOVINA, Etter, FRIONA, Kings Mill, Panhandle and Stratford.

The hearings will begin at 9 a.m. on April 26 at the Hilton Inn, 1-40 East at Lakeside Drive in Amarillo.

It behooves every interested party, in particular the customers of Santa Fe, to attend this hearing and voice their opposition to the proposed cutbacks and closings of local agencies.

Local Business Fights Energy Consumption

One area businessman has decided to fight back against high utility costs with the help of some pretty sophisticated microprocessing equipment. Kenneth Moore, owner of Moore's Jack and Jill Food Stores has installed the electronic control systems in both his Hereford and Friona stores.

"Actually, it sounds futuristic to install microprocessor energy control systems," said Moore. "But with energy costs like they've become, the systems pay for themselves pretty quickly."

Moore has had energy control systems installed by High Plains Energy Management of Amarillo. Basically, the systems monitor all power electronically. They control all energy operations, allowing them to run only long enough to do their job, thus eliminating a large degree of waste energy consumption.

"The bottom line is utility bill savings," said Moore. He estimates that the new power system is currently saving between \$400 to \$600

per month per store. "And we haven't hit the peak utility season yet," adds Moore.

Commercial utility bills are determined by two factors. One being actual kilowatt usage per month. The other cost factor involves how much energy usage a business must have available for "peak demand." That is, if all systems kicked in at one time, how much energy would be required to satisfy the entire business power demand. Since electrical utility companies must have that energy readily available, they charge businesses accordingly.

One immediate way the microprocessing control equipment reduces utility costs is by not allowing all power systems to kick in at once. Thus, by reducing "peak demand" that a business is capable of generating, the utility bills will be immediately reduced by a considerable amount. Further control of the power system within a business actually reduces kilowatt usage also.

"The cost of energy to operate a grocery store a few years ago wasn't a really significant part of operating cost," says Moore. "But today, the cost of utilities is one of our largest costs. In fact, it ranks second only to labor costs in operating our stores."

Moore adds that it's really the customer who benefits from reduced utility bills. "Naturally, by keeping our costs as low as possible, we can pass along the savings to customers. It just makes sense to take advantage of today's technology to save money. If locally-owned grocery stores and businesses don't take some pretty aggressive measures to control costs, they might find themselves out of business. And nobody wins in that sort of situation."

Moore's Jack and Jill Stores are the first in the area to install electronic energy control equipment. But Kenneth Moore doesn't think he'll be the only pioneer in this area. "I see quite a few businesses, grocery stores and otherwise, turning to microprocessor control systems in the near future. They pay for themselves in a short time and they help keep down the high costs of utilities. And

Chamber Drops Aid For Fireworks Show

The Friona Chamber of Commerce board of directors, in its regular monthly meeting Tuesday, April 14, voted to withdraw its sponsorship of the annual fireworks display, held in conjunction with the city's July 4th celebration.

Reason given for the action was the cost of the display, which the Chamber has had to bear almost in its entirety the past couple of years.

Some local clubs and organizations contributed funds for last year's display, but the Chamber had to pick up most of the tab for the display, which runs around \$1,000.00 annually. Last year's display cost \$800.00.

"The Chamber board felt that it just could not continue underwriting the entire cost of the display, and hopes that some other organization will be willing to take this as a project for 1982," said Lois Norwood, chamber director.

Although withdrawing its financial support from the fireworks display, the Chamber will continue to sponsor the other activities centering the city's annual July 4th celebration, which usually includes some type of luncheon, and a variety of afternoon games, perhaps an evening program, and the fireworks display.

Finances had caused the Chamber to drop the sponsorship of the annual display once before, after the 1976 display. The event was salvaged by a local drive in 1977, and then was included in the city's United Way budget for one year only, 1978, after which the Chamber picked it up again.

The fireworks display has been a tremendous draw, ever since its inception, and particularly since it has been held in the Reeve Lake area. With local residents guaranteed a professional display, crowds of over 5,000 have come out for what has come to be the climax of the annual Independence Day celebration.

"We know that it is popular with a lot of people. But the Chamber is having financial problems of its own, and is making an effort through a membership drive to correct this," Ms Norwood said.

Anyone with a suggestion is urged to call the Chamber office, or any member of the board of directors.

In other business this week, it was reported that Chamber of Commerce secretary Lola White has resigned, and the Chamber is seeking a new secretary.

A project is underway to beautify the downtown area. It was reported that Karen Britting proposes to sell a number of half-barrels to merchants on Main Street at cost. Flowers would

Lions To Hold Sale On Monday

The annual Lions Club mop and broom sale will be held all day Monday, April 19 in Friona.

Residents are urged to continue the spring clean-up which was sponsored locally this week by buying the janitorial supplies they need from a project which benefits two local service clubs, the Friona Evening Lions and Friona Noon Lions.

As a new wrinkle, the Lions will have their items on sale at three locations during the day: at the City Park, at D.L.'s Thriftway and at White's Auto, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Then, starting at 5 p.m., members of the clubs will canvass parts of town. "We will not canvass the entire city, but will concentrate on the areas which are easier to cover, and which historically have supported the sale," said a representative of the Lions.

Thus, if a resident wants to be sure they are not missed, they might want to visit one of the three locations.

The two clubs use the proceeds from the sale to assist their many projects, which includes sight conservation.

Open House will be held Sunday, April 25 in the Junior High School and Elementary School facilities.

The facilities will be open from 2-4:30 p.m. so the public can view the facilities since the remodeling was completed.

Absentee voting for the May 1 primary election can be done in Friona on Thursday, April 22, at the Friona, Texas, Federal Credit Union during their regular hours, it was announced this week.

Those who think they may be out of town on election day may cast their ballots at that time, or at the County Clerk's office in Farwell through April 27.

Residents Warned Of Salesmen

City Manager Jerry R. Lewis this week put out a word of warning for local residents to be wary of door-to-door salesmen, who always hit town in the springtime and offer everything from soup to nuts to the local residents.

Lewis said there had been reports particularly of a roofing company and fruit vendors selling door-to-door locally.

The City of Friona has an ordinance which regulates door to door selling, and requires such salesmen to register at the City Hall prior to calling on residents within the city limits.

"If a resident wants to check, they should ask the salesman if he is registered, or better yet, call the city hall to find out. If they are not, then the residents really shouldn't do business with them," Lewis said.

The city can ask such salesmen to leave the city if they are not in compliance with local regulations.

"The best rule of thumb is to only do business with those local merchants who you know and trust. If you buy something from someone you may never see again, you really have very little recourse," the city manager said.

Lewis urged local citizens encountering problems with door to door salesmen to call the City Hall or Police Department.

Phone Users Response Is Being Sought

The City of Friona is conducting a survey of customers of General Telephone Company, asking them to rate the service they receive from the telephone company.

The survey comes on the heels that General Telephone is asking for a rate increase totalling \$110 million in the state. The increase locally would amount to roughly 50 per cent for residential users.

The city hopes to use the local survey as an indication of how the citizens rate their service.

50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1932

The 1932 Friona school election passed off Saturday very quietly and resulted in the election of David Mosley, F.W. Reeve and J.B. McFarland.

Friona's third city election passed into history Tuesday evening, when the election forces had finished the count and declared the results. M.A. Crum was elected mayor. Other candidates were F.W. Reeve and S. Mitchell. F.L. Spring and E.V. Rushing were elected board members. Other candidates for board members were D.H. Meade, E.B. McLellan and L.R. Dilger.

40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 3, 1942

Residents of Friona and surrounding territory will be privileged to take the Red Cross First Aid course, according to announcements today. The course, as in many other communities, will be taught by State Highway Patrolmen and will feature two classes each week.

Harold Lillard, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.F. Lillard, of this community, departed Wednesday morning for Lubbock, where he was called to take final examination as a flying cadet.

30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 3, 1952

Announcement was made this week of a new gin to be erected one and a quarter miles south of Hub. This is a complete new Continental electric gin, being built by Miles and Fleming of Burkburnett with construction to

begin about April 5.

Friona businessmen came through this week and are posting some \$400 in awards for winning entries in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show to be held at the local fairgrounds next weekend, Friday and Saturday, April 11 and 12. Though original plans called for elimination of cash prizes, it was decided at a meeting Wednesday evening at the Chamber of Commerce offices that the money would stimulate interest sufficient to warrant the prizes.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 4, 1957

One man received serious injuries and another one was less seriously hurt in a well drilling accident on the Leonard Haws farm east of town Monday afternoon. At the time of the accident the drill stem was being lifted up so that a joint of pipe could be put into the hole. Sonny Weaks became pinned beneath the drill stem and called to Waymon Wilkins to get him out. In trying to free Weaks, Wilkins became entangled in the cat line and was twisted in the rope by both his feet and arms. Upon hearing the confusion Bill Bandy ran to turn off the motor. Weaks suffered a gash in his head. He was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital and released. Wilkins was moved to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1962

Plaques were presented to Friona's

outstanding citizens at the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture annual banquet Friday. Mrs. Arvella England was chosen most courteous employee; Miss Jo Phillips, teacher of the year; George Jones, man of the year; and Mrs. Rose Lange, woman of the year.

Voting was very light in the city election Tuesday. Of the estimated 490 qualified voters in the city, 76 cast ballots. Raymond Fleming was re-elected mayor for another term and Glenn Reeve and Ralph Taylor gained alderman positions.

15 YEARS AGO--MARCH 30, 1967

David White, sixth grade student at Friona Junior High School, won the Parmer County junior spelling bee held at Bovina last week. David, the son of Mr. and Mrs. N.C. White, Jr. of Route 1, Friona, won the bee over some 14 other spellers from throughout the county.

10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1972

Friona voters turned out in near-record numbers, in spite of the Easter weekend, to give their okay to two \$50,000 bond issues last Saturday on the annual city election ballot. Voters also returned incumbent aldermen Gary Brown and Bill Ellis to the City Council. Mayor R.L. Fleming, unopposed on the ballot, was re-elected. The new fire station issue (Proposition 1) passed by approximately a 3-1 margin, getting 306 favorable votes, to 119 opposed. The \$50,000 waterworks issue (Proposition 2) passed by a larger

margin of approximately 6-1, with 366 favorable votes to only 60 votes against.

5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 10, 1977

Lonnie Mitchell, 55, died in a rural house fire early Wednesday morning, and his wife Norma was treated for minor burns at Parmer County Community Hospital. Mitchell was discovered in an inside room, lying just inside a doorway. Smoke inhalation was blamed for Mitchell's death.

Texas Municipal League Fights Phone Rate Hike

In testimony filed this week with the State Public Utility Commission, Texas Municipal League rate experts challenged the request of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest for a \$110 million rate hike.

The League's testimony was filed in advance of utility commission hearings, that begin April 15, on General Telephone's application for rate increases that would raise the monthly charges for some customers by as much as 71 per cent.

The Municipal League's analysis concluded that General Telephone's request for \$110 million was far in excess of the amount justified to keep the company financially sound. The cities' study of the company's books indicated that General Telephone was legitimately entitled to a rate hike of just \$23.3 million--about 21 per cent of the amount asked.

The increase recommended by TML would give General Telephone a rate of return of about 16 per cent, compared to the 18 per cent that the

full amount requested by the company would provide.

TML also was critical of the company's proposal to charge far higher rates to some of its customers than those in neighboring exchanges. Under the company's plan, a given telephone customer could be charged nearly double what his neighbor pays, simply because of a slight difference in location.

Additionally, TML urged the utility commission to properly measure--and regulate--the profits that flow from General Telephone of the Southwest to its parent corporation, General Telephone & Electronics, in Connecticut. Under the rate application now pending before the commission, profits paid out of the pockets of Texas consumers would be passed along to the national headquarters of the company, with no benefit to in-state telephone users.

Earlier this year, in February, the Austin Court of Civil Appeals upheld

contentions by Texas Municipal League lawyers that the amount of Texas-based profits channelled to General Telephone's national parent should be limited. The decision resulted in savings of \$10 million to General Telephone's Texas customers.

General's recent rate increase request, which was filed January 29, is its third in three years. In 1980, the company asked for a \$58 million increase and received \$31 million. In 1981, the company asked for \$45.3 million, but the utility commission approved just \$2 million.

The Texas Municipal League is representing 90 cities that are intervenors in the GTE rate case now before the state utility commission. Utility experts hired by the TML cities have scrutinized GTE's books to determine the proper balance between the company's justifiable revenue needs versus the needs of telephone customers for quality service at equitable rates.

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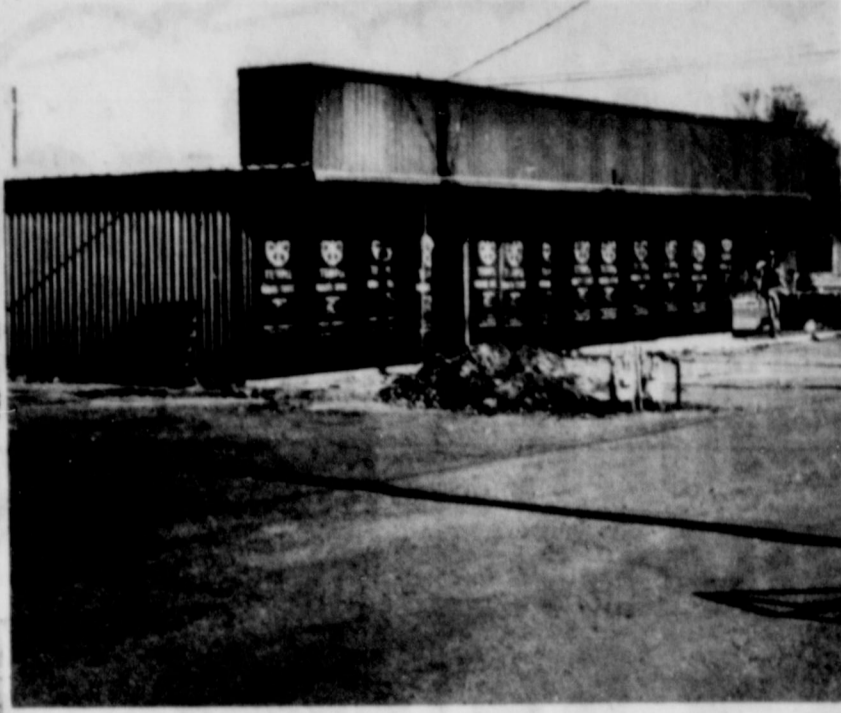

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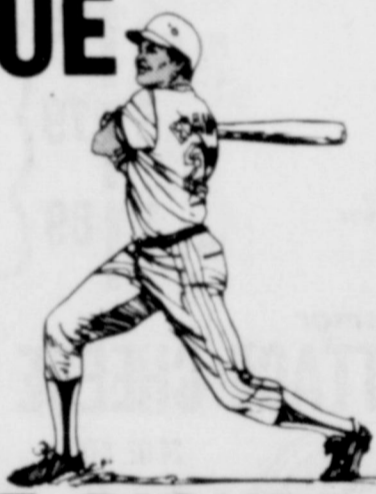

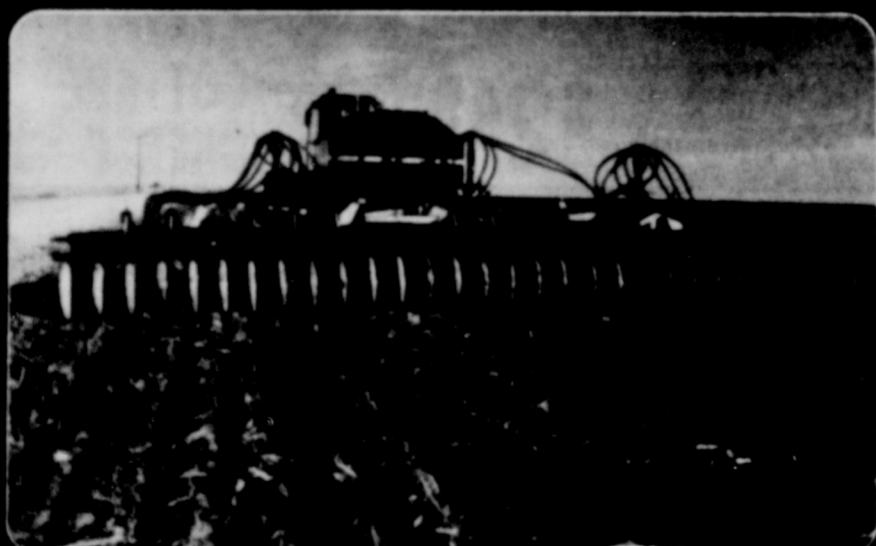
