### Amateur Rodeo April 23 - 24

Belief that the amateur rodeo of Floydada Rodeo association on April 23 and 24, will be good, is indicated in the fact that the committee already is getting some entries from good contestants and inquiries from others.

The term "amateur" is used to indicate that the contests are not recognized by the professional rodeo followers, although the contestants who enter usually ride and work the calf ranges for a living, Jack Johnson, president of the rodeo organization pointed out.

Prize money for the rodeo will aggregate \$900. It will be distributed in three performances with five events each—bull riding, saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, calf roping and cowgirl sponsor contest. First afternoon program will be on April 23 beginning at 2:30. This will be followed by an 8 o'clock performance the night of April 23, and the third and last of the arena performances will come on the afternoon of April 24 at 2:30 o'clock.

Jay Wise, a Muleshoe man, will furnish the wild stock for the rodeo.

The body was received by Harmon Funeral home, Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock from the Fort Worth Quartermaster depot, escorted by Cpl. Phillip M. Vandever of the U. S. army.

Phillip Taylor was born on August 4, 1914. He went into the service from Floyd county, February 12, 1945, and departed from the east coast in August of the same year.

An infantryman in the U. S. army, he was killed in France on November 16, 1945.

Military tribute will be paid by McDermitt Post, American Legion. Pallbearers for the occasion will be Carl Lewis, Gene Lawson, Seaton Howard, Bruce Holder, Bemis Carver and Joe Martin.

Cleaning Out Canine Population With Well-Placed Poisoned Meat

Dog poisoners in Floydada have been doing a good job in the past two weeks, and as the canine population dwindles they find the job a little slower. This week we had to pitch or place bait near the fence and in the yard in order to make the final clean-up.

This is the tearful-voiced report of the Hesperian has been getting reports Monday. Amongst others two boys are due to return home this next few days to find their dogs they hunger to play with their already gone where good little dogs go.

"Whoever it is seems so deliberate," said one lady. "He cleaned up block and the next one last week on Sunday he got our pup. The dog got the bait and ate it and died before our eyes right in the yard. We know he wasn't outside, he got him to the veterinary too."

That the poisoner is endangering the lives of little children who might be playing in the yard was a thought expressed in this call to

the newspaper office. Strychnine will kill a baby just like it will a dog, said the lady, who wondered what could be done about it. The reporter did not have the answer to that one.

# EDITORIALS

To every man his own idea of what makes history as time goes along. To us the biggest history made in Floyd county in recent weeks was the formation of an artificial breeding association by dairymen who are interested in Holsteins and Jerseys. The quality of cattle of these breeds in the county is bound to go up as dairymen realize that it is inexpensive and more practical to make use of outstanding bulls in their breeding program than to use bulls of more doubtful records, or no records at all. The plan may catch on slowly but it will go like wildfire, we predict, before the association is three years old. A start had to be made and the month of March 1949, was the best time to make it since that was the first time the breeders interested had a chance to get the program started.

One of the interesting personalities with whom we meet up occasionally is H. B. Martin, a retired newspaperman and printer, whose personal knowledge of West Texas affairs and newspaper work in particular date back to the buffalo days. In these days a printer started a newspaper at the place where the hunters, hide haulers and supply men made their headquarters and moved on with them to the next place as the slaughter wended its way westward. Mr. Martin has a bit of age by this time and because he fears a man of his age might be boring talks only a short time and then moves on to another, when at a convention for instance. He guards against garrulity, which he thinks is a besetting failing of many aged people. He is an interesting man in more ways than one. Having retired from active affairs he keeps himself busy with a hobby of tinkering. Right now he has a clock he is making out of wood—whittling out with a knife. It is going to run and keep fairly good time, he is sure. He has a little trouble keeping his wife in good humor about the shavings on the floor. To satisfy her he has promised to give her half of the clock. What if it doesn't run? he was asked. Then I'll give it all to her, was his reply.

Water is the principal legislative concern of West Texans as witness the way the people immediately get interested when a water bill is dropped into the hopper of the legislature. For the present, at least, it seems to us the thing to do is to leave water alone until there is more study and more adequate information. Then, if there must be more water laws will be time to pass them, after people have had a chance to make up their minds what is and is not wise and what they would like for their representatives to do. Quite likely there will be no water laws passed this term of the legislature. There are some heavily controversial measures which have the right-of-way. It is possible the legislature may wear itself down working on them and finally go home without doing anything about water. Representative Holt seems to have the kind of water bill (governing underground water) that will come most

nearly suiting people of this area. There are other bills, too, but, if we are correctly informed, these are pigeon-holed in committee or they are so far down the list they will not have consideration for lack of time.

Floydada is given a distinct compliment this week-end, when the District Two convention of the Texas Home Demonstration Club association gathers here. So far as is known Floydada is the smallest community to date which has had this honor. Up to last year Brownfield was the smallest city to be so honored. Floyd county women and Floydada women, especially those who are familiar with meetings of this type, are particularly anxious for the delegates and officials and other visitors to have a good impression of our little city and of Floyd county people in general. Floyd county club women have been asking for the convention the past 10 years. Their perseverance is being rewarded this year. Anything any of us may do to help entertain or to make the occasion more pleasant for the considerable assembly of women would not be amiss.

Along the Trinity and certain reaches of the Brazos will come the worst trouble with grasshoppers this tenth year of the grasshopper cycle say the grasshopper control division workers of the Extension service. They call the big yellow one with the chevrons on his legs the "differential" in contrast with the migratory hopper which hits west of the cross timbers in this state, an above normal outbreak of the migratory type of grasshoppers will hit in the south plains area and in other parts of West Texas, say these workers after considerable count and investigation. How much luck the grasshoppers have or how much bad luck they bring the farmer is influenced quite considerably by the kind of weather that prevails at and following hatching time. The Extension people are getting ready just in case, a report from A. & M. college says.

The good fellow who proposed National Leave Us Alone Week (now said not to have a job) proposed the week because he thought it would be fine if the business man "could have a week of his very own to devote to his customers, promote sales, increase his newspaper advertising space and bar his doors to solicitors." Unfortunately he chose a week that conflicted in whole or part with: April Fools day, National Laugh week, Cancer Control month, Perfect Shipping month, National Baseball week, Army day, and Mule day. After all, American people, being like they are, want to be in a fizz to have something done that they have an urge to do, and likewise an urge to have their fellow Americans do like their urge urges them to do. It works out that way in practice. All of which means that Leave Us Alone week was an idea that is good to think about as would be something nice if it should come along some day.

### Reserving Club Girls Get Aid Through School

The Texas Home Demonstration association was organized in 1926. It was a very loosely organized group made up, not of clubs, but of men attending the Farmers' short course at College Station, Texas. The purpose was to provide an educational fund for a deserving 4-H girl to give training in parliamentary procedure and to have the men help with the Short course preceding at meetings. The association has been re-organized but one of its main objectives still to give a deserving 4-H girl a scholarship. The scholarship was given in 1926 and was collected by the club contributing 50 cents.

The 1944, 1946, and 1947 scholarship girls have attended Texas Tech at Lubbock and each girl has attended a meeting of the Texas Home Demonstration association of District 2. It is with justifiable pride that Home Demonstration club members look upon these young women that they have helped send to college by uniting their small contributions.

Lois Wilson of Cochran county, a candidate for the 1948 scholarship award will be presented at the district meeting of the Texas Home Demonstration association when it meets in Floydada Saturday.

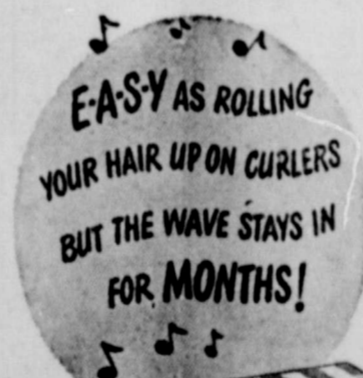

## Strict Field, Track Events on Saturday

The district 3-A track meet held Saturday was a complete success with near ideal conditions and weather was concerned, and events run off as scheduled. Competition in all events was close and races were the order of the day. In many of the events, the runner came from behind in the few yards and the contests were so close that the judges had to pick the winners. Cooperation between coaches, assistants and judges kept the moving at a fast clip and good sportsmanship was displayed by all concerned, including the winners.

Mr. Patterson, re-named street yesterday issued a statement to the residents of the city urging their aid in an alley cleaning campaign that will help control the weeds, level off the alleys and be a great aid in reducing the number of flies and mosquitoes in the city limits this season.

First and foremost, says Mr. Patterson, seconded by Floyd Johnston of the city staff, right now is the time to kill off the millions of little weeds that have popped up through the ground and are growing toward the sun with great speed. A maintainer can kill them off now, while at the same time leveling the alleys, filling chug holes and ditches at the same time. A bit later this won't work. The weeds will be bigger and the expense tripled or possibly multiplied by five. The city needs to save the money for the taxpayers, the weeds need to be exterminated right now.

Alleys Are Filled Up  
But the practical problem of the city men is that they cannot get down many of the alleys for the trash barrels, tree limbs, feed stacks, rubbish and whatnot. A trial run one day this week was a pain in the neck. Instead of killing weeds the crew spent their time moving barrels, moving tree limbs, dodging feed stacks, being careful not to make anybody mad by damaging some of the things they had stored in the alleys.

The real start will be made next week. Councilman Patterson said yesterday. "If we can get the people to go along with us and work with the crew, cleaning up and we get there it will be worth a lot to them and to the city and community in general," he said. "We sure need to get that maintainer up and down the alleys before the weeds get out of control."

New Fogger Is Tried Out  
Mr. Patterson and members of the city crews tried out the new fogger last week, for DDT spraying. It appeared to be highly efficient for the job. It is permanently mounted on a four-wheel truck that can be hooked onto a city pick-up in a minute. A reporter for The Hesperian witnessed fogging in various parts of the city. Citizens in these areas said the machine really poured out the dense fog. The city is using a formula that is recommended for the purpose of controlling disease germs. The fogger will be operated principally in alleys instead of along street, it is planned, if the citizens open up their alleys so the machine can go down them.
