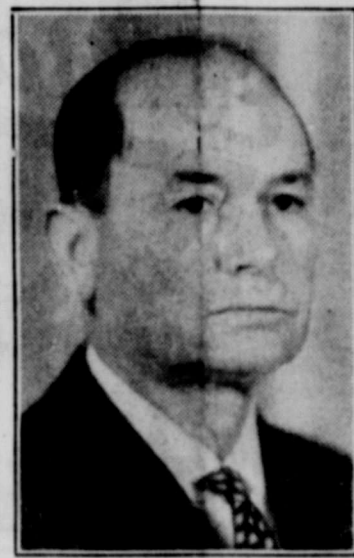

Tubbs is high man with 1014 votes. Deen's vote is 814. In third place is F. L. Brown, farmer and real estate dealer, with 641, and the incumbent, W. E. Grimes is fourth with 507. It's Tubbs and Deen for the run off without doubt.

For sheriff it is Leland A. Hart without a run off against Whitaker and Adams. Hart's total is 2040, Whitaker has 783, and Adams 211.

Voters of the county gave their preference to Mary Louise McPherson over Mrs. Gladys B. Howard for district clerk, 2056 to 1137.

In the race for assessor-collector of Floyd county T. T. Hamilton is high man. His opponent in the run off will be Mrs. Elizabeth McCollum. The vote, all boxes complete, unofficially, Hamilton 1346, McCollum 1119, Winters 801.

Clark is Big Winner

In the races for the offices of commissioner there will be a run off in Precinct 2 between Counts and Bobbitt, in Precinct 3 between Plumlee and Jones and in No. 4 between Fawver and Hart. In Precinct No. 1, Fred N. Clark, running for a second term, was an easy winner over two opponents, W. J. Waller and W. H. Brock. Vote in the commissioners' races:

Precinct No. 1: Clark 630; Brock 171; Waller 165;

Precinct No. 2: Bobbitt 238, Counts 227, and Carthel 123;

Precinct No. 3: Plumlee 162, Jones 129, Yearly 106;

Reed Has Clear Majority

In the justice of the peace race at Lockney the voters gave T. Z. Reed a clear majority. The vote was Reed 568, Hackney 276, and Millwee 221.

Vote in Uncontested Races

In five uncontested county races the voters did a very little bit of "scratching." Ernie T. Jones, the Baylor boy who moved to Floyd county early this year and cast his lot here for the practice of law, got 2773 votes, Margaret Collier, incumbent county clerk got 3079, Mrs. Sam A. Spence 3284 for county treasurer, Clarence Guffee for county superintendent 2259, and W. D. Newell for county surveyor 3291.

Jones, a stranger to most of the voters, ran 500 votes or more behind the leading uncontested candidate W. D. Newell.

For public weigher J. C. Custer received 1771 votes in an uncontested race, and O. B. Olson for justice of the peace in Precincts 1 and 4, also uncontested, got 1583 votes.

Mahon for congress, Pitts for appeals chief justice, Holt for representative and Stapleton for district attorney each polled in excess of 3,000 votes here.

Added Machinery Steps Up Ice Plant Daily Production

A. W. Arnold, who bought the Floydada ice plant last season from Southwestern Public Service company and has been making additions and improvements, has added three tons daily to the production capacity of the plant by the addition of new freezing machinery.

By keeping the plant in operation at its peak Arnold has been able to meet the demand for ice. Making use of the storage vaults he has gained somewhat on cool days to meet the demand which mounts steadily when old Sol turns on the heat. Last season, as for seasons before, the ice-making machinery lacked a bit of meeting all calls and slowed the waiting line down as the freezing units did their utmost but hardly fast enough.

Present daily capacity of the Arnold plant is 13 tons.

### Sees Commissar in White House

Complacency on the part of the United States as to the effectiveness of the United Nations organization, belief in our military power, or blind acceptance of Soviet Russia's expansionist program may result in a Commissar in the White House in the opinion of Owen J. Roberts, former Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

Writing in the Cosmopolitan magazine, Mr. Roberts piercingly appraises the United Nations organization, which he believes incapable of preserving the peace of the world; the belief of the militarists who feel that only a tremendously powerful United States military machine can safeguard our security; and the view of those who would countenance limitless Soviet expansion.

Concerning the last-named group, he states unequivocally:

"I, for one, oppose this view with all my strength. We must never forget that if Hitler had been able to destroy Great Britain, after he conquered the nations of Western Europe, we would have been next. We prevented aggression against ourselves only by entering the war in time to prevent the destruction of Great Britain, our bastion across the Atlantic.

"Stalin could do what Hitler failed to do. If we are complacent, we may end up with a Commissar in the White House."

Because the Assembly of the United Nations is merely a debating group with no authority to make laws that govern all the member nations, and because of the veto in the Security Council, the United Nations is powerless to solve the world's problems, he declares.

To pursue a policy of strong-arm diplomacy, backed by a mighty military machine would seriously lower our standard of living and finally destroy the very liberty we are trying to save. Mr. Roberts declares.

To try to live in amity with dictatorships and yield to aggressive and expanding nations in the hopes their terror-imposed structures would eventually collapse of their own weight would be well nigh suicidal, he contends.

Only by federating those nations of the world whose citizens have individual liberty and practice self-

government can we hope for world peace, Mr. Roberts feels.

"The people of all these nations can, and should unite in one international government," he declares. "Such a federation would be the surest protection of the individual liberty and the economic welfare of all the people in it."

Considering that there would be many difficulties in the way of such a federation Mr. Roberts contends that none of them are insuperable.

"The alternative is to stagger on in a world riven by national sovereignty in the vain hope that, somehow diplomacy and power, which have always failed in the past, can keep us out of war in the future," he declares.

Next Week For Reinstatement Insurance

This is the last week for reinstatement of National Life Insurance on a "complete health" basis, Robert W. VA Manager of the West Texas Administration Regional offices, reminded veterans.

to offer World War II veterans their last opportunity to reinstate lapsed G. I. insurance on the liberal basis. VA offices are located in Amarillo, Childress, Lubbock, Abilene, San Angelo, Big Spring, Odessa, and El Paso. Application blanks for reinstatement may also be obtained from County Service Officers, Veterans Organizations or the American Red Cross.

Before August 1, an eligible veteran may reinstate an amount of term insurance -- from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500 -- regardless of the length of time it has been lapsed, and usually without a physical examination.

He need only fill out a simple application form, in which he certifies that his health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months.

The privilege of reinstating on this basis will be available after July 31

Tax 'Climate' Good in Texas

Because Texas has a sound tax structure, it had more new construction in 1946 and 1947 than the rest of the Southwest combined, contends the Texas Manufacturers Association in an advertisement prepared for publication today.

Texas led the entire United States in 1946-47 construction, and more than 24% of all the 1948 industrial construction planned in the entire

nation is in Texas, quoting figures from the magazine, "Engineering News-Record."

Texas' present tax structure is the reason why the state has taken such an overwhelming lead in new building, the ad says.

Industrial construction in Texas totaled \$286,376,000 for 1946 and 1947, while Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico had a combined total in industrial construction of only \$79,636,000.

Texas has had no more natural resources than many other states, the ad says, but it has a better business "climate," in which a business can grow. This climate is evidenced by Texas' low per capita cost of state government, low per capita taxes collected, and low bonded debt.

Texas now has no personal income tax, corporate income tax, or general sales tax. Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Arkansas, who have trailed behind Texas in new construction, have all these taxes.

The ad, in a section headed, "Which Way, Texas?" asks Texas to keep taxes down in order to keep the "climate" that will bring more and more business to Texas, more and better opportunities for youth, and more and better jobs.

"TMA recommends," said Ed. O. Burris, executive vice-president of the Association, "that Texas operate within the revenue available from existing tax structure and that no new taxes of any kind be considered. Any tax would reduce Texas' competitive position."

Texas' present tax structure, set up in 1941, now brings in over 108 million dollars more per annum than it did six years ago when it was devised, the ad points out.

The ad asks citizens and public officials not to support appropriations for any purpose unless absolutely needed and the money is avail-

able, else the "favorable climate" shall be destroyed.

"Any group asking our Legislature to hand out more cash is inviting a new tax bill in Texas," warned H. A. Burrow, president of TMA. "As competing cities, counties, and districts add their demands, watch appropriations snowball, and taxes to match. And watch business go somewhere else."

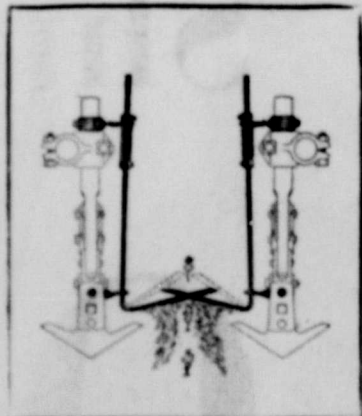

Miniature auto racers that top 100 miles-per-hour are the latest creations of mechanical craftsmen and the once spare-time hobby has grown into a new sport that engages attention from coast to coast. R. J. Verville and W. J. Ringle of the Canton office engineering department of The Timken Roller Bearing Company are two of the miniature racing enthusiasts. The men are shown with models of their cars and a number of trophies won in competition.

The cars, with an average weight of five and one-half pounds, are precision built from the builder's own design. They are powered with the latest and finest miniature motors that hit 14,000 rpm when the car travels at 100 mph. Since weight and friction are constant problems in attaining higher speeds, Verville and Ringle, both so familiar with bearings through their work with Timken, have installed five anti-friction bearings on the cars and three in the motors.

The world speed record for a car of this type now stands at 125 miles per hour. Tracks used are concrete ovals 75 feet in diameter.

### High Pest Cost Cuts Income of Cotton Farmers

Cotton insects are an expensive luxury to farmers of the Cotton Belt.

In 1946, the boll weevil, boll-worm, and other pests devoured more than \$250,000,000 worth of the farmer's cotton. This meant, the National Cotton Council reveals, a loss of one-eighth of his cotton income to the average farmer.

Such losses can be avoided in 1948, the Council continues, through observance of cotton insect control recommendations prepared by land grant college entomologists in each state.

Generally, the Council says that farmers should stock enough poison for at least one dusting, have adequate dusting equipment to apply poisons, make regular infestation counts, and begin dusting when infestation of cotton by the boll weevil or other pest becomes severe. Dusting should continue at about five-day intervals until insects decline below the danger point.

Farmers in this locality are urged to consult their county agent or nearby vocational agriculture instructor for detailed information on cotton insect control measures recommended for the surrounding area.

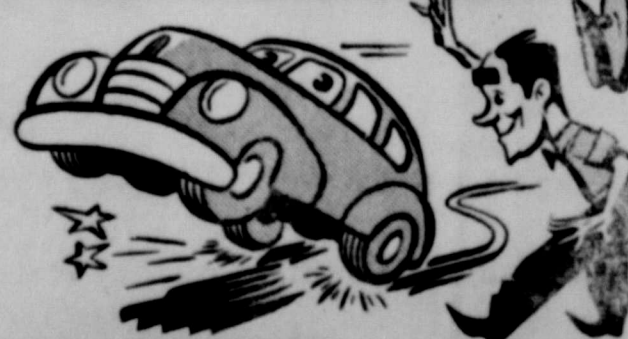

## Heart Disease No. 1 Killer

Texas.—Heart disease in the top spot as the killer of Texans, according to figures released by the Texas Department of Health. The rate of deaths from the April 1, 1948, to the April 1, 1949, was 1,354. This is an increase of more than the comparative period. The functional heart disease is usually traceable to nervous infections from other parts of the body such as teeth and tonsils, which disturbs the function of the

thyroid gland, and influenza." Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said. "And the excessive use of tobacco, coffee, tea, or other heavy stimulants is often a contributing cause."  
Malfunction of the heart is a correctible condition, the health officer said, insofar as the sources of infection may be located and eliminated, as in the case of bad teeth or tonsils. Incurable organic heart ailments exist only too frequently. Strict adherence to competent medical advice will eliminate much worry about either functional or organic heart conditions, Dr. Cox said. He added that such adherence would unquestionably reduce deaths from heart disease materially.  
Surveys reveal that gum-chewing stenographers are faster typists than their non-gum-chewing sisters, which proves that women are happier when working their jaws.

### BOYCE HOUSE "GIVES YOU TEXAS"

The recent finding of oil again at the "ghost town" of Leeray (on the Eastland-Stephens county line) after the spot had been deserted 20 years ago as "played out" reminds me of the time that I started an oil boom at Leeray—probably the shortest oil boom on record.  
Leeray sprang up about 1919 in a wilderness of wolves and mesquite when oil was struck. The C. & N. E. railroad, building from Cisco to Breckenridge, built through the town, which grew to a population of perhaps 6,000. Then dry holes were hit and people moved on. The buildings were torn down; piles of rubbish and streets, rapidly being reclaimed by grass and brush, were the only remains of the one-time boom town.  
It was late in 1923 that a friend of mine and I visited the scene. I had in mind writing an article on the "phantom city". My companion had a box camera, which he set up on a tripod, and took pictures. A small brick vault stood all by itself—thousands of dollars had been stored there. The bank building had been torn down but the little vault was considered not worth the trouble of salvaging.  
The sun was shining that Saturday but it was a deceptive sunshine, as though it mocked the hopes of which Leeray was the graveyard. The temperature was cold and a strong wind added a penetrating keenness that was almost numbing. Someone saw the two visitors and assumed that the camera on a tripod was a scientific device of some kind. So the report spread that Leeray was being studied for further oil development. On Monday morning, when the oil company offices in Eastland opened, landowners of the Leeray area were waiting, ready to lease their land. When the officials of one company said that he was uninterested, the landowners went on to another until all the offices had been visited, then they sadly returned home. The oil company officials scratched their heads as they puzzled about the sudden "invasion" of landowners

from around Leeray.  
And that's how I started an oil boom which lasted from Saturday through Monday.  
But like the character in the comic strip who was "born 30 years too soon," I was just ahead of developments by something like 25 years. Leeray is now the scene of a revival of oil activity.  
That cold, wind-swept day, I had been walking around on soil under which lay a treasure of deeper oil. Recently, six wells have been drilled in the vicinity -- two of them in the townsite itself. In fact, one of these deeper producers is only 200 feet from where that old bank vault stood.  
Well, anyhow I have a picture of the vault.

### Buy Dusters To Suit Own Needs, Council Advises

Buy cotton dusting equipment suited to the needs of your individual farm.  
The wrong kind of dusting equipment, no matter how small or large the original purchase price, will prove to be an expensive investment to the cotton farmer, the National Cotton Council declares.  
A prime rule in buying dusting equipment to combat the boll weevil and other cotton insect pests, the Council says, is to select the machine which will perform the job best on the individual farm.  
For example, a farmer with several hundred acres in cotton should not depend on a hand gun. Nor has the very small farmer need for a large tractor-driven duster.



Following are acreages which may be covered by various types of equipment: hand duster, 2/3 acres per hour; 2-row mule duster, 2 1/2 acres per hour; 2-row tractor duster, 5 acres per hour; 8-row tractor duster, 100 acres per day; airplane duster, 50 acres per hour.  
County agents and vocational agriculture teachers throughout the Cotton Belt are ready to lend farmers in their own areas assistance in selecting the proper cotton dusting equipment.
