NOW WE REVEAL ALL

One of the best editorials we have written in a long time, was done to reassure those who in the middle of last mid-week had begun to weaken on the weather. It came along the wet spell Saturday and we had to throw it away. It told about water that would fall and things of that kind. Of course, after it rained that wouldn't do to print. Anybody can forecast wet weather when it is cloudy all around and pouring down in the middle.

Which, speaking of rain and the weather, brings to mind that we should reveal all to our weather customers, namely:

It rained on Saturday, April 12, one year in Floyd county, and followed with more rain and, believe it or not, icycles hung off the houses in great chunks in Floyd county on the evening of July 4. It wasn't just chilly, it was cold. Coca Cola and ice cream concessionaries at the celebration sponsored by the American Legion, stood out in the cold in their overcoats and paid off on their contracts with ice water running down their backs. We hope nothing like that happens this year but it did happen once.

Also you remember early in 1941 the clouds hung on for two or three days before rain began falling early in the year and that June and July the wheat just naturally melted into the ground, it got so wet and was chunked so hard by the big raindrops that refused to be shut off. To be natural-like rain has to begin falling pretty soon after it clouds up on the plains. Always when things are normal, if it stays cloudy two or three days and no rain falls there isn't going to be any rainfall that spell. But that's the way it did in

The way things stand now they are reasonably certain, and so are their employers, that if the employer can't raise the money without raising prices he can raise prices, passing the bill on to the public, from which howis are going to be heard willy-nilly. How far they can go playing tag and the public continue to be it is a matter on which they must exercise judgment.

Whether prices and wages can go so high as to cause a depression we are not sure. The cycle has always been that way, so one would reason that it will be the same again.

But as a matter for fear as to the social consequence these are not well based. There is a lot of difference between a strike for fore of the gravy and a strike for something to keep your stomach from knawing on your



WAGES AND THE TELEPHONE STRIKE



Because wages are at issue in the telephone strike, let's take a look at what operators here are now getting. Almost all telephone people are in this group.

The basic work period is a five-day, 40-hour week. Scheduled employees are paid overtime for time worked over eight hours a day, premium time for Sunday and holiday work, and added money for evening and night work.

OPERATORS

A girl just out of high school, with no previous experience, starts at the beginner's rate of \$26 a week. But if she works after 9 p.m., she gets \$27,50 a week, and if that week includes Sunday work, she gets \$30.10.

The beginning operator gets a raise in pay every six months for the first year. An operator with 12 month's experience, for example, gets \$28 for a normal 40-hour week. If it includes evenings and Sunday, she earns \$32.30.

Periodic increases bring the operator to the top rate of \$34 a week. If she works evenings and Sundays, her weekly earnings are \$38.90.

But the union wants to increase the beginner's rate of pay from \$26 to \$41-up \$15 a week. Also, they would increase the top wages from \$34 to \$51. That is an increase of \$17 a week.

We believe most people will agree that present wages are good. The company believes that no increases are justified at this time.

The way to resolve these differences of opinion and settle the strike is to arbitrate the wage issue. That would be fair to our employees, to telephone users, and to the company.

Nearly three weeks ago the company proposed that Governor Jester and the governors of the other four states in which we operate appoint a panel of five impartial citizens-men with a knowledge of conditions in this area-to arbitrate the wage issue. The company enlarged its offer to include not only basic wages but such other demands as length of time for employees to reach top wage rates and wage differentials between different communities.

The company urges union officials to reconsider the offer of arbitration. It is the fair way to settle the strike, restore full telephone service to the public, and get the telephone wage issue decided equitably.

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

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
