



# EDITORIALS

**WATER CONTROL BILL.**—Representative I. B. Holt of the 120th district and the officers of the High Plains Water Use and Conservation association are sure of their ground when they assert that the bill passed by the current legislature and signed into law two weeks ago by Governor Jester is a victory for the high plains water users. Mr. Holt and the aggressive organization of high plains counties consider that they started just in time to avert disaster. The legislature was considering legislation declaring ground water in Texas the property of the state, says W. O. Fortenberry, who is president of the regional water use and conservation association. He is quoted as saying "This bill embodies all the protection we need and all the aggression we need at this time to put on a program of recharge of ground water." One thing that favors the people is that it "provides local administration, reiterates fee ownership and grants districts the right to tax themselves." Every newspaper in the district, it seems, was more or less active in pushing the legislation and every county water use and conservation association was actively behind the bill which was passed, and Representative Holt let no grass grow under his feet. The Hesperian due to lack of information, did not know and does not know what effect the new law may have on the general aspects of water conservation in Texas. But the high plains could not always continue merely opposing legislation. The area had to have a positive program. The law we have, the only one of its type passed by the current legislature, attempts to set up this positive program as a policy of the state.

**BATTLE OFFICIALDOM.**—From the standpoint of a number of West Texans the law just passed to create local districts was nothing more nor less than a fight for the rights of the citizens against entrenched officialdom. As for instance says The Petersburg Journal, where the secretary of the regional Water Use and Conservation association secretary lives:

"After two and one-half years of constant battle with the Texas Water Conservation Association and the Texas Board of Water Engineers, the irrigation farmers of the Plains of Texas finally won their fight to retain their inherited right to the underground water that lies beneath their farm lands, and to use it as they see fit. A law has been passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by the Governor giving farmers local control of the use of such water." It is quite conceivable that the Texas Water Conservation association and the Texas Board of Water Engineers have good arguments on their side. However, it was notable that during all the

two and a half year fight there was never a hint that we know of wherein West Texans were to have any consideration as to water rights, as to dams, as to anything but a paying interest. What makes us dubious is that the high plains people got a bill passed by the legislature and approved by the governor. The counties interested in getting the home rule law passed on water conservation spent something upward of \$23,000, according to a report given last week in Plainview, when the regional organization met. According to this report the Floyd county organization of irrigation men was a few dollars behind in its support of the measure. The amount as announced by Frank Perkins of Lockney was indicated at \$66. Some counties were due to raise as high as \$2,300 to cover a probable deficit of \$5,400.

It will take a little time to tell just what the veterans' land bill in Texas will mean to the veterans in obtaining lands on which to settle and make their homes. Bascom Giles, General Land Commissioner of Texas, is sure the project will be a quite valuable thing to many veterans and the measure to make the plan effective was pushed through the legislature by high officials of the veterans organization of the state. Likely Texas legislatures are not going to be favorable toward bond issues for veterans bonuses. State-wide bond issues are not popular in Texas although county and city taxing subdivisions go for improvement bonds in a big way. Perhaps the veterans who hear of other states which vote millions will feel that this land measure meets the situation in some part so far as their home state is concerned. The fact is the veterans are integrating into the business life of the state so fast that they will pay most of the bill for any bonus they get anyhow. Some of the boys who feel that their considerable sacrifice of the early years of their lives which would have been formative in business careers should have more recognition. Their elders, who didn't go to war, except vicariously, don't want to take too positive a stand against measures which would try to rectify this inequality. At the same time most hope the boys themselves will squelch any bonus-paying bonds, because they feel it will be better for the ex-service men themselves as well as the common welfare of all the people.

## Lorenzo Will Vote on Highway Bonds

CROSBYTON—Residents of the newly designated Road District No. 4 in Crosby county, will vote Saturday, June 18, on an issue to decide whether \$275,000 worth of bonds will be issued to pave 40 miles of road. The new district lies north and south of Lorenzo.

The state has agreed to pay 25 per cent of the cost on 20 miles, or half the total roads. On this part, they will also do the engineering, and take over maintenance after the job is finished.

On the remaining 20 miles the new road district would pay total cost and would have to maintain the roads after construction.

Considerable interest has been created in the election, Judge Emory Pieratt said.

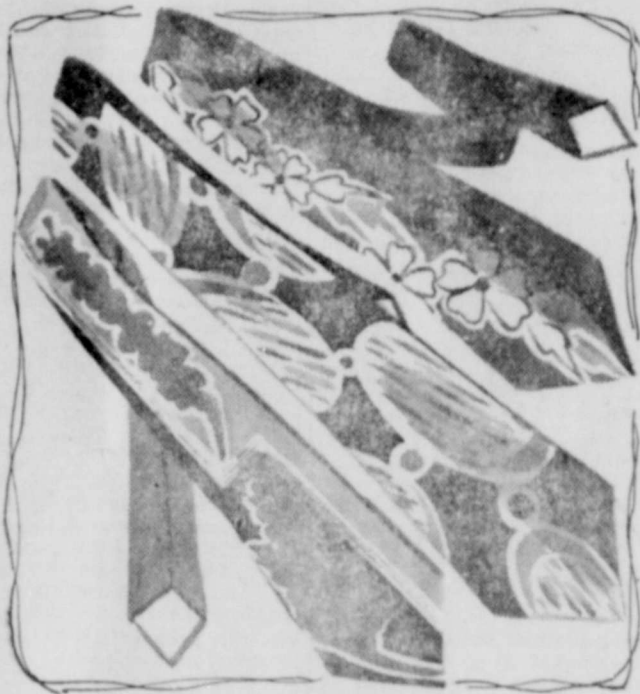

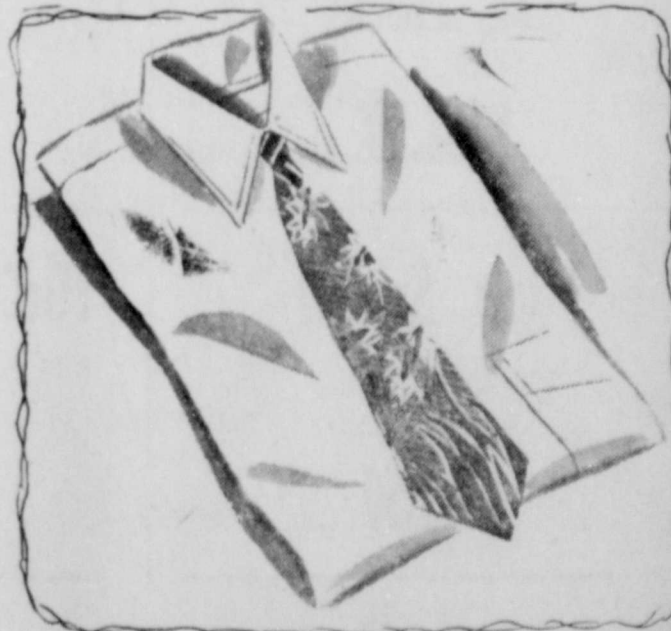

## Common House Fly Enemy Of Mankind

Countless thousands of flies are lost annually throughout the nation, from diseases that are transmitted by the common house fly. Dysentery, diarrhea, typhoid, tuberculosis and many other ailments and even fatal diseases spread by flies, and the contamination of houseflies becomes of great importance when considered in the light of public health.

Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that in order to protect families we should make sure homes are fly-proof through screening, and then concentrate on eliminating filth, garbage, and other breeding places for flies. He says that your windows, doors and porches are screened so that they cannot molest your family. Cox said, "and make sure that your grocer observes proper sanitation standards and keeps your meat, and vegetable supplies screened from flies."

Then direct your efforts to eliminating all fly breeding places as open garbage pails, open cans and other filth that offers proper warmth, moisture and food. Flies thrive on filth, and in such as one female pousety will lay from 600 to 100 eggs per season. It can easily be seen that one breeding place left available in a community, can be responsible for tremendous horde of flies."

Dr. Cox recommended organized community efforts as being effective in ridding a community of flies, and emphasized that no matter how clean one family's home and premises are, they are still not safe if

another home down the street leaves exposed filth where flies can breed.

### BOYCE HOUSE "GIVES YOU TEXAS"

The old Pecos River bridge, subject of poems, songs and Roy Bean yarns, is doomed. The work of demolition is underway or may even be completed.

A new bridge has been built and the old one has been unused for several years.

J. C. Carter, executive assistant for public relations for the Southern Pacific railway, has made a study of the old structure, which was built in 1892 and was in service till 1944.

A large salvage firm bought the old bridge.

Cowboys, to avoid the long ride down into and up out of the canyon, used to ride their horses across the high bridge. A young and pretty woman, "Pecos Kate", rode across and when a suitor was too faint-hearted to follow, she rejected him -- or so the song says.

Trains used to stop so that passengers could take in the view. Far below was a tiny trickle of silver -- the Pecos river. On its bank were even smaller objects, hardly discernible -- they were cows.

While the bridge was under construction, a scaffolding broke and seven men plunged to the boulders below. Judge Roy Bean rode over from Langtry to hold the inquest. The bodies were lying in a row. He instructed the jury to return a verdict that "These here seven men met their death by falling from the bridge." One juror spoke up, "But Judge, one of them ain't dead."

"Well," said Old Roy, "he will die and I ain't gonna ride 14 miles on a soreback mule to hold another inquest. Officially and legally, he is dead."

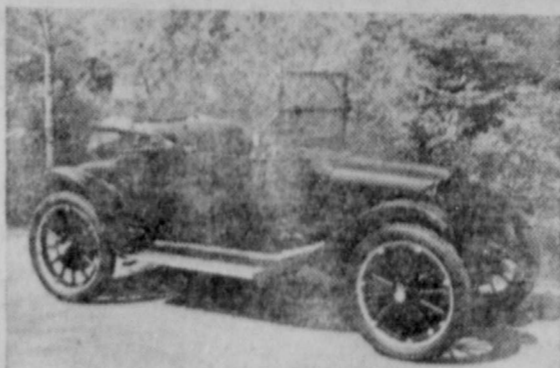
The jury so found -- and two days later, the seventh victim did pass away.

## Cool Summers In The House

COLLEGE STATION, May--You may not be able to do much about the temperature this summer, but you can do something about your house to keep a little cooler.

Inside house temperatures may be from 10 to 15 degrees cooler with insulation than without it, provided the house has enough ventilation, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural buildings engineer of Texas A. & M. College.

The insulation itself won't cool the house, but it will keep the heat outside during the day. Along with night ventilation, shading of the windows, awnings and shade trees near the house, insulation helps provide better cooling. The difference will be enough to make any house more comfortable when the mercury climbs high, Allen says.

Any home exposed to high temperatures in the summertime needs insulation, and the higher or lower the temperature, the greater the need for it. Here in Texas it's most beneficial in the summer. Reflective insulation, which comes in metal foil sheets, helps keep the sun's heat out of the house during the day, and allows for rapid cooling at night. So it is well adapted to the South, says Allen.

Your house may be made cooler this summer by proper use of insulation. And don't forget that the fuel bills will be less next winter, too.

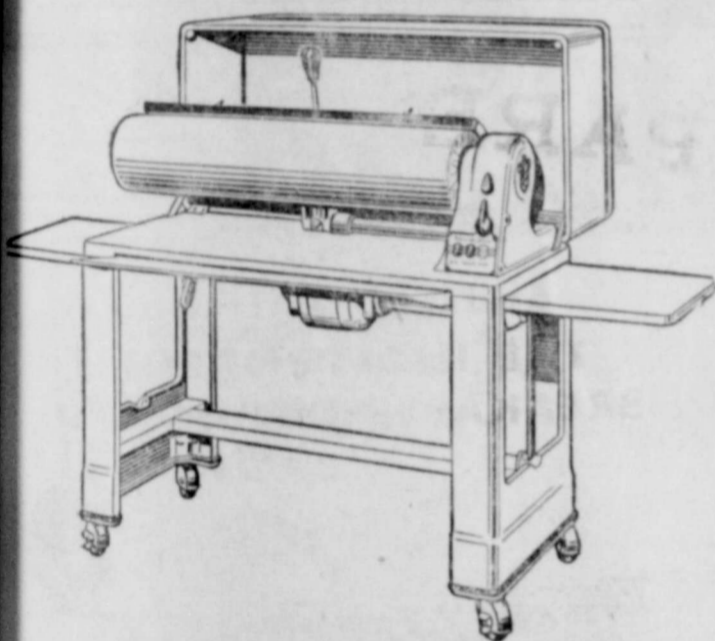

- Premises must be sprayed weekly;
- Manure must be cleaned from the premises weekly;
- And comply with the rules and regulations which the City Council or State Department of Health may make from time to time, with reference to sanitary conditions.

This is a health measure in an effort to avoid an outbreak of Polio and other diseases and to protect the health of the community.

We do not wish to work a hardship on anyone, and earnestly request your cooperation.

Through the pastor of our town there have been American Love gifts distributed and I received a suit for my son and found your address in a pocket. I wish to express my heartiest thanks for kindness in the gift. My son wore the suit for his confirmation last Sunday.

I am a war widow. My husband was killed in Russia in 1941. In August of 1946 I and my children were driven from our home in East Prussia by the Russians and Poles. Now I and my children are living here in very meager circumstances.

I have two sons, one fourteen and one twelve years and a daughter nine years old. My oldest son has a severe case of epilepsy. I have been sick a long time and can not work. We have to live off a very small rent. Therefore please permit me to ask a great favor of you, if you might have more such love gifts to spare they would be so very much appreciated.

We especially need clothing and shoes for the children. Out grown ones.

I am hoping and waiting for word and help from you.

## False Notions Under Texas Cancer Control

DUSTON—False notions about causes of cancer are hindering control in Texas to a great extent, J. Louis Neff, executive director of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, said recently.

"Unfortunately, we do not yet know exactly what does cause the cancer disease," Mr. Neff said. "What we do know, however, is that certain old-fashioned ideas about cancer are not true. It is a great misfortune that so much cancer is cloaked in ignorance and fear."

The executive director stated, with emphasis, that cancer is not caused by a single severe injury, or by the use of aluminum cooking utensils, or electric refrigerators, or by any particular food or combination of foods, or by the use of alcohol, or by kissing or by any other form of contact between persons or between persons and animals.

"These versions of what causes cancer are old wives' tales," and more we of the American Cancer Society can do to discredit these false notions and bring the true facts about the disease to the people of this state, the sooner it will be that Texas conquers cancer.

### What Cancer Is Not

"Cancer is not caused by a germ or infection. It is neither contagious or infectious. Nor is cancer inherited. It is a disease which should make them more alert to warning signals. But there is no reason to assume that children will inevitably die of cancer because one or more parents die of the disease."

The American Cancer Society official pointed out that cancer results when certain body cells rebel against the orderly process of growth and start off on a rampage of lawless expansion, destruction, and death. What causes this wild and destructive growth is not known.

"Until we do find the causes of cancer and develop additional methods of treatment," he concluded, "we must fight cancer with what we now know."
