They are going a step further also by providing the right-of-way for the road to extend west a distance of some three miles to the Hale county line, so that when and if they can get construction of their proposed route they will have a route that lacks only three-fourths of a mile connecting with the Hale county road system. Promise has been made by the Hale county authorities that the gap will be closed when the Irick proposal is finished County Surveyor W. D. Newell was at Irick last week making the survey for a right-of-way 80 feet wide, preparatory to removing REA and Southwestern Public Service lines on the route. This route extends three miles due south from Highway 70 and thence west three and three-fourths miles.

> -0-These eight preventable causes account for most of the farm fire losses: sparks on combustable roofs, defective chimneys, spontaneous combustion, improper use of kerosene and gasoline, unsafe furnace and stove installations, misuse of electricity and appliances, carelessness with matches and inadequate lightning protection.





New Bus Rules Announced

of school buses under the Gilmer Aiken law, have been received by the County Board of Education.

Chief of the new regulations is that the buses are forbidden to leave the regular road to go by homes which are less than three-quarters of a mile off the road.

There is no appeal from this pro-vision, and violation of it by any bus driver in the county will cause all the schools in the county to lose bus aid.

those who live more than three quarter of a mile, provided the road is equal to a third class county road and there are no gates or other

Another change is that schools are not allowed to use buses for extracurricular activities trips, such as football, basketball, and other trips, except that the school may pay a fee of ten cents per mile to the

This provision is made because the state is paying only the actual cost of transporting students to and from school and the State Department feels that the state should not pay for the extra miles when the bus is used for these activities.

Schools will be paid sixty-three dollars per year or seven dollars per month for each child transported thirteen days a month. This is an increase of two dollars and fifty cepts per month over last year. The states pays up to this amount if it is used, otherwise, they pay only
