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

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Court House Building Chronology

Early on Friday morning, March 11, 1949, the Floyd county court house burned. The fire was discovered about 6:10 a. m. by keeper John L Green. Origin of the fire was unknown. Insurance carried was \$200,on the building itself and \$25,000 on its contents.

In June, 1949, Orville L. Johnson, employed by the commissioners Polio Hospitalizes court to analyze fire damage to the building, reported that the strength the insurance companies offered a settlement of \$107,542.

He Gets His Freedom . . . First Trial in New Court House Successful Habeas Corpus Plea

Sheriff Roy Hillin, of Crosburglary returned by a Johnson by county and County Attorney county, Arkansas, grand jury. It was thefirst case to come up in a court of justice in which use was made of the new court house.

When the hearing was transferred to Floyd county on Hancock's habeas corpus plea, Judge Chapman a chair from County borrowed Judge Frank L. Moore, and borrowed the use of the new district court room from the contractors. The hearing was carried on while the inspection for final approval of the court house job was being made. There were still hammers going in far parts of the court house as the judge called the court to order. The air conditioning system was not in operation and the court room was stifling hot.

Hancock's plea was sustained by Judge Chapman and the defendant was ordered released. An error, probably in the office of the governor of Arkansas, in the writ of extradition, which the Texas governor honored. got Hancock his freedom. Hancock was indicted by the Johnson county, Arkansas, grand jury, but the writ did not so read. It said "information" instead of "indictment." a fine point but important to a man's rights in the United States. You can extradite a man on a charge by indictment of a grandjury. You can't extradite him on "information," which is only the basis for a





Views and Comment Convenience is not counted among the Is it true that many newspaper editorials are written these days as the result of a thousands of items retailed by the modern temptation for an editor to use the government for a "filler" when he is suffering from a mental vacuum? One critic of newspapers, country newspapers in particular, raises the thought. "Unable to hit on a good idea at deadline time, it is an easy out to start thinking about Washington. No mat-

ter how exhausted the editor may be, a mental picture of the goings-on in that city constitutes the necessary shot in the arm to get the editorial column completed before press time." The critic has something there. Newspapermen have a way of taking the easy way out at times the same as others. The supply of things to beef about is inexhaustible, the same writer says, and he wonders "how an editorial page could continue if we suddenly were faced with a heaven on earth-everybody honest, everybody fair, unselfish and reasonable and going about doing unto others as they would have others do unto them." It would be tough. What if every editorial written had to be of a congratulatory or pat-on-theback variety, everybody doing right, no thievery, no chicanery, no sharp shooting. That would get to be a pretty tiresome editorial page, would it not?

Since we are speaking of newspapermen and newspaper making, we mention the matter of war advertising, for which every newspaper has borne a tremendous burden through two wars in the last four decades, with a promise of a third as "inevitable." This is a gripe that will fill up an inch or two of the void of which the newspaper critic speaks. What do you suppose an automobile manufacturer would say if he received a letter from the government reading:

"The United States would like your help in making tanks, but no funds have been authorized for this purpose. We are enclosing specifications and hope you will be able to produce them as a public service, or will find patriotic citizens who will sponsor their production."

Such a request would seem ridiculous and the tank builder is not going to receive any such request. But the newspaperman has it as steady diet practically in every week's mail. He is taxed to help pay the war cost of others and at the same time asked to produce the war product he manufactures for free.

We have run across an editor, who like all editors, frets pretty often about typographical errors in his newspaper. He puts this new angle to the thought, however:

"Sometimes, several readers will tell us about such and such an error, usually on the humorous side. We have never felt so bad about the occasional ones that occur, no matter how much checking is done, since we learned that Chinese editors insert them on purpose because of the inflationary effect they have on the readers ego when he finds them."





Financial Responsibility Law

All indications are that Governor Shivers has now signed the Shofner Bill which will become law on January 1st, 1952.

The stipulations of the bill are namely this: That all drivers or owners of vehicles involved in accidents must promptly deposit with the Texas Department of Public Safety assets which may consist of an insurance policy, securities or cash-to cover damages up to \$15,-000. The State authorities will then investigate the accident, fix the blame and assess the damage.

Failure to pay the damages by any one of the three above mentioned methods, will forfeit driver's and car license until damages, either bodily or property are made good.

Although this does not become law until January 1, 1952, the sooner you begin using the coverage the better off you will be. It is our suggestion that you begin carrying liability insurance with \$15,000 in limits. to be properly protected when the new law goes into effect.
