## EDITORIALS

LIBERTY DEMONSTRATION BILL

(A contributed Editorial)

It is encouraging to know that progressive congressmen are trying to make free library service as universal as rural free delivery. The Library Demonstration bill, which was recently passed by the Senate, would assist states in extending library service to the 35,-666,000 Americans - 32,000,000 of them in rural areas-who do not have access to pub-He library facilities.

Several Texas congressmen are strongly supporting the bill, and one told his colleagues recently: "This bill would do a lot for my state of Texas, as well as for other states. There are more people in Texas without library service than in any other state. Over 3,600,000 Texans, or about half our population, do not know what free public library service is. Of the 254 counties in Texas, 150 have no cubic library within their bounds."

Under the terms of the bill, Texas will receive \$25,000 a year outright, and up to \$75,-666 a year more, to be matched by State funds, for a four year library demonstration program. The Texas State Library will make the plans for using money made available under the bill, and will be in complete charge of the demonstration program. The hill, specifically provides that there shall be no interference or dictation by the Federal government. Texas would use the money to establish county and intercounty library service throughout the state.

That this library legislation is needed is evidenced by the large number of requests received by the Texas State Library for aid to counties desiring to establish county libraries. These requests must be denied because Tuxas, unlike many states, does not grant state aid to libraries. Every citizen interested in library development should write his congressman now urging favorable action on H. R. 2465.
