AN IMPORTANT ISSUE, which residents of this area need to be concerned about, is the proposal which the U.S. government has to dump nuclear wastes in this area.

So far, test holes have been drilled by the government in Deaf Smith County and in Swisher County. Residents of these areas, along with most people in the entire Panhandle, are entirely opposed to such a program.

As much land as there is in such states as Nevada and Utah, where you can drive for miles without seeing so much as a jackrabbit, it seems so foolish to even be considering a nuclear waste disposal in an area which (1) supports people, and (2) grows the majority of the nation's foodstuffs.

But if you've been around long enough to witness such events as the give-away of the Panama Canal, you must realize by now that the government does not always necessarily do the things which on the surface appear to be the most sensible, least costly, etc.

So, it behooves all taxpayers to mount a campaign, contacting their elected representatives, both in the House of Representatives and in the Senate, to voice their opposition to this proposal.

Only about a year ago, residents were having to fight back the proposal to locate the MX missile system in this area, but this program appears to have been detoured, if not shelved entirely.

Between constantly having to fight the government on such issues as the MX and nuclear wastes, plus the inability to get legislation favoring agriculture, one would almost think that there is a conspiracy in Washington to do away with the farmer, or at least farming as we have

The Friona area received its "annual" end of school rainfall during the past week, which produced 2.25 inches of rain, the most recorded locally in nine months.

The week's rainfall brought the total for May to 2.78 inches. The last 30-day period approaching this total was September of 1981, when 2.73 was measured, and it is the most since last August's total of 5.83 inches locally.

The biggest percentage of the week's total fell on Tuesday night, when a booming thundershower swept across the area. This cloud threatened to spawn tornadoes, as several residents reported seeing funnels trying to dip down from the cloud as it approached.

After the rain began, it was a virtual downpour, and nothing could be seen. No tornado warning was sounded in Friona, but the area had been put under a "tornado watch" by Amarillo radar earlier.

Farmers were glad to receive the moisture, but as is usually the case this time of the year, the week's rain was not without some accompanying hail, which did considerable damage in parts of the county.

Generally speaking, the Friona area was spared any hail damage, but Monday and Tuesday's storm, which

Proper Use Of Landfill Sites Underscored Here

City Manager Jerry Lewis this week pointed out that there have been violations concerning the city landfill north of town, and reviewed the procedures for using both the north landfill and south landfill, and cautioned residents, both city and rural, to abide by the rules.

"There have been cases where people have been dumping and/or burning their refuse illegally at the north dump ground. If residents are caught dumping trash illegally, we will impose the strongest fines possible," Lewis said.

The city manager pointed out that

The "south landfill," located 1.5 miles southwest of Friona on Highway 60, then 1/4 mile west, will accept all types of household refuse.

The landfill cannot accept wire, brush, construction materials or dead animals. Dead animals must be disposed of by a rendering plant, or by the individual.

Charges are the same as for the north landfill. There is no charge at either landfill for city residents, although they may be asked to prove their identity and residency.

"Our landfills should be good for another 20 years if properly used. But we are required to enforce the regulations of the Texas Air Control Board and the Texas Department of Health," Lewis says.

One of the major problems is in disposing of old tires and chemical barrels. For such items as refrigerators or deep freezes, if the city is contacted, they will make arrangements to pick up these for disposal, Lewis added.

Re-modelling work on the pool facilities continues. The rebuilding of the dressing rooms is virtually finished, and work was underway this week on the pool itself, which has been cleaned out and readied for repainting.

Lewis said the pool would be sandblasted, and given a special coating of paint, which requires a week to cure, before it can be filled with water.

Hours for the pool this summer will be from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. through the week, and 1-6 p.m. on Sundays.

The pool will remain open on a full-time basis until the week school re-opens in the fall, and will continue a weekend schedule through Labor Day, Lewis said.

Lynn Weiland, a member of the junior high coaching staff, has been employed by the city as manager of the pool.

Lights have been installed at the pool to enable it to extend its opening schedule. There are four 500-watt quartz lights, which should be adequate for night swimming.

The pool will be made available to groups for parties beginning at 9 p.m. each day. Lewis says he hopes to have special nights, such as "teen nights," etc., at the pool.

Lewis also announced that the former snack bar area at the pool will be renovated, and an arcade will be established, for the benefit of youngsters of the town. The arcade is expected to remain open after pool hours.

Proceeds from the arcade will go to help pay for the improvements being made at the pool.

Season passes are on sale at the City Hall. Prices are \$20 for children 1-12. It is \$27.50 for those 13 and over.

Family season passes are available for \$45.00.

Single admission prices will be \$1 for children 1-12, and \$1.25 for those 13 and older.

The pool will rent for \$30 per event, plus \$8 per hour per lifeguard. More information may be secured by calling the city office at 247-2761.

the City of Friona can be fined up to \$10,000 per day if found in violation of the state code regarding the landfill facilities. At the present time, the city does not have a permit to burn refuse, although it is working on securing such a permit, Lewis said.

Basically, here are the rules regarding each of the city's landfills.

The "north landfill" is located a mile north of Friona on Highway 214. This landfill is open on MONDAYS ONLY, from 9 a.m.-12 noon and 1-4 p.m.

This landfill will accept brush, construction-demolition waste which is free from other solid waste; and barrels of fired ashes, which must be cool to the touch.

The landfill cannot accept paper items, dead animals or organic materials.

Charges for non-city residents are \$1 minimum load; \$5 for a pickup load and \$10 for a truckload.

Pioneer Shows Profit Growth

For the first three months of 1982, Pioneer earned 81 cents per share, an increase of 3.8 per cent from the 78 cents per share earned in the first quarter of 1981. Net income for the quarter was \$29.8 million, up 2.2 per cent when compared with \$29.2 million a year ago.

Change Is Noted Here


A change in the make-up of Hub Aerial Spraying Service was announced this week.

Both companies will function at the same location.







They are Curt's paternal grandparents and did attend the ceremonies. Sorry folks!


