1600-Pound Bull Drowns in Bar Pit

Story of a 1600-pound bull drowning on a plains farm in Floyd county is one of the oddities of the week, and an expensive one to Lyndale

Geo. B. McAllister, manager of the business, said the bull a fouryear-old registered animal, and a younger bull were scuffling in ground being pastured adjacent to a narrow bar pit. The big bull tripped over the fence as the younger made a pass at him and landed in water in the bar pit with his feet in the air. The pit was so narrow the animal couldn't turn over. "He just lay there and kicked until he drowned," said McAllister. The animal was so big the men couldn't do anything with him barehanded. Power machinery equipped to pull bulls out of barpits isn't part of the equipment readily available on the place, so they couldn't do any-thing but watch the animal expire: The cost was something over \$500. self, getting back to something more appropriate for a country newspaper to discuss perhaps, is that while he saves the country, slashes about and throws his weight, whatsoever it may be, on this and that mighty problem of the nation-what makes the newspaperman mad at himself is that while he is doing this his more practical neighbor is concentrating on how to make a living for his famly. And when the years roll around he has the money to buy a new car, build himself and his famiy a new house, and have enough left to take his wife to the Dallas Fair during an odd week when there is not much to do on the home front. Some even hie them off to New York or take a cruise to Hawaii, as well they should, while their business plans are maturing. The newspaperman can't get off and couldn't finance the trip if he could. He has been busy being a smart fellow. He even knows what to do about civil rights.

The average newspaperman makes a poor politican. Some men who run newspapers are political wizards, but the most make a poor showing at being a politician, especially at what we call the higher level. They get burned out too quickly, out of patience with the littleness of some of their contemporaries in attempting to reach the heights of fame and power. An occasional newspaper kingmaker comes along but he is a rare bird.

Serve all salads very cold, and garnish with crisp, fresh lettuce or shredded cabbage, tomato wedges, slices or quarters of hardcooked eggs.

Stevenson and Lyndon B. Johnson, both residents of the Texas hill country, are pitted against each other in a run-off for United States senator. It may well be the people of Texas will want him over Mr. Stevenson for their senator. We are not militantly against such a fine young man. We just think Mr. Stevenson would be the better for the place and support him with that thought in mind.

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provis-ions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first reg-ular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) mem-bers, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. 
