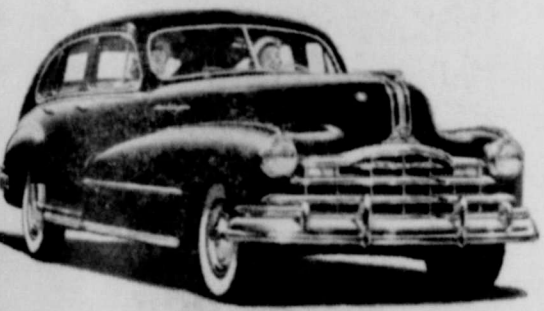

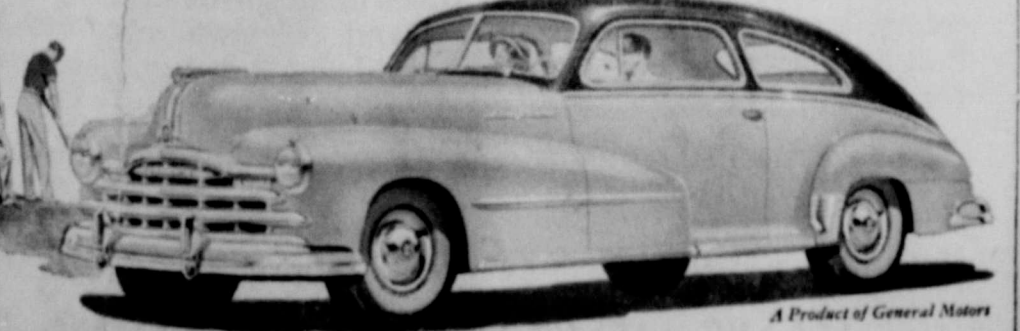

## Probate Jury In Sanity Trial Cannot Agree

Question of the sanity of Mrs. Eva Wagner, resident of the county for more than a quarter of a century afforded a problem last week-end in county court that a jury was unable to decide.

Mrs. Wagner was detained early last week when John E. Tivis signed a complaint alleging in substance that the woman, his sister, was incapable of handling her business affairs and her state of mind was such that she represented a hazard to herself and her associates.

In the lunacy trial, held Saturday before County Judge W. E. Grimes, Dr. Geo. V. Smith and Dr. D. H. Pitts and numerous others, including Mrs. Wagner herself, were witnesses. The physicians who testified, said the defendant is mentally ill and should be in a hospital for care and treatment. Both had questioned the woman and Dr. Smith had been her family physician for 25 years. Both said her condition indicated a developing case of dementia praecox. Others who testified told instances of conduct particularly indicating a delusion of persecution and of the certainty of acquiring great wealth. As an instance witnesses said that Mrs. Wagner had bought a home for Mrs. Maud Parvin in Floydada and that Mrs. Parvin in turn had contracted a considerable portion of great wealth from an oil land estate in southeast Texas to Mrs. Wagner, to which the latter would acquire title when the estate is settled. It was indicated whether legal steps are being taken now to clear the title to the oil lands. Mrs. Wagner also has furnished funds for Mr. Parvin

to pay down on a truck without taking a lien to protect her interests one witness testified. A person reputedly astute in business matters, it was thought out of character for her to make such loose financial arrangements this witness believed and could be accounted for only by a mental condition that would result in the loss or dissipation of her estate. Other witnesses testified to the belief that Mrs. Wagner is a danger to herself and associates. They related instances which they claimed indicated she looked upon herself as a persecuted person.

**Mrs. Wagner Testifies**  
On the stand Mrs. Wagner said she expected to gain considerable wealth from her contract with Mrs. Parvin. She also declared she had been successfully handling her affairs for many years and she believed she could continue to do so. She said the effort to "put her away" in a mental hospital was being undertaken by designing persons who would gain control of her property by this means. Recently she filed a suit against John E. Tivis asking \$50,000 in damages, alleging slanderous statements as to her mental condition. For some months she has been declaring publicly that the effort to get her into a hospital "and out of the way" would be undertaken. Other witnesses also testified to the belief that Mrs. Wagner is sane.

G. H. Nelson and George McCleskey, Lubbock lawyers, were in Saturday's hearing employed by Mrs. Wagner. District Attorney John B. Stapleton represented the state in the trial.

Mrs. Wagner continued to be held this week on a charge of mental unbalance. Mrs. Wagner is a widow, her husband having died several years ago while they made their home on a farm she still owns at Fairview. He was in a hospital for the mentally ill at Wichita Falls until a short time before his death.

The jury which was unable to agree on the question of the sanity of Mrs. Wagner Saturday evening was composed of Tom Hopper, Olin Poote, Lewis Bunn, Jim Jones, Otis Huckabee and Willie Bunch.

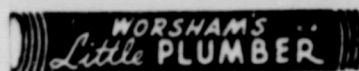
## GAIL FRANCES COVINGTON FEATURED IN RECITAL AT ST. JOSEPHS ACADEMY

thousand acres of cotton and forage feeds have been seeded since last mid-week.

Rains which gave the lower panhandle and middle Texas much more moisture than it needed have been sparse in Floyd county for the most part slightly less than an inch and a half of rain has fallen at Floydada. However, the moisture came in an ideal way. Farm operators are particularly unanimous in indicating confidence their row crops will come up to a good stand this week.

Considerable dry land acreages planted on the showers which preceded the late rains already has good stands of cotton and feed.

**Wheat Prospects Helped**  
Where wheat already was indicating fair to good yields the rain is helping to fill out the heads and the grain crop will be benefited in this way. The fall was too late to be of great benefit in this respect, however. Many farm operators had turned their wheat under. Some are summer fallowing. Others are putting in row crops on the ground. On irrigated farms the rains were quite beneficial in conserving labor, water and fuel. Only sour note is an occasional spoiled field of alfalfa, where the hay was caught on the ground.

A few widely scattered areas reported some showers last week-end and the first of this week. Southwest of Floydada around Barwise, Allmon and adjacent communities a nice shower fell last Saturday.

## Pierce King Recalls When Things Happen Good at times for Farmers of the Texas High Plains

Late rains sometimes do a lot more good on the high plains than we expect them to do, depending on how much falls, the kind of weather that comes along afterward and things of that kind.

Last week's rains reminded Pierce King, local grocer, of a thing that happened when he was a youngster 28 years ago. He recalls that a big rain fell on May 25. It put lots of water in the lakes. Meanwhile the wheat had "burned up". The way everything happened the "burned up" wheat turned out to make 25 bushels to the acre and the farmers (except those who held for \$3) sold their crop at \$2.40 a bushel.

Mr. King remembers that year they paid \$6 an acre for combining, and that harvest hands drew \$6 a day. His uncle, Ned King, had a hog pasture in oats that made 90 bushels of oats per acre.

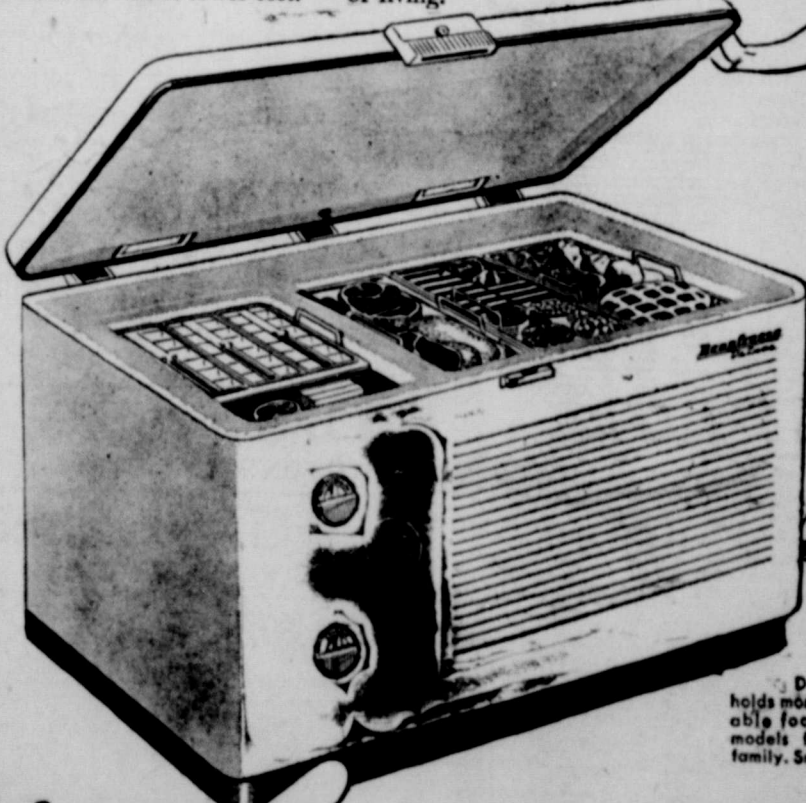
