The best one, that will leave the most people happy, is to use good material in the bottom of the ditch and keep it on a "level" so that water can flow. We speak of the city going slow, and one good reason they will have to other good reason is that there are many streets, used for years, that need building up before they'll ever carry water. In some of these one will have to determine which is the bar ditch, of course.





The new traffic laws are now in force and the state expects the cities to enforce them, which we here in Floyd-

ada will endeavor to do. Some think that some of these rules are wrong and useless but if you will study them sufficiently I am sure you will agree with the state every rule is beneficial and helpful for safe driving and parking.

## To help you we offer the following information:

When intending to make a right turn on red you must stop before proceeding and then when the pedestrian lane is safe and clear;

If there is no stop at a pedestrian lane you must stop for any pedestrian in your way;

All double parking is prohibited;

Alleys are for loading and unloading and parking for any other reason is prohibited;

Jay walking is dangerous and prohibited by the All No U turn signs must be obeyed;





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
