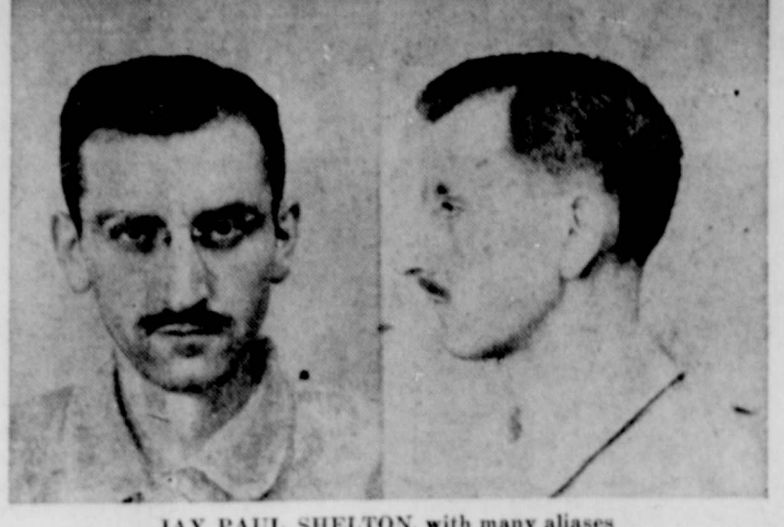

enters active service. Term NSLI Policies issued before January 1, 1946 expire eight years from date of issue. Term NSLI Policies issued on or after January 1, 1946 expire five years from the date of issue.

These expiration periods are significant for Veterans whose first period of service began after September 2, 1945, and who took out Term NSLI while in service.

If they took out their Term Policies before January 1, 1946, they have eight years from the date of issue to renew or convert before the expiration of their policies.

If they took out their Term NSLI Policies on or after January 1, 1946, they have only five years from the date of issue to renew or convert before expiration.

There is still a third group affected by another date: This group includes those who took out NSLI Term Policies on or after January 1, 1948. These Policies, under the present law, may not be renewed at their expiration, but they may be converted at any time prior to their expiration.

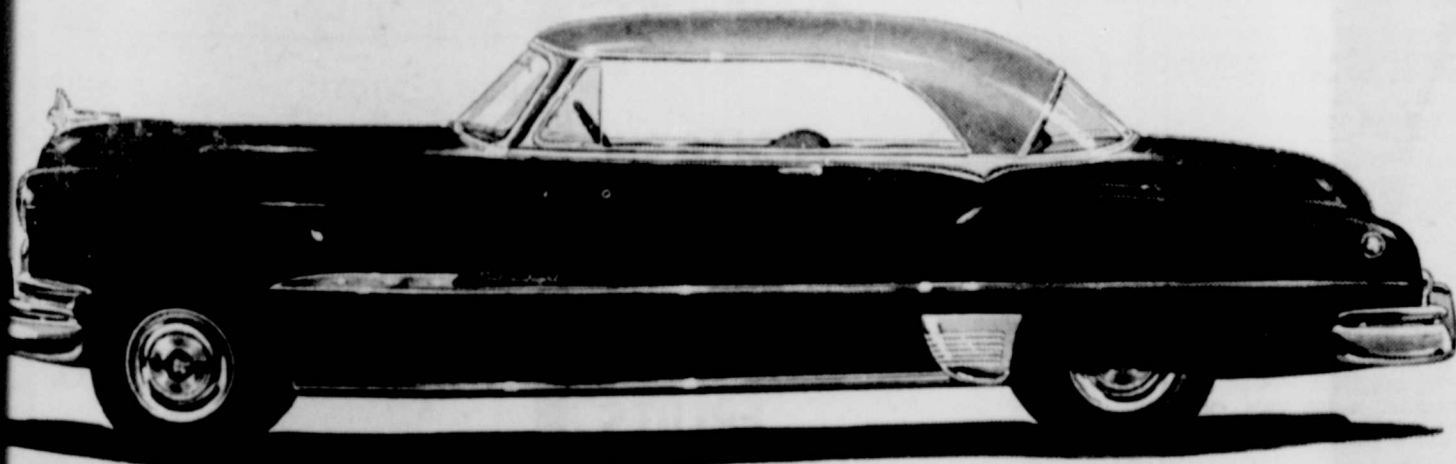

Deadline for Vets

Term NSLI Policies issued before January 1, 1946 expire eight years from date of issue. Term NSLI Policies issued on or after January 1, 1946 expire five years from the date of issue.

These expiration periods are significant for Veterans whose first period of service began after September 2, 1945, and who took out Term NSLI while in service.

If they took out their Term Policies before January 1, 1946, they have eight years from the date of issue to renew or convert before the expiration of their policies.

If they took out their Term NSLI Policies on or after January 1, 1946, they have only five years from the date of issue to renew or convert before expiration.

There is still a third group affected by another date: This group includes those who took out NSLI Term Policies on or after January 1, 1948. These Policies, under the present law, may not be renewed at their expiration, but they may be converted at any time prior to their expiration.

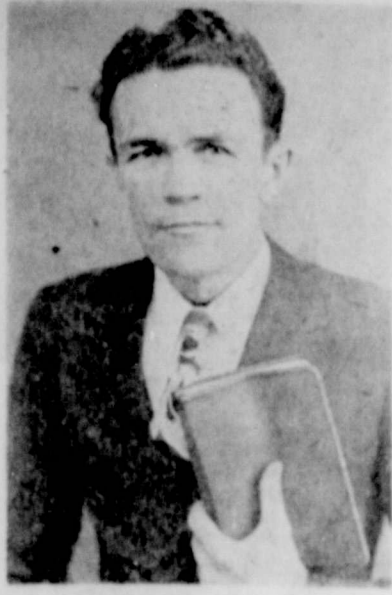

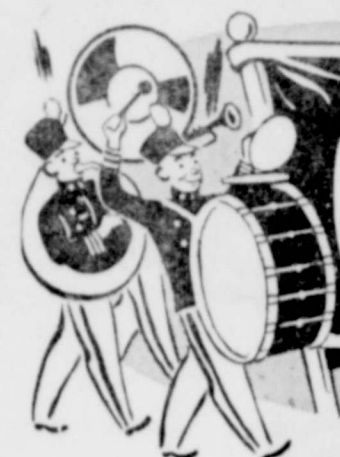



Chigger Infestation By People Spray

With a few well bites a tiny little six legged insect so small it's hardly discernible without a microscope, can make a sleeper itchy, restless and out of bed.

When you call them red bugs, chiggers, mites, or Ectoparasites, their scientific name is Sarcoptes scabiei.

State Health Officer George W. Cox says you're due to meet this summer and spring, especially in lawns or Bermuda grass. Dr. Cox says you can spot them by a black dot, and take them off with a needle.

Places like a hangy chick-lounge outside on a balmy evening, they'll go to work. Chiggers start at bedtime, and they're not there all night.

As though chiggers have been open season on humanity since about May and lasting through the fall and winter months, their (the chiggers') numbers are increasing, Dr. Cox says they do not burrow into the skin, but merely attach themselves to their mouthparts and suck until they're engorged.

A severe itching is caused by the saliva of the insect. It is not their hosts, according to health officials. Favorite spots are feet, hands, and stomach. Itchy infection in the form of sores result from persistent scratching.

Cox says chiggers are tough to control in heavily wooded sections in lawns, camp sites, and grounds where grass can be seen, the job can be done inexpensively and without much trouble. Recommendations for spraying with crude benzene hexachloride at the rate of 2 to 5 pounds per acre.

Dr. Cox says summer will be more pleasant than last year, "the doctor advised."

Boyce House Says I Give You Texas

March 8, 1951

One of the best known of the ranches in the southern section of the state is (said the Taft Tribune some years ago) the 167,000 acre Taft Ranch. To this ranch in 1911 came a 35-year old Georgian as engineer. His job was to lay a waterline from Gregory to Taft. Upon the completion of his job, his work was so much appreciated that he was hired permanently.

From that first visit, 30 years ago, R. H. Anderson has seen Taft grow from a few ranch houses "out in the mesquite brush" to a clean little city of 2,700 people. Mr. Anderson's duties were numerous. He had to take care of 78 windmills scattered throughout the vast ranch. He cared for the windmills but wore out six Model T's in doing it. Mr. Anderson tells of often fording the bay in a buggy to reach Corpus Christi. He says "Don't ever think that the ranch was a dull place to live. Some things was always happening: barbecues, hunting and fishing parties, and horseback riding were just a few of the ways to pass time. The ranch manager often brought musical companies to Taft for the people's entertainment and besides there was always a constant stream of guests coming to the ranch, such distinguished men as president William Howard Taft."

And the one household tool that figures most prominently in her plans for a happy household is the family washing machine. It is vitally essential to the health and happiness of every family. With this indispensable "helper" at her disposal, the modern mother is able to supply the constant demand for clean clothes and still have plenty of time and energy to devote to raising her family.

It is a good idea to wash babies' bibs and tuckers daily to keep them clean and sweet-smelling.

Put wet diapers and sleeping garments to soak immediately after use in a container half full of cold water, to which two table-spoons of borax have been added. A two-gallon enamel pail with a cover is the best container to use.

To avoid double-trouble, carefully select your twins' garments. Buy wardrobes for your "carriage set" that are designed for complete and easy laundering. Always buy baby clothes with finished seams. Raglan sleeves give babies more freedom. And dresses and gowns that open all the way down the front are easier to put on and simpler to iron.

Avoid buying fussy garments trimmed with frills and laces around the neck band. They are irritating to young, tender skins. Never starch baby clothes.

Cotton wrappers, knit shirts, and flannel nighties are easy to

wash in the washing machine. They should be washed in the same manner as any other cotton. In time, flannelette may take on a pebbly appearance, but this will not mar its softness and warmth.

Daily launderings of tiny dresses and slip will keep them fresh and dainty and like new. Always use a mild soap or detergent and wash for a very short period.

Views and Comment

Radio Station.—Another good thing for the area is the new radio station, to which has been assigned the call letters, KFLD. The F and L and D are the three consonants in Floyd, pleasing to the new station's owners, doubtless. The station is due to be worth a great deal to the people of the area, giving it more solidarity and affording a vocal mouth-piece which has been noticeably lacking for sometime. The station represents a quite considerable investment in the future of Floydada and the area, the owners betting on the character of the country and the character of the people. To our way of thinking their bet is a good one. Our congratulations and good wishes.

The commissioners court is between a rock and a hard place. Like most every good concern Floyd county, as a political subdivision, in the past three years has found its cost of doing business mounting and some of the costs wholly beyond control. We have not gone into the dollars and cents of their need for money with which to finish the court house. However, since it is a bad thing to do as a political matter, we are convinced the court must really need to do something. They have gone the right route, so far as getting an okay from the people is concerned. When you are up against a bad maneuver the best thing to do is to lay your cards on the table, air all the facts. Whatever the decision of the taxpayers may be, will, of course have to be the decision of the commissioners court.

The story was printed last week, denied, and then printed again, that the Matador syndicate is selling their big ranch spread in Motley that spills over into Dickens on the south, Cottle on the east, and Floyd on the west. Speculation has already spread that the new owners have in mind to sell out the big tract, retaining some of the oil royalty. This would mean scores of small ranches and other scores of farms, with an influx of people just like in the old days when a new territory was opened up. Doubtless, the people of the town of Matador are hoping the deal may go through and that the new owners will do just as the report goes that they will. Much as sentiment is tied up in the association of people in the area with the history, past and present, of the big cattle company, they know it takes people to make a country and a town. No town but would like to have a nice, fat boom hit if it is a solid one, and that is what would happen at Matador if the Matador lands were subdivided.

Story in the papers tell of the government seizing the fashionable home of a film stars' for income taxes. This is in California. It makes us wonder can the government seize your homestead in Texas to collect an income tax judgment?

When clean up week is announced in Floydada this spring it is our hope that the clean up be made a study as well as the usual battle of hoes and shovels. Generally the civic-minded citizen cleans up about his own premises, then gets out and helps with vacant property that has become an eyesore or threat to the health of the community. We think sometime it would be a good idea for the general committee just to make a tour of the town, beginning at some alley and continuing without ever entering a street except to cross it. Best way to find out how your town really looks is to look at it critically from the back side. We need to look at our pieces of property that way. In Floydada there are some pretty hard-looking alleys not too far from the business district.

Lack of Paving. People, especially young people, from larger cities do not have much patience with a considerable little city like Floydada for its lack of paving. Sometimes we listen with interest to some pretty plain talk about a town that does that way. The young people slant their conversation along this line, that the city authorities ought to be smoked out and made to get something done. They are from "homerule" cities and do not know the processes that are involved in a town where the charter is based on the general state law. They make it plain "that kind of a town" is not the kind they are hunting for a home.

The Matador Land & Cattle company is one of the few out of scores, probably hundreds, of ranches established in the eighties and nineties in Texas that has weathered all the vicissitudes and come out on top. The greater percentage of the big ranch properties which made the early history of West Texas, went bankrupt through bad management or misfortune. You can almost count the successful ones west of the 100 meridian on the fingers of your two hands. The Scotch nearly always managed to have a good man in charge on the ground and they kept in touch with the cost of doing business on the Matadors.

When mobster Benny Binyon got away with moving from Texas to Nevada and getting protection in that state against extradition back to Texas, he set an example for other Johnny come latels, who are migrating to the wide open state to ply their business. Nevada ought to have a pretty good gallery of notorious personages if they keep up the good work.

Don't forget to include a home garden in the plans you are making now covering the things to be done this spring. The gardener can easily supply many of the vegetables your family will need for an adequate diet.

Notary Terms Expire June 1

County Clerk, Margaret Collier has received notification from the office of Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd on the procedure to be followed in the reappointment of qualified notaries public whose terms expire June 1, and the appointment of new notaries.
The reappointment of all presently qualified notaries of Floyd county will be made by Secretary of State Shepperd by May 20, and each reappointed notary must qualify with the county clerk on June 1, file oath and bond and pay the statutory filing fee to the clerk in order to serve as a qualified notary for the new term, June 1, 1951 to June 1, 1953. After all reappointed notaries have

qualified, the clerk will forward certificates of qualification and filing fees to the Secretary of State. Individual notaries are not to send money to the State office.
Terms of all presently qualified notaries expire on June 1, and a notary cannot qualify for the 1951-53 term before that date, irrespective of reappointment or new appointments.
Persons applying through the County Clerks for Notary appointment for the first time will receive appointments effective on the date of qualification. A certificate of appointment on each person applying for the first time will be sent to the secretary of state for approval and then returned to the county clerk, after which the person will be notified to appear within 10 days to qualify before the Clerk.
In the instructions received from Shepperd, he stated, "An applicant must be 21 years of age or older and a resident of the county in which he intends to act as a notary. It is important that the exact name of the applicant be given and that this name be used on all documents signed by the person. He must also give his correct mailing address."

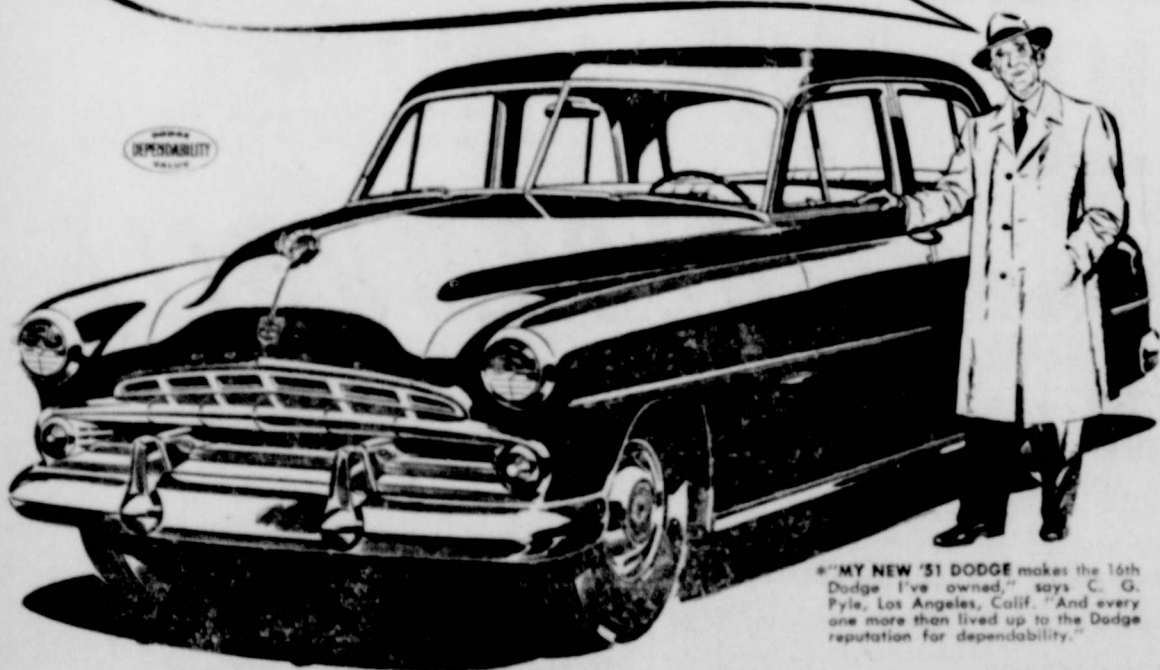

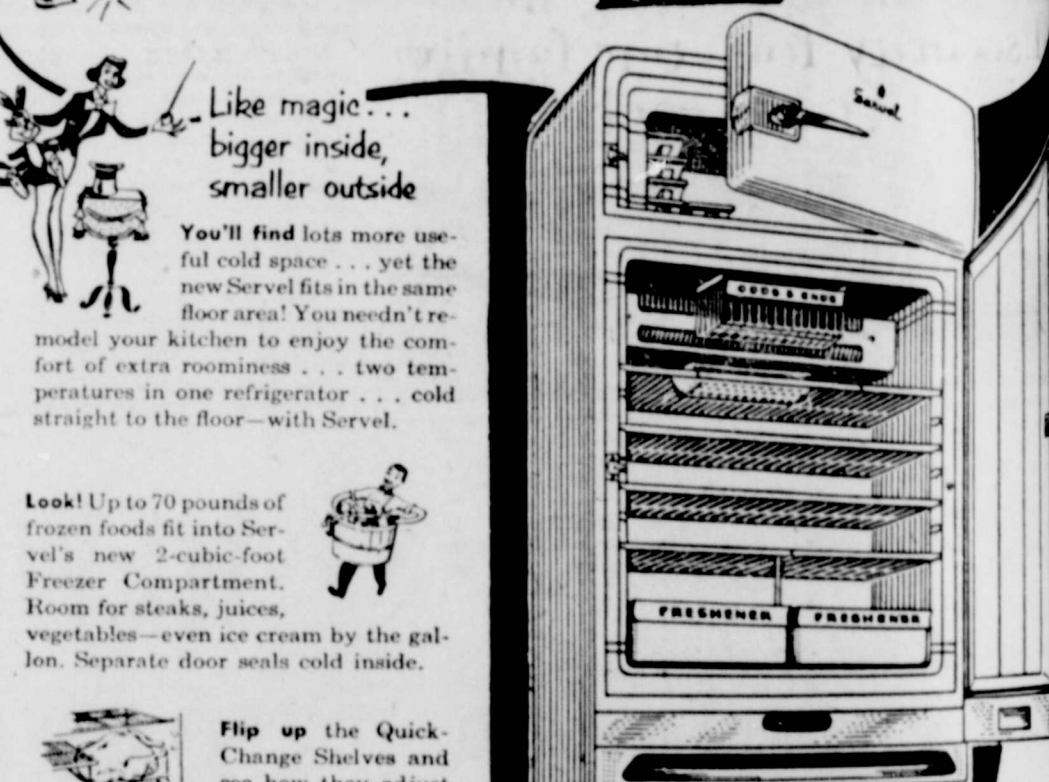

Notary Terms Expire June 1

County Clerk, Margaret Collier has received notification from the office of Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd on the procedure to be followed in the reappointment of qualified notaries public whose terms expire June 1, and the appointment of new notaries.

The reappointment of all presently qualified notaries of Floyd county will be made by Secretary of State Shepperd by May 20, and each reappointed notary must qualify with the county clerk on June 1, file oath and bond and pay the statutory filing fee to the clerk in order to serve as a qualified notary for the new term, June 1, 1951 to June 1, 1953. After all reappointed notaries have

qualified, the clerk will forward certificates of qualification and filing fees to the Secretary of State. Individual notaries are not to send money to the State office.

Persons applying through the County Clerks for Notary appointment for the first time will receive appointments effective on the date of qualification. A certificate of appointment on each person applying for the first time will be sent to the secretary of state for approval and then returned to the county clerk, after which the person will be notified to appear within 10 days to qualify before the Clerk.

It is important that the exact name of the applicant be given and that this name be used on all documents signed by the person. He must also give his correct mailing address."

Area Outlined In Underground Water District

All of Hale, Lubbock, Parmer and Swisher counties and parts of 17 other High Plains counties are included in an underground water reservoir designated by the State Board of Water Engineers.

The designation was delivered by James S. Guleke, member of the board, at a meeting Thursday in Lubbock of the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association, which had petitioned for the reservoir designation in order to determine boundaries of a proposed underground water conservation district.

Included in the reservoir are parts of Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Terry and Cochran counties.

A map showing the exact boundaries of the reservoir has been filed in the county seat of each county. The designation clears the way for the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association to petition the Board of Water Engineers to create an underground water conservation district.

The association will draw up petitions and forward them to each county represented in the reservoir designation. As soon as the petitions are signed, they will be mailed to the Board of Water Engineers.

When created, the proposed dis-

trict will carry out a water conservation program through proper spacing of wells, prevention of pollution, educational programs and re-charging.

In making the designation, the Board pointed out that the proposed district will be the first of its kind in the world. Embracing about 13,000,000 acres, the High Plains pool is also the largest underground water reservoir in the world.

Mr. Hutton pointed out that it is possible for insured people to collect retirement benefits while earning up to \$50.00 on covered jobs. The old limit was changed on last year. The \$50.00 limit does not apply to people age 75 or over. The law is simply that a person 65 and 75 years of age can collect benefits for any month he earns more than \$50.00 covered by social security. Other sources of earnings or income from other sources will affect the amount of benefits. Insured people over 65 can collect even while working full time on jobs covered by social security, or for that matter, any job.

Mr. Hutton continued, "is anyone now age 65 or over who is insured if he has worked such as a year and a half, at the back to January 1937, has social security—in covered jobs."

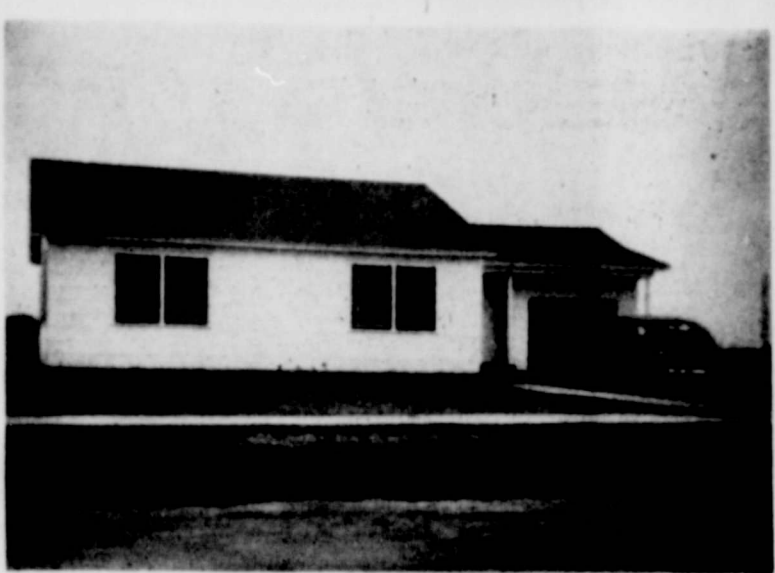

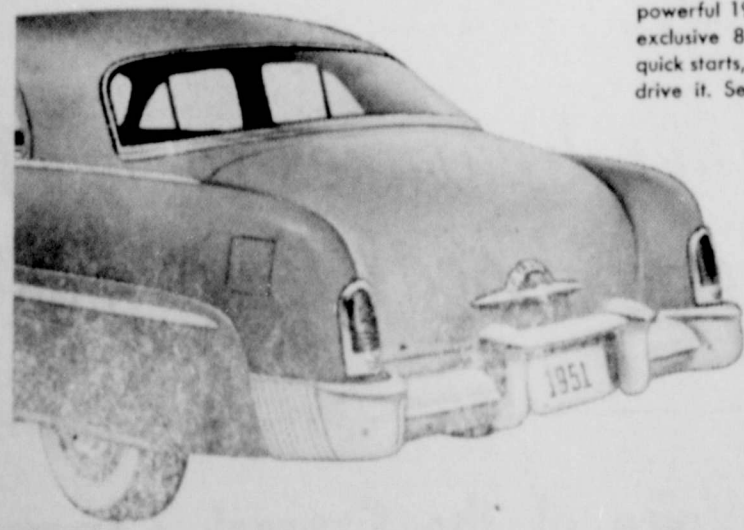
