Floydada and Lockney have been competing with Tulia for a number of years in non-conference tilts but it will be the Hornets' first year to play against any of the other six teams in the district, which are Crosbyton, Ralls, Abernathy, Mata-dor, Paducah and Spur.

The new district grouping makes Tulia more accessible to their rival teams, it was said in releasing the new alignment. One reason why the Tulia school is likely to be pleased with the change is the fact that it gets them out of the district with Phillips high which has a habit of running away with district honors, and none except very exceptional teams have a chance against the Blackhawks. But the tree would draw in even more water if the chemical is left out. The water prevents the dry and a fire hazard.

A fresh cutting of the butt on a slant removes the surface covering of resin that hampers the tree in absorbing water. Then keep this surface covered with water, before and after mounting the tree. It takes a little added skill and ingenuity to mount the tree so that the butt can remain in water while the tree is serving as the center of the holiday celebrating, but the extra effort is worth while in reducing fire hazard.

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



Gibson, extension dairy husbandman of Texas A. & M. College. Give them all the good rou-ghage they will eat and feed them more grain, especially the higher producing cows.

This butterfat-feed ratio means just this-at present prices, 1 pound of butterfat will buy 25.7 pounds of grain. And last year 1 pound of butterfat would buy only 20.7 pounds of feed. So that's an increase in the butterfat-feed ratio of 5.2 in a again.

In the group of winter health hazards, Dr. Cox included influenza, colds, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bron-chitis, asthma, and diphtheria when no immuninzation has been given.

Any such disease affecting child's respiratory or breathing sys tem is apt to be very serious and in many cases it is fatal. Pneumonia often develops from a neglected cold, or may follow a severe case of measles or whooping cough. Bronchial conditions may also prove to be an after effect of these diseases, and certainly these respiratory illnesses are much more diffi-cult to combat than the digestive disturbances commonly called summer complaints.

These winter diseases are especially dangerous to babies and very ung children", Dr. Cox Nearly all of them are spread from the secretions of the nose and mouth. Children not in good health are naturally more susceptible than those who are stronger, and the first line of defense is to keep the child's resistance built up to the highest possible point; the second to keep him under competent edical supervision, and the third is to make sure that they avoid contact with persons who have and several old presses.



ORDINANCE PROHIBITING AND RESTRAINING THE FIRING OF FIRECRACKERS FIREWORKS OR THE USE OF ANY PYROTHE-NICS UPON THE STREETS OR SIDEWALKS WITHIN THE CORP-ORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS:

1. That it shall be unlawful to fire firecrackers or fireworks or use any pyrothenics upon the streets or sidewalks within the limits of the city of Floydada, Texas. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance or any provision of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

3. Any person who willfully violates any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed

\$100.00. 4. The fact firecrackers and fireworks are being fired upon the streets and sidewalks of the city of Floydada, Texas, and is an annoyance to persons passing in the streets or sidewalks, creates an emergency, and public necessity, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the publication of same in the Floyd County Hesperian, the official newspaper of the City of Floydada, Texas, as required by law.

### COFFEE STIMULATES TRADE

Coffee, whether or not it serves to enliven or stimulate the drinker, is certainly a stimulant to international trade. In 1947 it stood Num-ber One in the list of commodities imported into the United States-a it has in many of the years since 1900. Always it has been an outstanding import item, though occa-sionally surpassed by sugar, hides and skins, rubber, wool and mohair,

Coffee is also an outstanding example of a "complementary" cross according to a U. S. Department of orld trade which the Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations now completing. Kathryn H. Wylie that the value of the coffee imports last year was more than 10 percent of the total imports of all products-estimated at a value of about \$5,650,000,000. A complementary product is one the United States must import. The imports of such commodities provide the supplying countries with dollar exchange to buy U. S. products.

Although the slang name for cof-fee may be "Java," the East Indian island contribution to the U.S. supply is relatively slight. In all but a few years of this century Brazil has supplied more than half ountry's coffee imports, sometimes ip to more than three-quarters.





### onservation District News

The Floyd County Soil Conservaon district held their regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, December 8. Bert Bobbitt attended the meeting as a new member of the board of supervisors. All other members were present. The recent soil blowing was discussed and the board thought that the emergency reduced if the farmers would rough up the land by chiseling or listing.

Clodding the land will work and the few fields which soil type is such that clodding is impossible, could be aggravated by plowing. To prevent future erosion on this type of soil it should be planted to grass at first opportunity. The fields that were cloddy or had a good cover of tubble did not move as much as fields that were bare and pulverized. Better management of the crop residue, contour farming and terracing during seasonable years will minimize hazardous conditions during dry years. The drought has caused part of this condition to materialize while some operators overgrazed fields or otherwise abus-

One farmer can undo the efforts several if he refuses to cooper ate in controlling a blow hazard and
