New Gas Refund Law Has Teeth Dealers Warn

Wholesale distributors of gasoline in this area this week awoke to the realization that a new law passed by the Texas legislature, will become effective on September 1 that will change a long-time custom in relations between the wholesaler and his customer in the handling of refund claims.

The wholesalers have, in effect, been keeping their customers' refund claim records for them since the refund law became effective now a quarter of a century ago. Beginning September 1 the law requires that not only must the refund dealer

(1) Not keep any records, notarize papers or otherwise lend aid to his customers in preparing and presenting their claims to the comptroller's department, but also;

(2) Must have his customer's signature on a purchase invoice within three days from the date of purchase, and also must have cleared the papers from his office within a period of not to exceed seven days. These under penalty of having his license to do business revoked.

Amendments to the new law (which also covers liquefied gas tax regulations) would cover almost two pages of a newspaper in ordinary reading type; and the promise of still further regulation is given in a provision that the state comptroller shall have the power to issue any rules and regulations which, after proper hearing, may be deemed proper.

This week nine of the dealers of Floydada are issuing a statement over their signatures in which they point to the new regulations effective September 1. Customers, they anticipate, are not going to be too happy over the new arrangement. The dealers are asking the refund buyers of gasoline to "be patient and alert" to the fact that the change is coming up. Dealers will be under the thumb of the state comptroller who will issue licenses under which they will operate and will issue them their invoice forms at the taxpayers cost. Penalties include the cancellation of a dealer's license to do business.

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Views and Comment

No Norther Yet. When is the first frost or cold going to hit in Floyd county, to strip the cotton stalks of their leaves and stop the development of the bolls? We'd like to have the date put off as late as possible for the benefit of our friends who had to re-plant their cotton in late June and early July. We're working on it. Note that no "norther" came in July and not today in August. Thus, we promise there'll be no early cold snap, that is an October one, and not until at least November 9. This ought to help the feelings of the man who has young cotton that is going to put on a lot of fruit in September, which he would like to gather this fall, and which an early freeze would rot in the boll.

In connection with cotton business and cotton talk we have recently heard talk about boll worms attacking the squares in cotton. They must be getting mighty bold, these bollworms, or have they been attacking squares in the cotton fields all the time and we just did not know about it? And if they have all the time why should they not have been named square worms instead of bollworms? These are the kind of things that need to be seen about!

Whether or not it is likely ever to happen depends on the turn of events, but it is being realized more and more that smaller communities than those having a population of at least 5,000 need home rule so that they can solve their local problems. The fact that the basic law throws around municipalities certain restrictions under the incorporation act for cities and towns was a good thing when it was done, and still is unless and until the people have a chance to vote on it. But the change in the law would be a great advantage toward better paving, sanitation and police policies in a community like Floydada. As it is now many obvious needs of this community are read out of consideration by the type of incorporation which is the only one available to Floydada. Probably many other communities in the state have their hands tied in the same manner.

Somewhere up the line the cool mass of air from Canada that should have visited the high plains of Texas failed to do so. As a result all of that great big lot of moisture that floated up from the gulf and lay over the area for several days did not get a chance to precipitate and fall on the crops. Could it have been that the rain makers, had

they been on the job here, would have gone up and put some salt on the rain clouds' tails and we'd had a lot of rain in the last week of July? We needed it as ask the man who irrigates and the man who gets all his from the clouds.

One of the new laws, this one becoming effective September 1, is that which is expected to change the usual manner of reporting by the farmer or other person using tax exempt gasoline and liquid gas. As is common knowledge the farm operator has been having the wholesaler keep track of his "gas exemption papers" for these many years. In a large number of cases the wholesaler has actually had to go to quite a bit of trouble to get his customer in to sign up before the exemptions lapsed. The legislature is attempting to change all this for a reason we would not know. It is a comfortable thing to know you've got somebody who is going to make it his business to see that you do not too long neglect your business. Not so, says the legislature, probably at the prompting of the comptroller's department. Amongst other things it is going to be a violation of the law for the wholesaler to have an unsigned invoice on his desk longer than three days and another violation of the law to have the invoice in his possession signed or unsigned past the seventh day. Let somebody else tell you why. Here's the way it appears: The wholesaler is going to take this law seriously, for the reason, among other things, that he will lose his permit to do business if he does otherwise. He'd rather be in business with a few good friends irritated at him than to be out of business with the whole world his friends.

Dr. George W. Cox, health officer, today took exception to recent reports that Texas faces an invasion from vampire bats.

Health official referred to a sensational newspaper story published in a Mexican government publication, Dr. Aurelio Malaga-Alba's report. This bat is known to inhabit only certain Southern geographical locations. Vampire bat history was discussed last year at the U. S. - Mexico Border Public Health Association in Chihuahua. Bats Mostly Beneficial

"And for the most part, bats are beneficial. Only the vampire is a blood sucker. The rest feed on harmful insects, including mosquitoes," Dr. Cox warned.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 48-d OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF RURAL FIRE PREVENTION DISTRICTS AS TO PROVIDE THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY AUTHORIZE AN AD VALOREM TAX NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY (50) CENTS ON THE ONE HUNDRED (100) DOLLAR VALUATION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts to exceed Fifty (50) Cents on the One Hundred (100) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by the vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote at the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50) Cents on the One Hundred (100) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50) Cents on the One Hundred (100) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

Proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stock eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS BY ADDING TO ARTICLE XVI THEREOF A NEW SECTION TO BE NUMBERED 63, AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR A STATEWIDE SYSTEM OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY PENSIONS FOR APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE SEVERAL COUNTIES THEREIN BY COUNTY; PROVIDING THAT PARTICIPATION THEREIN SHALL BE VOLUNTARY, AND AUTHORIZED BY THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SUCH COUNTY; PROVIDING FURTHER THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL NOT BE AUTHORIZED TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION TO PAY ANY RETIREMENT OR DISABILITY BENEFIT UNDER SUCH A PLAN AND PROGRAM AS THE LEGISLATURE SHALL AUTHORIZE HEREIN; PROVIDING FURTHER THAT PARTICIPATION THEREIN BY COUNTIES SHALL BE VOLUNTARY AND SHALL FIRST BE AUTHORIZED BY VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SUCH COUNTY; PROVIDING FURTHER THAT THE LEGISLATURE SHALL NOT BE AUTHORIZED TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION TO PAY ANY RETIREMENT OR DISABILITY BENEFIT UNDER SUCH A PLAN AND PROGRAM AS THE LEGISLATURE SHALL AUTHORIZE HEREIN. ADMINISTRATION OF SUCH SYSTEM MAY BE COMMITTED TO THE SAME BODY AS MAY BE SET UP TO ADMINISTER THE MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM PROVIDED FOR BY SECTION 511 OF ARTICLE III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize herein; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefit authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 511 of Article III."

The Texas Motor Fuel Law Has Been Amended

*In a way that is Important to Every Farmer
and to Every Dealer who handles
Tax Exempt Gasoline*

Every dealer in Tax Refund Gasoline in the State of Texas (principally gasoline sold to Farmers for use in their tractors) has received a copy of the "Important Notice" which appears to the right in this advertisement. It is from the State Comptroller's Department, as you will note. This "important notice" makes it completely unlawful to follow the long-time custom of the wholesalers to help their customers with their tax refund claims, watching expiration dates, notarizing the claims and helping the customers keep track of their exemption receipts and other papers in connection with tax refunds that have been followed for a number of years. This practice, which has been done to accomodate busy men, not accustomed to record-keeping, must NOW BE COMPLETELY ABANDONED by the distributors of tax-exempt gasoline, under pain of being denied permit to carry on their business.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

This pamphlet shows several changes in the law by which you will be governed effective September 1st, 1951.

You should carefully read each page and give very special attention to Section 13 (e) page 6 since this pamphlet will put you on notice and violations on your part could easily prevent your customers' claim from being paid. Also important is (1) page 10.

In this pamphlet you will find very important new legal requirements placed on the person who will file refund claims and you may pass this information to them for their assistance, but do not prepare or notarize claims. Do not keep the duplicates of exemptions in your place of business more than seven (7) days after they have been issued.

STATE COMPTROLLER'S DEPARTMENT

TEXT OF SECTION 13 (E) AND (1) PAGE 10 ARE GIVEN BELOW

"The invoice of exemption shall be made out and executed in duplicate by the refund dealer, the duplicate of which shall be delivered to the purchaser of the motor fuel and the original shall be retained by the refund dealer at the place of business designated on his license for the time and in the manner herein provided. Each invoice of exemption shall be signed by the refund dealer and the person who purchases the motor fuel for refund purposes or a duly authorized employee or agent of said dealer or purchaser. But if neither the purchaser of the motor fuel nor an agent is present to sign the invoice of exemption at the time of delivery, the refund dealer shall mail or deliver the duplicate invoice of exemption to the purchaser within seven (7) days after delivery of the motor fuel.

"(e) It shall be unlawful for any refund dealer, or any employee thereof, to prepare or notarize any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer, or to act in any capacity as agent or employee of any claimant for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by keeping his books, records, refund claim forms or other documents to be used or intended for use by said claimant in the preparation of his tax refund claim, and the Comptroller shall not approve the payment of any refund claim, in whole or in part, in which the claimant has permitted the seller of the motor fuel upon which tax refund is claimed, or any employee or said seller, to prepare, notarize or file his claim for tax refund, or keep any books, records or documents used in the preparation of filing of said claim. Provided that the Comptroller may, after proper hearing as herein provided, cancel, suspend, or refuse the issuance or reinstatement of the license of any refund dealer who shall prepare or notarize, or who shall permit any employee to prepare or notarize, any claim for refund of tax paid on motor fuel purchased from said refund dealer by the claimant thereof, or who shall keep, or permit any employee to keep, any duplicate invoice of exemption for more than seven (7) days after it has been duly issued to a purchaser of refund motor fuel.

"(1) Concurrently with the issuance of a refund dealer's licenses the Comptroller shall issue and charge to the account of the licensee, a book or books of invoices of exemption which shall be printed in duplicate sets and serially numbered. The Comptroller shall keep a record of the number of books and their serial numbers issued to each refund dealer who shall be liable for a penalty in the amount of five dollars (\$5) for each book of invoices of exemption received by him for which he cannot properly account as hereinafter provided. Whenever a representative of the Comptroller audits the motor fuel records of a refund dealer, or whenever a refund dealer places a reorder for a book or books of invoices of exemption, such dealer shall prepare a written record showing the serial numbers of all books not previously accounted for and if such record does not account for each book previously issued to said refund dealer which has not been previously accounted for, the refund dealer shall be given thirty (30) days notice in writing to produce any missing book or to show that it has been used to cover sales of refund motor fuel made by said refund dealer. If the missing book or books are not accounted for within thirty (30) days from the date of said notice the refund dealer shall forfeit to the State of Texas as a penalty the sum of five dollars (\$5) for each book unaccounted for, which shall be paid to the Comptroller and allocated to the same funds to which the motor fuel taxes collected hereunder are appropriated. No further books of invoices of exemption shall be issued to any refund dealer who has incurred the penalty described hereinabove until said penalty has been paid. Any invoices of exemption which become mutilated or unusable shall be returned to the Comptroller by the dealer for credit to his account. The books of invoices of exemption shall not be transferable or assignable by such refund dealer unless such transfer or assignment is authorized by the Comptroller.

"If any duplicate invoice of exemption issued to a purchaser is lost or destroyed, said purchaser may make application to the Comptroller for forms to be issued and used in lieu of each lost duplicate.

"The invoices of exemption bound in book form shall be furnished by the State of Texas, free of cost, to the refund dealer.

The amendments to the Motor Fuel Tax Law go into detail prescribing methods of handling refund gasoline for farm or industrial use and also covers revised tax requirements on liquefied gas use. The above quoted changes, however, are the ones which completely change the methods of handling refund claims as has been the custom for several years. Your patient and alert attention to these requirements of the law will be appreciated by the undersigned dealers.

ROBERT GEORGE THOMPSON

Alert citizens and law enforcement agencies throughout the nation have been requested by the FBI to assist in locating Robert George Thompson, 36, one of the convicted Communist Party leaders who are now fugitive from justice. A description of Thompson is as follows:

Age, 36, born June 21, 1915, at Grants Pass, Oregon; height, 5'9 1/2"; weight, 170 pounds; eyes, dark brown; hair, brown, thick, straight, complexion, light; build, muscular; race, white; nationality, American; scars and marks, bullet wound left knee, appendectomy.

His complexion, is sallow and he walks with a slight hop or limp from the wound in his left knee. In the past he has driven a 1948 green Chrysler four door sedan, New York license 4C5674.

He has worked as a mechanic operator in a linoleum factory in California and as a laborer in a cannery. He has also worked at wheat harvesting and lumbering in Oregon. He speaks slowly and usually carries a briefcase.

Thompson was convicted on October 14, 1949, for violation of the Smith Act and was sentenced to three years imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine. A bench warrant was issued for his arrest on July 2, 1951, when he failed to appear in Federal Court for commitment to prison.

Any person having information which may assist in locating Thompson is requested to immediately notify the nearest FBI office. The phone number will appear on the first page of the phone book.

Seeking Voluntary Compliance With Price Regulations

"Voluntary compliance with the ceiling price regulations is the goal sought by the Office of Price Stabilization, and my purpose is to help merchants of this area to meet the requirements of these regulations," said Melvin D. Lackey, price specialist who will be here next Thursday morning, August 16.

"Any merchant who needs assistance in filling out OPS forms or information as to how he may conform with the regulations is invited to visit the price clinic during my stay here," he said.

The OPS representative, while in Floydada, will make his offices at the Chamber of Commerce.

Although a specialist in the food section, he will be able to give assistance to all type businesses regarding the appropriate regulations.

The price clinics held here weekly are under the joint sponsorship of the Office of Price Stabilization, the chamber of commerce, and other civic and business organizations.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 2

Proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas.

as for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by the Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teachers' retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds, such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other government agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The Lands of the veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as provided in this program by legislative act, in such quantities and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as hereafter be provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the land and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of

said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the later maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

FOR THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 49-b, CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, FOR INCREASING VETERANS' LAND FUND FOR THE PURCHASE OF LANDS IN TEXAS TO BE SOLD TO TEXAS VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II, AND TO TEXAS VETERANS OF SERVICE IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA SUBSEQUENT TO 1945.

States of America subsequent to 1945 shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 49-b, CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, FOR INCREASING VETERANS' LAND FUND FOR THE PURCHASE OF LANDS IN TEXAS TO BE SOLD TO TEXAS VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II, AND TO TEXAS VETERANS OF SERVICE IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA SUBSEQUENT TO 1945." If it appears from the returns of the election that a majority of the voters shall become a part of said Amendment, the same shall be effective from the date of proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State shall issue the necessary proclamation of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereon.
