SOMETIMES I THINK voters don't do everything they could to find out about the candidates who are running for office, before casting their ballots, or maybe their memories are short.

We admit that it's a tough situation, especially when you have as many candidates running as we had on last Saturday's Democratic Primary ballot.

But sometimes the number of candidates isn't a good excuse, either.

Take, for example the race on the Republican ballot between Governor Bill Clements and his challenger "Duke" Embs. It was in most of the papers and on television prior to the election that Embs had spent time in jail and in a mental hospital (he was arrested downstate during the campaign for biting a deputy sheriff).

Yet, in spite of this, Embs received 13 votes in Parmer County, and 16,085 statewide. Either the lack of information regarding Embs was overwhelming, or a lot of voters really didn't like Governor Clements.

On the Democratic ballot, incumbent state treasurer Warren G. Harding had been much in the news, having been indicted for misuse of public funds. His opponents spent a lot of time and money pointing out that Harding was elected in 1978 only because of his name, the same as the 29th president.

Apparently all of the voters didn't get this message, because Harding led the voting in the county's biggest boxes, including Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie, and carried Parmer County with 607 votes.

However, Ann Richards beat Harding in the primary, and he pulled out of the runoff although entitled to compete.

Then there was the race between incumbent State Comptroller Bob Bullock. Bullock's primary opponent was Robert C. Calvert, who took advantage of his name to try for the nomination.

Robert S. Calvert, now deceased, was state comptroller for 26 years. Another Calvert, Robert W. Calvert, and from the same hometown as Bullock, is a former member of the legislature and former speaker of the house.

Bullock says he hopes not to have to run against another Calvert, regardless of what his middle initial might be.

Those of us in the news business can probably shoulder a good part of the blame for not harping more on the offenders, though as we stated, much time and space had been used in some of the races for just this purpose.

Sometimes voters may need to stop and think, when they see a name they recognize, and ask themselves "Now, do I know this name because he is a good guy, or a bad guy?"

Name identification is a big factor in politics, and sometimes when a person has achieved identification with the voters, it's immaterial what he or she does in office, or out of it.

As one politician once said to a newspaper "I don't care what you print about me--just spell my name right!"

FAC Books Lewis For Workshop

The annual Summer Drama Workshop, sponsored by the Friona Fine Arts Council will be held July 12 through July 24, according to a spokesman for the council.

Friona native Del Lewis will return to direct the workshop.

Fees to be charged each participant are \$15 for students who are nine years of age through the eighth grade; \$25 for high school students, or a family rate of \$40.00.

Lewis, a graduate of Friona High School, is director of the drama department at the University of Wisconsin at Madison and is director of the Madison Civic Repertory Theatre.

City Awards Contract

Jake Diel Dirt and Paving, Inc. was the low bidder on the street sealcoating program for Friona streets.

Bids were opened at the regular monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night, May 3.

Diel's low bid was \$9,120.50, which figured out to .0629 per square yard.

Bids ranged to a high of \$18,125. Other bidders included Hi-Plains Pavers, Inc. of Plainview; Lipham Construction Co. of Aspermont and W.D. Turner Construction Co. of Lubbock.

In other business, the council appointed seven local technicians to an Electrical Advisory Board, which will work with the city council and make recommendations along the lines of the city's electrical code as the need arises.

Those appointed were Ray Campbell, Jason Hesse, Max Jones, Delton Lewellen, John Allen, Jerry Lewis and Eugene Griffin.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

City Manager Jerry Lewis says that the city is needing to appoint an advisory group to hear variances on certain ordinances concerning building or location of structures such as trailer homes.

The group would hear requests concerning zoning, types of construction, etc.

"We need about five members to sit on this board. Anyone interested is urged to contact the City Hall," Lewis said.

FCC Sets Member Campaign

Friona Country Club is having a special membership drive through June 1, it was announced by Chris Fontanilla, pro.

During the special one-month period, the customary initiation fee will be waived for anyone joining. Monthly dues are \$40 per member.

Fontanilla pointed out that membership benefits in the country club includes check cashing privileges in the pro shop, a charge account without interest in the shop, usage of other country clubs with charge privileges.

Also, usage of the swimming pool, golf course and tennis court for the entire family; storage and locker privileges and usage of the club lounge and the restaurant for private parties at a nominal fee.

Members are also eligible to attend all FCC functions such as the Christmas party and cookouts, are eligible to enter the annual club championship and may attend board of directors' monthly meetings.

Stock members will also have voting privileges and are eligible. Wives are entitled to join the FCC Women's Assn.

May 9-15 has been designated to honor hospitals and their staffs nationally.

Along with our three doctors who have served Friona for an awesome number of years, there are many fine and dedicated hospital employees. We would like, during National Hospital Week, to let you have a short "visit" with some of them.

GLADYS WILSON came to the Friona hospital system as an RN in 1946 when the hospital consisted of two beds above the old bank building at Fifth and Main. The first delivery there took place while the doctor was making a country house call and Gladys delivered a squawling Jeanene Wiley.

As the hospital moved to bigger and better facilities, Gladys helped in the moves.

The Wilson family went to Montana for a short time then decided that Friona was home. At this stage in her career Gladys trained as a nurse-anesthetist and began her work in this capacity at the local hospital in 1974.

Gladys prefers to work in a small hospital, as personalized care is important to her and she believes that this results in lasting friendships between patients and nurses.

Gladys has two children, Don and Lynn.

DOROTHY HARRELSON, or

"Kelly" as she prefers to be called, along with the now Mrs. Paul Spring, arrived in April, 1949. Caryl was Nursing Director for ten years and loves nursing in general and obstetrics in particular. She says that she has been at Parmer County Community Hospital for so long and seen so many improvements, that she almost feels like a part of the furnishings.

Caryl was married to Joe Fallwell and they had four children, the family suffering through the tragic loss of two of them in their teens.

Precinct Race Is Demo Highlight

A close commissioner's race in Precinct 2 highlighted the Democratic Primary last Saturday in a low voter turnout in Parmer County.

In fact, the commissioner's race was so close that Jack Patterson, incumbent, has asked for and received a re-count of the votes in the three voting boxes involving the race.

Figures released on the race by County Chairman Richard Collard and County Clerk Bonnie Warren showed challenger Tommy Williams with 236 votes, to 185 for Patterson and 48 for Radford Venable. This would indicate that Williams had won the nomination by three votes, eliminating an expected runoff.

But Patterson, who has served as county commissioner the past four years, asked for a re-count, and this measure failing, has indicated that there may have been several voters taking part in the Democratic Primary at the Bovina precinct who were not bona-fide residents of the precinct.

Patterson has strongly hinted that if the re-count fails to throw the race into a runoff, he would take legal action based on the voting irregularities.

The results of the commissioner's race were not known until almost midnight Saturday, when the Bovina precinct reported to the clerk's office. A heavier than usual turnout of voters at Bovina caused the counting to proceed slowly.

Preliminary results showed that Patterson received 37 votes at Rhea, to 10 for Williams and two for Venable. Patterson won the new Friona box (Western and Lakeside additions), with 48 votes to 34 for Williams and two for Venable.

But Williams, who had waged a strong advertising campaign during the final month of the race, won the Bovina box, largest of the three, 184 votes to 93 for Patterson and 41 for Venable.

Williams also won the absentee box with eight votes, to seven for Patterson and three for Venable.

Results Are Same

According to late word Friday from County Clerk Bonnie Warren, the re-count showed results in the commissioner's race unchanged.

In the other commissioner's election, incumbent Raymond McGehee won nomination and virtual re-election, with 170 votes, to 68 for challenger Raymond Treider, Jr.

Marjorie Watkins was given the nod in her bid for nomination as District Clerk, with 699 votes, to 653 for Cynthia Thigpen.

Benna Felts won re-election as County Treasurer, with 784 votes to 589 for challenger Anne Norton.

The other county and district offices were unopposed.

Collard won re-election to his position as county chairman with 177 write-in votes. A number of other candidates received a smattering of write-in votes for the position, led by Danny Kendrick with ten.

These Kendrick voters may have just written their candidate's name on the wrong line, as he was elected precinct chairman in Precinct 2-1, with 100 write-in votes, and conversely, Collard received ten votes in that box for precinct chairman.

In the other new precinct, number 2, Fred Florez was elected precinct chairman with 20 votes.

Only 365 people took the trouble to vote in Friona, hardly enough to break the city into three precincts. Of this number, 219 voted in Ernest Anthony's precinct (2-1) 85 voted in the Patterson precinct (2-2), and 61 voted in the McGehee box (2).

Friona voters gave West Texan Max Sherman 334 votes, 94.4 per cent, in the four-man field vying for Attorney-General. However, the former state senator failed to make the runoff.

Friona favored Mark White in the governor's race with 231 votes and Bob Armstrong received 74. White and Buddy Temple will meet in the runoff.

Local voters favored Pete Snelson in the General Land Office commissioner's race, with 131 votes to 92 for Dan Kubiak and 63 for Gary Mauro. Snelson and Mauro will meet in the June runoff.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen may have been a shoo-in, but voters in the Precinct 2-1 box gave virtual unknown Joe Sullivan 40 per cent of their votes, which may be an indication that the incumbent will face an uphill battle come November and some real opposition.

Frionans followed the trend in voting for Jim Hightower for ag commissioner, giving him 185 votes to 172 for incumbent Reagan Brown. Hightower also carried the county, 741-588.

Local voters stayed with incumbent Warren G. Harding in the Treasurer's race, giving him 164 votes to 123 for Ann Richards, who led the ticket statewide. Harding later withdrew from the runoff, being under an official misconduct charge in Austin.

County GOP Vote Light

Parmer County Republicans, in a very light primary turnout, gave their overwhelming approval to Jim Collins for the U.S. Senate, and gave incumbent Governor Bill Clements a big edge in last Saturday's election.

Collins easily won every voting box in outpolling his opponents with 56 votes. Walter Mengden received 25 votes and Don Richardson seven.

Clements scored a runaway, 79-13 edge over his controversial opponent, Duke Embs.

In other races, Mike Richards edged Ray Frank in the state comptroller race, 48-31, and Woodrow Glasscock won the majority in the Land Commissioner race with 53 votes.

Dale Hart, unopposed for nomination for County Commissioner, precinct 2, received 20 votes, 18 at Bovina and two in the absentee box.

In the propositions, county Republicans nixed parimutuel wagering on horse racing, 66-25. They favored a jail sentence for repeat drunk driving offenders overwhelmingly, 85-6.

The voters approved initiative and referendum by 69-20; were almost unanimously against a law which would ban the private ownership of handguns, 88-3, and approved the abolishing of the so-called Sunday "Blue Laws" for closing, 54-36.

Only 121 people participated in the Republican primary. Sixty-one of these were at Friona. Another ten Friona Republicans drove to Bovina due to having no precinct election box in their new precinct.

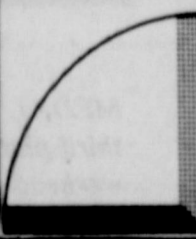

Navy beans may be new flour source

COLLEGE STATION — The newest food ingredient for cookies, frankfurters or even pancakes may come from navy beans, as a result of joint research by Texas A&M University and Michigan State University.

Under a \$100,000 USDA grant, two teams of researchers are studying new methods of processing the beans and are developing five new prototype food ingredients to add convenience and functional features which should encourage their use in new products both here and abroad.

Texas A&M's research is being coordinated by Dr. Jose Aguilera of the Food Protein Research and Development Center, a division of the Texas Engineering Experiment Station.

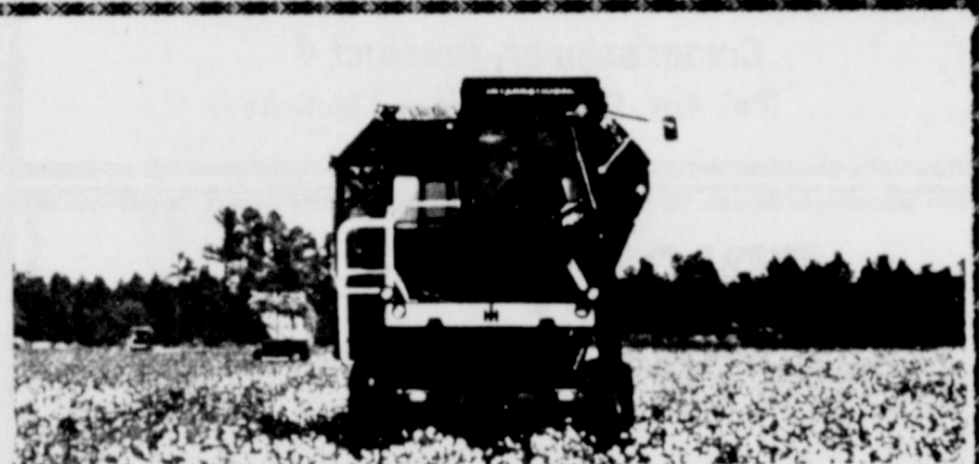

A tornado warning had sounded and Dorothy was in a quandary as to what to do with the bedridden "Mr. Mac." With the help of two small-sized aides, she pushed him, mattress and all, under the bed. 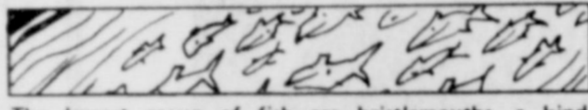
without which the hospital would be in dire straits.

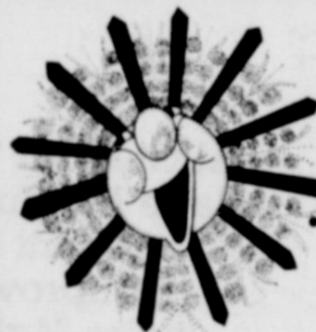

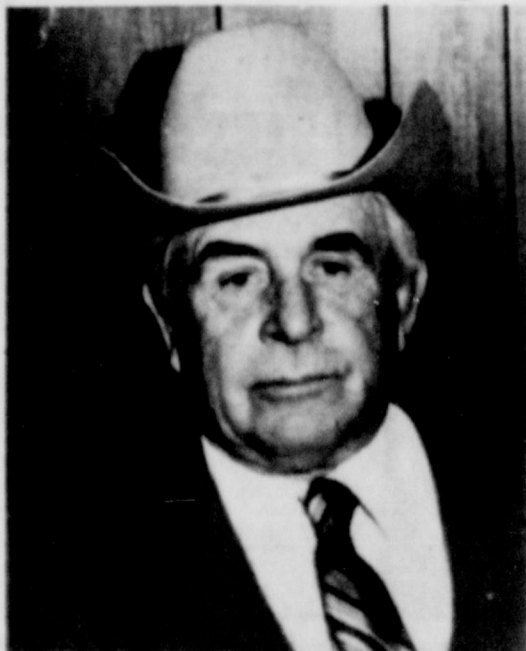

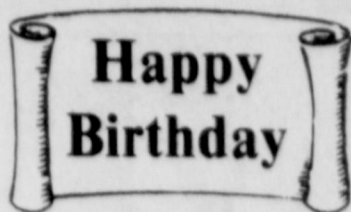
Hospital Week Proclaimed By Gov. Clements

Bovinians Enjoy Visit To Flying X Ranch

Cecil and Jessie Sisk could be said to have a yen for the old west, as they boarded their mobile home, and set out for the western cultures of the Flying X Ranch, Restaurant and entertainment center in Carlsbad, N.M.

Well, actually, the restaurant is outside of Carlsbad a bit, on the old Cavern highway.

So, Jessie and Cecil and other Bovinians, Owen and June Patton and Elton and Marie Venable, went out in quest of the western life. And, they found it!

The Flying X establishment is a restaurant and is devoted to family entertainment. There is no alcohol served and the western flavor is authentic, even down to the tin cup and plate from which the guests eat.

The bill of fare for the supper (called a chuck wagon supper, of course) is barbecue, beans, potatoes, chuckwagon biscuits, applesauce, ranch style cakes, coffee and lemonade. And, there is a tradition at Flying X that whoever has a cup of coffee and is going back to their seat has the right of way.

The season at the Flying X opens in May and runs through October.

For the kiddies, there are even hay

and pony rides and then the meal follows after which there is live entertainment from the band, "The Flying X Ranchhands."

Which brings us to the main point of our story...Royce Sisk, son of Cecil and Jessie, is a member of the Ranchhand's Band. He is a bass fiddle player, who also does some vocal and guitar work for the band. He is joined by Kenny Young, who is a guitarist, Butch Cassidy (real name, no kidding) who is the lead singer, and Wiz Higgins, who plays fiddle.

In real life, Royce is a bail bondsman and auctioneer. And, believe it or not, in real life, Butch Cassidy is a police officer.

The band presents a one hour, fifteen minute show each of six nights weekly, excluding Sundays. They have not made a record as yet, but past groups who have played at the Flying X have, and their records are on sale there.

The restaurant area seats over 1,000 and arrangements can always be made for special groups, such as school groups, church organizations, etc.

The Ranchhands have only been together this year, and each of the men had to audition for his spot in

Royce is a graduate of Bovina High School. The Sisks are former Friona residents.

Jessie Sisk says that the band plays and sings the real old country/western songs. She also stated that the experience was one that all folks, regardless of age, could enjoy.

But, mostly the Flying X Ranch is devoted to providing good quality family entertainment, at a fair price.

The cost is only \$6.50 per adult, and \$3.00 per child.
