July of 1951 Critical Date in Vet School

July 25, 1961, is a critical date in the education and training program under the Servicemen's Readjustment act, according to a letter received recently by the Floyd county Vocational school.

Veterans who are eligible for education or training and who have not undertaken such training under the Servicemen's Readjustment act, as well as those who have comm ed but have not completed their course, may be vitally affected by the July 25, date. In order that al such veterans may be made fully aware of the importance of the date and of its effect on the education and training program, this regulation is promulgated at this time for the purpose of providing all such veterans with ample advance notice so that their plans may be made accordingly.

This regulation applies to all courses of education or training pursued by veterans on or after . 25, 1951, under the Servicemen's Re adjustment act, as amended.

The law provides that a cour of education or training shall be initiated before the termination of 4 years after the date of discharge or by July 25, 1951, whichever is the later, and that such education or training cannot be afforded beyond July 25, 1956, except for those erans who enlisted under the Voluntary Recruitment Act of October 6, 1945. Therefore, a veteran otherwise eligible must have commenced and actually be pursuing his course of education or training on July 25 1951, or the date 4 years after discharge, whichever is later, except where his attendance is interrupted because of the normal interruptions for summer vacations. or other reasons beyond the control of the veteran.





Any advantage that the United States may have held at one time in the natural and artificial factors of cotton production are not so important today, says P. K. Norris of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in reviewing a study of present conditions. As cotton specialist for the Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations, Norris finds that several foreign countries have now developed cotton production to the point where they are able to overcome some of the advantages

long enjoyed by the United States. "The question of the kind of cotton grown is an example," says Nor-India, China, Brazil, Mexico, and several other countries, are now producing American Upland cotton. Much of this cotton is from varieties originally produced in the United States. A great deal of this cotton is ginned and handled as it is in the United States. In many cases, it is delivered to foreign spinners by merchants who deal in foreign as well as United States cottons. Only a few years ago some of these merchants were selling U. S. cotton exclusively. Today, they offer to their foreign cus-

comers American Upland cotton grown in many parts of the world." Mr. Norris points out that the postwar outlets for United States cotton have been made possible largely by Government programs such as ECA, and that these out-lets can be maintained as long as Government credits provided under such programs are continued.


"After the present credits are discontinued," he says, "our outlets will depend to a large extent upon the volume of production above demestic requirements, the level of world demand, the supply of foreign cotton, and the amount of dollar ex-change available to the cotton importing countries and the use they make of such exchange.
