

Foreign demand for American grain has receded and the price of grain has sagged. Mahon said that some Central Texas farmers were already selling their grain at 50c per hundredweight below the loan rate. Ninety Per Cent of Parity

Under the law the producer is entitled to a loan of 90% of parity on his combine maize, but loans are dependent upon the availability of storage, and the law will not be effective if storage arrangements cannot be made. Adequate freight cars and storage were not available during the war years but the market price for grain was above the loan rate and there was no serious question as to a support price and no considerable demand for loans.

Mahon said that if the loan on grain sorghum should not be available many producers would sacrifice their grain sorghum below the support price, but that if the loan were available the market price should remain firm above support price lence in games last year.

1948 Cotton Loan Details Given Out by USDA; Floyd Rate 30.51c on Fifteen-Sixteenths Middling

program covering cotton produced in 1948 have been announced by the U.S. December 2011 1948 have been announced by the

U. S. Department of Agriculture. The loan rate for 15/16 inch middling cotton, gross weight, will be 30.51 cents per pound for Floydada, which is 92% percent of the parity-price of cotton on August 1, 1948.

Premiums and discounts for grade and staple in the 1948 loan program will be calculated in relation o the loan rate of 15/16 inch mid-

The loan rates will vary according to location. While the loan rate for Floydada for 15/16 inch middling cotton, gross weight, is 30.51, 1, 1949.

Details of the 1948 cotton Loan the loan rate for similar staple and

are being made available through approved cotton warehouses, approved lending agencies, and Coun-ty Agricultural Conservation Association committees. Loans will be made on cotton represented by warehouse receipts issued by warehouses approved by Commodity Cop-

Cotton producer's notes will bear interest at the rate of 3 percent per annum and will mature July 31, 1949, but will be callable on demand. Loans will be available until May

Attempts to dramatize the job of sanitation has been made ma-ny many times in the 47 years of the town's corporate life. Clean up days still follow this same pattern. Effort has been to get voluntary compliance. But the city fathers are beginning to feel the pressure of the public sentiment to make use of the city's authority to force cleanliness. First, it appears that many property owners would like for the city to assess and collect more money for sanitation measures and to expend it wisely; and second, to put into effect the requirements of the ordinance that owners of property maintain their premalleys for dump grounds.

Clean Up day has much more significance this particular week than it has ever had in Floydada, so far as we are informed. Nobody knows for sure whether mosquitoes and flies are carriers of polio. Conversely, nobody knows that they are not. Both flies and mosquitoes are suspect, however. Some way, somehow, there is a coincidence. Lots of mosquitoes, lots of flies, lots of polio. Maybe they are not carriers, maybe they are. The scientists, the doctors are mighty, mighty, careful. They don't want their judgment to turn out to be a snap judgment. Also, of course, many epidemic-type diseases are known to arise from filth, flies, mosquitoes. Whatever the situation may be, it certainly does not hurt to have a clean town, to have the mayor's committee can't be wrong in insisting on a period of clean up, of fly breeding place removal, of reducing the possibility of mosquito breeding places. We all ought to go along. We all need to go along. The inconvenience of being closed a half day while the customers make heated conversation about us may be the half day that we prevent a case of polio breaking out in that selfsame customer's household.

Polio hysterics: A community where they didn't use DDT spraying nor make any appreciable effort at clean up had nine cases of polio in one week. In another community (named Floydada in the books) there were no cases of polio, but three sprayings and a program of keeping premises clean. Maybe there is no significance, but also maybe there is. Anyway, cleanliness is next to godliness. So said Poor Richard in his almanac. Why not go along with the city Friday morning. Clean up, spray, fight filth. You can't hurt a thing. You might help, and mightily.

After the cleanup is completed an inspection will be made offenders reported to proper authorities.





Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 28. The Legislature shall,

at its first regular session after the publication of each United States depublication of each United States de-cennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provis-ions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Leg-islature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennia census, fail to make such apport-ionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) mem bers, as follows: The Lleutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90 days after the final adjournment of such regular session. 

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as erns of Carlsbad." A very good apt

> Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after Jan-uary 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and mainten-ance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as here-in otherwise provided.

> "Provided that in those counties or State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Automatic Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal ob rations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation of harged, whichever shall first occur ovided that if such donation to by such county or political subdiv-tion is for less than the full amount he portion of such taxes remainng over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitution-

al Amendemnt shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A.
